"Faith Matters: The Power of Resurrection to Bring New Life"

"Why do you look for the living among the dead? He is not here but has risen." (Luke 24:5b)

My dear friends,

Easter arrives late this year. And you can thank the lunar calendar for that! I am always grateful for a late Easter because, by then, the day of rebirth is nestled sweetly in the warming days of Spring—which certainly makes Easter Dawn Services more palatable! (I hope you'll join me in the Memorial Garden on April 17th @ 7 a.m. for this year's Dawn Service.)

But Easter isn't really about the weather or the lunar calendar. Easter is about the power of God to bring an entirely new reality to the world in the form of resurrection. Jesus isn't merely resuscitated. God raises Jesus from the dead and, by so doing, enters the stage of human history to bring about new life for all who trust and believe. Overthrowing death, sin, and all that would oppress us, God in Christ declares that life is more powerful than death and love is more enduring than tragedy.

What a gift! And yet, that gift can also be frightening. Presbyterian pastor and Professor Anna Carter Florence* says this about resurrection: "If the dead don't stay dead, what can you count on? Resurrection...breaks all the rules, and while most of us will admit that the old rules aren't perfect – and sometimes are downright awful – at least we know them. They are predictable, a known quantity, and in this sense comforting. And resurrection upsets all of that."

It's easy to lose sight of the power of resurrection when we treat Easter as little more than a Spring holiday—a reason to bring out the "good clothes" and brighten the worship space with pure white lilies. Perhaps it's helpful, then, to remember that Christians today aren't the first to reduce the scope of Easter. One of the common elements of the Easter stories across the gospels is that no one expects the resurrection. Even though Jesus predicted both his death and his resurrection several times across his ministry, no one greeted the news that God had raised Jesus from the grave and defeated death by saying, "Praise God!" Nor did they shout their "Hallelujahs" when they heard that their friend and Lord had been raised to new life. Many viewed the "good news" as little more than 1st century "fake news."

Even the women received the news with apprehension until they remembered Jesus' own words about resurrection. Then, believing, they ran off to tell the other disciples what they'd heard and seen—and were greeted with skepticism. Luke says the disciples thought the women were (according to the Greek) delirious, caught up in utter nonsense. The men, for their part, were caught up in worry over what came next for them now that the dream of following the Messiah had been turned upside down. What the men hadn't yet realized is that resurrection doesn't signal a return to the status quo. Rather, resurrection throws our neat and orderly lives out of whack by giving us a different reality than the one we'd imagined. Lutheran Pastor David Lose says, "If you don't find resurrection at least a little hard to believe, you probably aren't taking it very seriously!"

Most of us have heard the Easter story so many times that the resurrection of Jesus barely makes us blink much less lead us to shake with awesome wonder. So, let's take a different tack this Easter. Let's welcome the wonder of God's activity breaking in upon the world in a new way, for it is the same God who raised Jesus from the dead that continues to raise the body of Christ to new life in the present day when we are opened to the changes that accompany resurrection.

Just as the disciples were caught up in wishful thinking over regaining what they'd lost when Jesus was crucified, congregations tend to get lost in musing over the past while wishing for the return of the "good old days" of overflowing pews and programs up the wazoo. God offers the Body of Christ resurrection—not for the purpose of returning to what was, but for the purpose of welcoming a new life which breaks a few of the old rules and makes a path forward.

It's likely you'll have a new pastor by Easter 2023. With God's help and the Spirit's guiding, that pastor will help enliven the body with hope for a future rich with new life. To prepare for that pastor's arrival, we must be more inclined to welcome the gift of resurrection and less inclined to think of those leading us toward resurrection as "delirious." The dream of following the Messiah may be turned upside down a bit by changes, but the dream lives on in welcoming the power of God to bring the body of Christ to new life.

Never forget: God is with us still. And Easter will bring with it resurrection. But its power is lost to us if we consider it little more than an "idle tale" or simply a reason for a family get-together. Easter is a gift that anticipates a response, even if that response means a shift from the orderliness of a former life to the potential imbalance of a new life. Trust in the Lord and welcome the gift that is both aweinspiring and a little bit frightening! God in Christ will see us through.

And we will offer up the story of Jesus' crucifixion on Good Friday with a narrative based on both the prophecy of Isaiah and the account in John's gospel. Both services will begin at 7:00 p.m. May the Spirit lead you to an experience of Christ this Lenten season.

We will share in a sunrise service on Easter morning, April 17th, at 7 a.m. Meet Pastor Rhonda in the Memorial Garden, if the weather permits, or in the sanctuary if the weather is unkind. Our regular Sunday morning service will be held at its usual 9:30 a.m. time that same day. Happy Easter!

Pandemic Protocols have been eased but we ask that you consider masking when entering or exiting the building, or when moving about. We will continue to social distance.

We hope you will willingly share something of yourselves in these discussions as your participation is vital to our success.

Music Notes...

Lent is sometimes called a desert journey, or a fast in the wilderness. We remember the Lord's forty days fasting after His baptism. We remember Noah and the flood of forty days. We remember the warning of Jonah: *forty days more and Nineveh will be destroyed*. We remember Moses and the chosen people eating manna for forty years in the desert. Moses was on Mount Sinai for forty days. Saul, David, and Solomon all

reigned for forty years (did you know that?) Elijah ate once, and the meal held him for forty days (see 1 Kings 19:8).

That's why our beloved Lenten hymn says "Alone and fasting Moses saw/The living God who gave the law;/And to Elijah, fasting, came/The steeds and chariots of flame."

It's also the idea in the back of J. R. R. Tolkien's head for *lembas*, the elven way-bread, that sustained Frodo and Sam into the heart of Mordor. It is more nourishing the less you mingle it with common foods. Tolkien was a devout believer (did you know that?)

While Lent isn't exactly forty days long whether or not you count Sundays, and whether or not you fast, the point is made. It's a time of trusting, of allowing God's providence to work its leisurely but unerring ways.

The organ has presented me with a kind of Lenten journey. When it finally failed, I switched to the piano. That faithful instrument is now showing its age and needs some TLC. By the time you read this, I hope we have a new portable digital keyboard that can be a temporary substitute for both, and a convenient alternative to my heavy digital piano.

I've been happy to share that keyboard with you all this time. But my back is no longer so sure it agrees with me. Your help and support, as always, are deeply appreciated and deeply affirming.

Lent always ends with Easter. Let's sustain one another with kindness and prayers and hard work till the bright day dawns and we shout our carols of joy. Keep up the wonderful work and thank you, always.

Electronic Giving Cards





Only 3 Niches Remain Available for Purchase in the Memorial Columbarium

Each niche allows for double or single interment with three purchase options: **Payment in Full = \$2,800** 12-Month Payment Option = \$250 / month for 12 months (\$3,000) 18-Month Payment Option = \$180 / month for 18 months (\$3,240)

We will need to consider constructing a 2^{nd} and 3^{rd} columbarium wall soon. The estimated cost for these two new walls is \$40,000+.




