AGENTS OF CARE

Long ago, in stories spoken around the sacred fire, and later, by words written on the sacred page, the idea of stewardship was planted within the Christian faith. The Genesis stories of creation, which were first spoken from one generation to the next, carry the amazing idea that human beings are to share in the creation's glory by becoming its stewards. We alone among all of the creatures which God created were given the challenge to love and care for this entire world. Unfortunately, as our history shows, this amazing gift of trust was translated through human hubris so that instead of learning to care for God's creation, we were told we were given the right to dominate it and even to destroy it if we saw fit. Now within these recent years, forced by the reality of Earth's degradation, we have returned once more to the Genesis idea of stewardship as care and trust.

As I think about stewardship in the life of the church, I think of it far beyond the giving of money. For Christians, stewardship is the process by which we awaken to God's great gift of trust and love to us. Stewardship is God's call to us to learn how to love beyond that which we alone possess. It asks us to reach out to others in care and love; it asks us to use Earth's resources with care and thought for the next generation; it asks us to discover what special gifts God has given to us that we can use to "steward" or care for the community; it asks us to be creative with our time and effort, so that we leave a faithful and fruitful path.

As you and I think about this coming stewardship year, let's reflect on the ways in which we, as a faith community, use our gifts of time, talent, and money for the nurture and care of others and the world. As we use our building in support of dozens of community groups, let's be creative in how we can make the building safer, stronger, and more energy efficient. As we reach out to others, let's consider if there are more or better ways that we can reflect the love and trust of God. As we consider our individual involvement, let's ask ourselves if there are areas in which we need to grow so that we can become better stewards of what God has given to us; do we need to learn more, enter into silence more, participate more, or even rest more?

Stewardship is God's call to you and me to live beyond ourselves. It is God's reminder that each of us is called to participate creatively in the gift of God's creation in such a way that it is at least as strong and healthy as when we found it. Our community of faith is part of that great story of creation, and together we can learn how to be good stewards of all that God has given to us.



Hug Happenings

News of the Prayer Shawl Ministry (PSM)

As another month rolls by, so do our gifts from the church. The cards and notes still roll in, telling us how wonderful our “hugs” have been received and how much they are appreciated. Even people who got them a year or two ago still tell us how they use them.

We continue to thank everyone for the donation of yarn and gift cards which help us to purchase the yarn that becomes shawls or lap robes.

I recently found that there is something else, a little easier, that we can do to use up our leftover yarn. It is called a “pocket prayer shawl.” It is about five inches squared and usually has either a cross crocheted into its center or a charm attached to it. The pocket prayer shawls are given to the military; many of them place them inside their helmets or into pockets on their pants legs so the prayers for safety go with them. They are also given to nursing home patients who might leave a large shawl on their bed but like the security of carrying one with them during the day. They are also given to those facing surgery, as they can usually hold one as they enter the operating room and find it with them when they wake up in recovery. I am gathering some patterns, but I know, with our ladies talents, we will be designing and making up our own.

The poem below was found by Nancy Mason and shared with us. Since we love to call our shawls “hugs,” I found this poem very appropriate to go with our folders when we give them out. Nancy said someone gave her a copy of it on a wallet-size card, which she photocopied and shared with me at church. I hope you like it as much as I do. Thank you, Nancy, and to everyone who so kindly keeps us (and our nimble fingers) in your prayers and who always looks to see how we can make our ministry better and better.

"Ashley's Journey" will include chemo through June or July, and we will truly need those prayers to carry us through 'til then.

Habitat and PresbyBuild News

“Beautiful Day in the Neighborhood Tour” for Presbyterians Saturday, January 21

PresbyBuild and Habitat for Humanity of Greater Newburgh are sponsoring a “Beautiful Day in the Neighborhood Tour” on Saturday, January 21 from 9:30 a.m. to 12:00 p.m.

Aboard a comfortable Leprechaun bus, the tour begins with a presentation at Habitat’s Kimball Building, then joins Habitat volunteers on their morning break, and then tours Habitat sites, including all of the PresbyBuild’s sites and a working site.

This is a great opportunity to see the extraordinary work of Habitat Newburgh and PresbyBuild. Habitat recently dedicated its fiftieth house, and PresbyBuild will be starting its fifth house in 2012!

Sometimes a simple act of kindness takes on a life of its own.

That’s the message in the illustrated children’s book The Carpenter’s Gift, which is the story of Henry, a young boy growing up in Depression-era New York. At the end of a day selling Christmas trees in Midtown Manhattan with his out-of-work father, Henry gives a leftover tree to nearby construction workers. The workers decorate it on the spot with tin cans and paper garlands, and the tree becomes the very first Rockefeller Center Christmas tree. That moment ends up changing Henry’s life.

The story celebrates the magic of an American icon, the annual Christmas tree at Rockefeller Center. Each year, that tree is milled into lumber that Habitat volunteers use to build a home for a family like Henry’s. The book honors the fruitful partnership and shares a lesson about the importance of generosity and helping our neighbors.

The 2010 Rockefeller Center Christmas tree was used this year in the construction of a Habitat home at 46 East Parmenter Street in Newburgh. The “Rockefeller tree house” will be dedicated December 10. The author of The Carpenter’s Gift will be present.
