FEBRUARY USHERS IN THE LENTEN SEASON

Ash Wednesday, February 17, starts us on our Lenten journey of soul-searching. At the 7:00 p.m. service, we come before the Lord to acknowledge that “from dust we are and to dust we shall return.” Receiving ashes is a voluntary act meant only to remind us of our humanity and shortcomings in the eyes of God. We are contrite; we are humble; we bow. We vow to begin anew with self-examination of our lives and what needs to be set right. We live in this spirit through the six Sundays of Lent.



The season of Lent has always provided Christians worldwide the opportunity to participate in a small way in the sufferings endured by our Lord during his forty-day fast in the desert, when he prepared for his ensuing death and resurrection. Some branches of Christianity sacrifice something during this time while others take an approach that is more reflective in the search for meaning in life. Whatever approach you may take, consider at least devoting some time each week to reflect upon your life; take stock of where you have been and where you are headed. Does your path feel right for you? Are there changes or adjustments necessary? Pray for discernment, ask for guidance, and express your gratitude for the life you have been given.

During this time, our music will reflect two themes: (1) being contrite and searching and (2) celebrating the hope that God gives us through His Son. Our chancel choir will be reprising some of our favorite anthems, which were uplifting in nature and drew us closer in our relationship with God. I feel it is needed at this time in our lives. We live in uncertainty on a daily basis; we need strength and hope in the future.

Come to church on Sunday; worship; give yourself over to the music, readings, and sermons; allow your soul to be nurtured by what you find here. By our presence, we minister and lift up others who may need a lift. Sometimes you just feel better by having been around people who are singing, laughing at coffee hour, catching up on the week, making committee plans, picking up devotional booklets from the table, speaking kind words—it's fellowship. We need each other desperately in these times of isolation. Come and connect. Feed your soul for the week ahead. Open up and give of yourself, and you will be blessed in return.

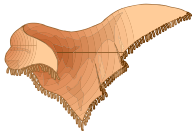

HUG HAPPENINGS

News of the Prayer Shawl Ministry (PSM)

At the time this is being composed, we are about to start the YARN DRIVE in our church and our community to replenish our supplies of yarns to make our shawls, lap robes, and baby blankets. I am sure everyone will be generous, so our outreach will continue. Many shawls are still leaving our church doors, even though our ladies cannot seem to find the right day to meet and catch up. Everyone is working at home—which is a good thing, as the need continues.

Most recently, a shawl was given to a single, working mom, who has taken into her home her ill parents. She also has her twenty-plus-year-old son at home, and he is a recent cancer survivor but has developed seizures. He will have brain surgery in January, and hopefully the seizures will stop. She truly needed a hug. Another shawl was sent to a woman who just learned she has only six months to live. Her cancer is inoperable and she is trying to tie up all the loose ends of her life. A third shawl went to a widow who lost her beloved husband—suddenly, after fifty-seven years of marriage. One also went to a gentleman who has a serious illness that will most likely take his life. As you can see, our arms are open and we are blessed to be able to be the hugs that so many people need.

It would be wonderful if we didn't have to make these gifts for times of hardship, but isn't it wonderful that so many people get these gifts from us? Many are people most of us do not know, but they send us notes on how these simple acts of kindness lifted their spirits and helped them through rough times in their lives. Many of the cards bring you to tears with the kind words they send.

If you want to be part of this ministry but you do not want to actually create the shawls, you may donate some (acrylic) yarn, and we will be honored to create something special that will give someone some hope in a low time of his or her life. We also accept gift cards and are in need of pretty gift bags (gently-used are just fine), pretty folders in which to put some prayers, and tissue paper in which to wrap our gifts. I think we are getting well known, as I have been often referred to as "that shawl lady," along with the other ladies in our group.

Thank you in advance for helping us touch the lives of so many. Consider yourselves hugged.

MISSION: VOLUNTEERING OPPORTUNITIES



The Mission Committee is excited about offering three different experiences to help make a positive difference in the lives of others. Join in on one or more of these projects.

HABITAT IN NEWBURGH: Habitat works in inner-city neighborhoods with peoples of mixed racial and socioeconomic backgrounds. Since their meager beginnings in 1999, they have made great strides. Over thirty-five houses have been built and are now occupied by proud, deserving families. Site selection is strategically chosen to facilitate positive resurgence of neighborhoods. Current projects now include “Women Build,” “Mike’s House,” in memory of Mike Levine, and “EpiscoBuild.”

The fourth PresbyBuild house is about to begin. It is funded by thirteen area churches of which we are part. It is our hope that members of the congregation will help in whatever way they can. While there is always a need for those with construction skills, there are many more opportunities to help at Habitat. One can greet and orient volunteers on site, help remove debris and recyclables, organize tools and equipment, make truck runs, set up refreshments for the site volunteers, help in the office with mailings, process data, or perform other office duties. These are the committees that need dedicated volunteers: Family Selection, Family Support, Site Selection, Building, Faith Restore, Public Relations, Development, Volunteer Relations and Cultivation, Volunteer Recognition, and Fundraiser.

Work at the site is done from 8:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. on Saturdays and Wednesdays. There are usually several sites being worked on at one time, so volunteers are usually assigned to where they are needed the most. **Before starting, volunteers must complete a volunteer form and call Habitat at 568-6035 to get an assignment.** (The forms are available in the church office and online at www.habitatnewburgh.org (click on the Volunteer.Hub button).) **Carol Gabella will be heading for Newburgh to volunteer one Saturday a month. If you would like to ride along, please speak with Carol.**

HOLMES PRESBYTERIAN CAMP AND CONFERENCE CENTER: At this beautiful 550-acre site, it is always an opportunity for a one-day or weekend “work camp.” It is the home of Denton Lake and Westminster Lake, where we have enjoyed Christian education picnics in the past. There is always a need for groups to paint, clear trails, mow lawns, garden, and do odd jobs. The box below includes some projects that need to be addressed this spring.



- Complete porch roof at Denton Dining Hall (roof over a ramp, mostly framed, needs to be finished with sheeting boards and shingles)
- Repair latticework under the lodge porches (this is the location where Presbytery meets each summer)
- Work on the small bridge on the orange trail over a muddy spot and the walkway on the red/blue trail near the office

Notify Carol Gabella if you would like to head any of these projects. She will help coordinate the event with Peter Surgenor and round up volunteers. All volunteers must complete an application. (Applications are available in the church office or by calling 845-878-6383. The Holmes camp is about a forty-five-minute drive from Goshen.

PRESBYTERIAN DISASTER ASSISTANCE: Olive Tree, New Orleans, Louisiana



A church work team is currently being organized to help rebuild homes this summer near New Orleans, where thousands lost their homes after the devastating hurricanes that struck in the past four years.

Skills needed include being able to do basic home repair; paint; put up sheetrock; and install windows, cabinets, plumbing fixtures, and siding. Our work will be assigned to us per the skill sets that we bring. Those who don't feel "skilled" will have plenty to do as helpers, and we plan to get some free training this spring from our local home improvement stores.

Our church work team is growing. If you think you might be interested in joining us, please contact Sue Varden, the team leader. This is open to anyone sixteen or older.

The group will be staying at Olive Tree Presbyterian Volunteer Village in a former Presbyterian church in east New Orleans. Our work week will be June 28 through July 1. We are working through the Presbyterian Disaster Assistance program.

MIDNIGHT RUN

The Midnight Run will be held on the night of February 19. This worthwhile cause benefits the homeless in New York City in many ways. We bring to them good, used clothing; blankets; soup; coffee; and sandwiches. Most importantly, we bring our ministry of caring and compassion to those that we see. For many, we are one of the few trusted groups with which they can interact and know that they are safe. The most common words that are heard from the folks we help are "Thank you" and "God bless you!"

The people for whom we are caring that night are literally living on the streets with no clothing, food, or, obviously, shelter in freezing weather. They come from every religion and race. They are former salesmen, lawyers, medical staff, laborers, etc.—every day human beings like us. In the current economy, this could be any one of us in the blink of an eye.

We need your help. We are looking for good, used clothing; shoes; hats; scarves; gloves; coats; blankets; and NEW underwear and undershirts in men's sizes (M–XL). Those items can be left on the stage in Fellowship Hall. We will also need some help with prepping and buying lunch bags of sandwiches, cookies, etc., to take to these folks. The trip is very safe and efficiently organized and will include members of the Presbyterian Church in Cornwall.

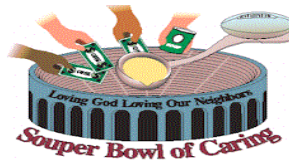
