Faith Matters

"The believers devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching, to the community, to their shared meals, and to their prayers. A sense of awe came over everyone....

Every day, they met together in the temple and ate in their homes.

They shared food with gladness and simplicity.

They praised God and demonstrated God's goodness to everyone."

(Acts 2:42-43a, 46 Common English Bible)

My Dear Goshen Presbyterian Friends and Family,

Whenever I read this passage about the early church, I am reminded of just how engaged the new believers were with God, with each other, and with the larger community. I've lived in a lot of neighborhoods in my life; some of which were very "neighborly" and some of which were not! In truth, though, I don't know that any of those neighborhoods would have evoked *awe* despite the goodnatured individuals who made their homes there. I suppose that's why this text from the Acts of the Apostles moves me so much with its message of devotion to both God and neighbor as a meaningful piece of our Christian heritage and discipleship.

The early Christians trusted that their baptisms gave them a spiritual identity unlike any other and they were grateful to share their thanksgivings for a new life in Christ by giving freely of themselves in rich, full ways on behalf of the same Lord who came into the world to transform us. I've had some parishioners in bible study say, somewhat lightheartedly, that this chapter of Acts reads like a socialist manifesto, especially verses 44 and 45:

All the believers were united and shared everything. They would sell pieces of property and possessions and distribute the proceeds to everyone who needed them.

But, in doing so, they've missed the point. Luke isn't talking about a political, social, and economic system of enforced norms. He is sharing with us a vision of a community in which there was so much joy in having been blessed with the depth and breadth of the Christian faith that they chose to "give back" to Christ. They freely gave of themselves in powerful ways to make a difference in the lives of God's beloved children. It may be hard for us to imagine a climate of such enduring generosity in a "dog eat dog" world. But when we parse out these verses, we see that the many "action words" provide

a good picture of how the early believers responded to the gift of an Easter faith through mutual disciplines of worship, prayer, study, fellowship, and the sharing of resources.

This is what every church strives to work toward—being a community that, like a thriving neighborhood or, better yet, a healthy family, deeply commits itself to loving the One who is most dearly and nearly revealed to us in Christ, and to loving our neighbors all around. Perhaps our lives today don't allow for daily worship; but that doesn't stop us from attending to the same disciplines as the Acts church.

As we approach the season of Lent, I invite you to reflect on how you might use the spiritual disciplines of worship, prayer, study, fellowship, and stewardship to embody your faith as your serve Christ at home, at work, at church, and in your neighborhoods.

Trusting that we are called to devote ourselves to Christ in much the same way as the Acts Church, the Session has approved a new Mission Statement that speaks to what we believe we are called to do as we seek to serve our neighbors with energy, intelligence, imagination, and love. This is our calling. This is our faith. This is what we do:

Season of Lent

The Season of Lent will soon be upon us. The word Lent is related to another word, Lengthen, and calls to mind the gift of lengthening hours of sunlight as we move toward a summer equinox. Lent is a 40-day season (not counting Sundays—which are considered "mini-Easters"), and it represents the time of Christ's temptation in the wilderness where he fasted and faced daily temptations with prayer, conviction, and courage. Lent is intended to be a season of reflection, for both individual Christians and for the church. We reflect on who and whose we are in Jesus Christ. We pray for guidance through the trials of life and we hold fast to hope as we come to trust that Easter will bring with it yet one more reminder that nothing can separate us from the love of God—not even death. We'll put our "Alleluias" on hold for the season of Lent and sing hymns of repentance, discipleship, honor, and trust in a God who's giving and living is eternal. Join us each Sunday @ 9:30am.

Sacred music, as an ancient hymn tells us, opens us to the "sober intoxication" of the Holy Spirit. It binds us in community, it energizes our soul into a deep calm. It's an anti-distraction. May our Lenten music help us hear what Dylan Thomas meant when he wrote: "There was calm to be done in His safe unrest."

The organ still needs the new Mixture, which had to be separately constructed. When that comes, Austin will also take care of the chimes and a few other items that have to be seen to. I'm already planning a dedication recital—date and time to be determined.

I've read some articles about the difficulty churches are having returning to pre-2020 attendance levels. Slowly but surely, we must continue to rebuild and take charge of our destiny again. Lent reminds us of that destiny: that we must carry our cross and suffer with the Lord in order to rise and reign with Him.

So, come back and bring a friend! The choir can use you, handbells can use you, and every single other church ministry can use you! What better time to start!

I was moved, as you might expect, by the death of Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI. His main theme was that the Christian faith is *reasonable*. It cannot be a paranoid rejection of science, but must speak of the reasonable Creator who makes science possible in the first place. *Come, let us reason together, says the Lord* (Isaiah 1:18). Without faith, reason is all dressed up and has nowhere to go. Without reason, faith is timid and defensive. Also, Benedict's lifelong love of music—especially piano and organ—always encouraged me.

Just think how the organ merges science and faith! I'm looking forward to sharing some new sounds with you soon. Let's "boogie down the pounds" together this Lent—for real!

If you would rather stay out of camera range, please know that we do not capture the seating under the balcony (on either side) and we don't capture the back rows at all. Regarding the Children's Message: We keep the camera zoomed out. As children leave to go to Sunday school, we will pan up to the stained glass windows so no children's faces are caught on camera.

Our Annual Church World Service Blanket Drive will be held in February. Each blanket cost \$10.00 but whether you can give \$1.00 or \$100.00 or more, all will be sent in to help blanket someone in warmth and caring. Please watch for announcements in church and online.

Your gift will support two types of Church World Service Blankets: Woolen blankets are waterresistant and flame-retardant. They are extremely durable, warm and great for frigid temperatures or other extreme weather conditions. Fleece blankets are water repellent, durable, warm and soft. These blankets keep families covered but suitable for warmer weather. The blankets are distributed to folks in the USA as well as world-wide-victims of floods, fires, earthquakes, homelessness, and refugees.

Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC) to be Elected January 29th

The Pastor Nominating Committee will be elected at a special congregational meeting following worship on January 29th. Please keep the PNC in your prayers and exercise patience in awaiting their updates. The first task of the PNC will be to review the CAT report and the Transition Team Report, assess the church's ministry and identity, determine pastoral needs, establish criteria for determining which candidates might be a good match for the church, and write a Ministry Information Form for circulation to pastors seeking a new call. Once they begin receiving communiqués from denominational headquarters and potential candidates, they will review those Personal Information Forms (PIFs) and narrow down the search to a few pastors for interview. (Pastor Rhonda often teases that this process is a lot like going on Match.com to find a suitable partner!)

The Rev. Judy Anderson of the Florida church will be the presbytery liaison to the PNC. Judy is a member of the presbytery's transition team and she successfully guided the Interim Pastor Nominating Committee in their work two years ago.

There is no deadline for calling a pastor. But that doesn't mean that the search will go on interminably. The PNC will meet regularly to find an excellent candidate for service as your next pastor. And that candidate will be brought before the congregation for vote before they are installed. Being a member of a PNC is a big responsibility, to be sure. But when done well, the process affords the opportunity for a new relationship between pastor and congregation that promises to be refreshing, renewing, and purposeful. So, get those prayers going!

Make Some lagnets

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
- a tube of refrigerated breadstick dough
