Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

“Do not let your hearts be troubled, and do not let them be afraid.” John 14:27

“Can any of you by worrying add a single hour to your life? Matthew 6:27

Jesus taught, “Do not worry...can any of you by worrying add a single hour to your life?” Worry, for us, has become a national pastime. We worry over everything from the cleanliness of our homes to the state of the economy. While some of our worries are justified, most of our worries never come to pass. We spend hours fretting over what we fear may happen, and then, so often, it never happens. Instead of adding an hour to our lives, through our worrying, probably most of us have succeeded in taking an hour from our lifespan!

When Jesus said, “Do not worry,” he said it because he knew we all worry. And knowing this, he taught us how to become free from the grip of worry. The point of his teaching is that worry isn't to be the center of our lives; it isn't to be the core out of which we live and make decisions. The implication in his teaching is that the core of our lives is to be rooted in trust: trusting life, trusting God, trusting time. Of course, you and I know that this is exactly the opposite of what we are trained to believe by our culture, our entertainment, our media, our schools, and our workplaces. We are taught and even bombarded with the messages that time is running out; don't trust the stranger or even your neighbor; danger is everywhere. Jesus taught us that the antidote to fear and worry is trust. Trust opens the soul; worry closes and batters it.

Fear is the sibling of worry. Its causes are the same as worry's, but it is more potent. Notice how many times Jesus said, “Do not be afraid.” He knew the power that fear could have in our hearts. When he taught, “Do not be afraid,” again he did not mean to not experience fear. We will all experience fear in our lives. He meant that fear isn't to be the place or core out of which we live or make our decisions about life. In other words, fear is not to be the root of our lives. Worry and fear are two highly charged emotions that are helpful in short, tight spots, but they were never meant to be “on” all the time.

So what does Jesus teach us to do? He calls us to trust. To trust in him, in God, and in the life God has so freely given to us. Trust is a verb, and here it also means to find the balance point in our lives so that when worry and fear are with us, we aren't undone by them. Trust, as Jesus teaches it, is about realizing that we aren't alone in our lives as if we were Atlas and had to hold the whole thing up by ourselves. Trust in God is what gives us balance in life. Trust lets us respond to the world we live in, with all of its fearful events, without losing our sense of wholeness in Christ. Trust is knowing that at the center of all things is the heart and love of God. When that trust sinks into our lives in real ways, then we begin to trust God for our time on this good earth. We begin to feel a bit of courage and the slow opening of our hearts to others.

Coming to this place of trust, in which we can hold fear and worry but not be overcome by it, may take some people years. For others, it may happen next week. Either way, we are called by Jesus to risk this journey to trust, in faith. For the place of trust is where balance happens in our lives. It is where the wholeness that God calls us to in life is found. It is where our worries and fears are overcome by our experiences of God's presence in our lives. And all of this stands in full opposition to what we are led to believe by so many others. When trust is at the center of our lives, the tables are turned and the power of God in us and around us becomes the core of our very being. That's why Jesus could say to us, “Be not afraid. I am with you.”

JANUARY ALLOWS THE LIGHT OF CHRIST TO GROW IN OUR HEARTS

It was a snowy, stormy Christmas week this year. Mother Nature often has plans that do not coincide with ours, so we yield and do our best under whatever circumstances in which we find ourselves.

We have received the Light of Christ on Christmas morning. His incarnation is complete. Our task now, as we move into the new year of 2010, is to allow this light to grow in each of us, to bring it forth into the world, and to illumine our path as we live each day. Can others see the Light of Christ in us? How can we make a difference in others' lives? How can we bring forth peace in our fractured world?



In Judaism and Christianity, a white dove is generally a sign for peace. Noah released a dove after the Great Flood in order to find land. The dove returned, carrying an olive branch in its beak, telling Noah that the flood had receded and there was land once again for man. The dove in flight bearing an olive branch is a motif representing "hope for peace" and even a peace offering from one to another, as in the phrase "extend an olive branch." Often, the dove is represented as still in flight to remind the viewer of its role as a messenger of peace. How can we as Christians be messengers of peace to a broken world? Can we bear the olive branch and extend it to others? This Christmas gift from God, the gift of His Son, comes with a responsibility. Let us reflect on what we can do to live peace, to be peace, to spread it in our everyday lives.

We move through January with the celebration of Epiphany on Sunday, January 3 (it actually falls on Wednesday, January 6—twelve days after Christmas), a feast day on which we commemorate the coming of the Wise Men to present their gifts to the Christ child. They recognized his divinity and responded with gifts of gratitude. Can we do no less in response to the birth of Christ in our hearts?



Our music ministry program continues as we live through the darkness and cold of winter. We will rejoice and sing our way through the winter, bringing joy and lifting spirits as we come together in our corporate worship on Sunday mornings. We hope you will be there to support the choir with your presence as we lead the congregation in song and combine our voices in making a "joyful noise."

We will be taking a break during the bad weather, but we'll resume again in March with enthusiasm and plans for an exciting spring.

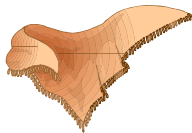

HUG HAPPENINGS

NEWS OF THE PRAYER SHAWL MINISTRY

Our prayer shawl ministry continues to grow and flourish, but we are in need of your help to keep moving forward. Since February is the "*month of love*" with Valentine's Day, we are asking each of you to do something for us, so that the love can continue flowing from our church doors. It takes approximately fifteen to eighteen ounces of yarn to make a nice-sized shawl or a lap robe, and we are hoping that each person in the church would buy just one skein for the ministry. Now, you don't have to make it...just supply us with some nice acrylic yarn, and we will do the work.

We are challenging each member or visitor that comes to our services to bring just *one skein of yarn* (color of your choice) in the month of February. That gives you twenty-eight days to purchase a skein of yarn. We will collect them all and then the challenge of the shawl ministry will be to create wonderful and colorful shawls to distribute to those who need hugs. Just think, each time we get three skeins of yarn, we will be able to help someone who needs a little love. The more yarn we collect, the more hugs that will leave our church doors. Of course, our ladies will be working their magic hooks to get the job done, but it is a pleasure for all of us. Up to this point, over 425 hugs have been distributed from Goshen, and we want to get to the 500 mark before December of 2010.

We will have several collection baskets in the church in February for the yarn. You are not limited to one skein each, either, if a family might want to donate more than that. We will take *all we can get*. Yarns can be purchased at stores such as Walmart, Target, AC Moore, Michaels, and Jo-Ann Fabrics, among others. Colors aren't important, as each color represents something. For example, blue is *healing*, green is *hope*, pink is *friendship*, red is *love*, white is *peace*, yellow is *happiness*, and so forth. We usually find wonderful combinations of colors in which to make the shawls so that each is unique. No two are ever exactly alike.

So, take the challenge, buy a skein of yarn, bring it to church in February, and help us to continue to spread some love. We will sincerely appreciate your support.

NEWS ABOUT MISSION OPPORTUNITIES IN 2010

The First Presbyterian Church of Goshen, through its Mission Committee, is arranging two opportunities for members of its congregation to volunteer in the United States in 2010.

A church work team will be organized to help rebuild and restore homes in New Orleans, where the needs are immense as a result of the 2008 hurricanes that hit the Gulf Coast. Working through the Presbyterian Disaster Assistance program, and partnering with the Presbytery of South Louisiana, the work team will stay at Olive Tree Presbyterian Volunteer Village in a former Presbyterian church in east New Orleans. A worksite manager will assign the work for the week (June 28–July 1) depending on the skills of the team. Anyone in the congregation, sixteen years of age and older, is invited to join the church work team.

A “closer-to-home” opportunity is being arranged for families with younger children (under sixteen years of age). Holmes Presbyterian Camp & Conference Center, about forty miles from Goshen on the east side of the Hudson River, is in need of work teams to help refurbish and prepare the buildings and grounds for another busy summer camp season. The work will be needed in the spring months before summer camp opens. Bunk housing is provided.

Monday mornings with a mission

Olive Tree Village Gears Up Volunteers for a Week In the Gulf

New Orleans, LA – For some, Monday mornings signal the end of fun, relaxing weekends. But for the volunteers gathered here March 9, it was the energetic beginning of a week filled with mission.

Presbyterian Disaster Assistance's Olive Tree volunteer village is in the former Eastminster Presbyterian Church here. Located about 30 minutes from the French Quarter, south of Lake Pontchartrain and north of the Lower Ninth Ward and St. Bernard's Parish, Olive Tree is in the heart of much of the worst hurricane impact.

The village can house 90 people at a time and is equipped with shower and bathroom trailers as well as a large indoor kitchen.

“If you weren’t here, people would go without homes,” PDA Coordinator Randy Ackley told a group of volunteers on a recent visit here.

During a brief orientation, leaders explained the basic organizational structure of Olive Tree’s operation: A construction manager oversees four to six houses at a time, traveling back and forth between them during the day to make sure all is running smoothly. Each site also has two construction assistants who stay at the houses all day and provide instruction to volunteers. Also at each house is a folder that includes contact information for managers, assistants, and homeowners as well as maps to local supply stores and notes from past groups about progress or problems.

After the orientation, groups headed outside, where they had a quick session with their construction assistants to learn about the week’s tasks. From there, they piled into trucks and vans and headed out to get to work.

“A fun challenge”

At one house that day, volunteers were learning how to hang sheetrock. Robinson Warner, one of the construction assistants and a Louisiana Delta Service Corps volunteer with the Presbytery of South Louisiana’s Project Homecoming, used a fun and knowledgeable teaching style, answering questions with skill while putting first-timers at ease.

Just eight months ago, Warner himself was new to construction work. After graduating from college, he answered a Project Homecoming ad on Craigslist and ended up moving from New Hampshire to Louisiana. Although he had no construction skills when he arrived, he credits his construction manager and Project Homecoming co-workers as being great trainers.

Working with all levels of skills is part of the job, Warner said, adding that he wants to make all volunteers feel confident and at ease.

“It’s a fun challenge to be able to mesh those levels of experience,” he said, pausing to offer guidance to volunteers using a new tool. “You have to be a teacher and a student when you’re in this job.”

Warner had been to New Orleans before, both prior to and after Hurricane Katrina, and was interested in doing recovery work. He said he didn’t do enough community service in college and was motivated to give back.

“Why not do something for someone else? I feel spoiled. I feel almost too lucky,” he said, adding that he’s considering staying another year. “I’m hopelessly head over heels for this city and the people of New Orleans.”

Since starting with Project Homecoming, Warner has worked on six houses and been part of the completion of four. One of the best parts of the job is interacting with homeowners, especially seeing their reaction to a rebuilt house, he said.

“When we come into the house, it’s still only a dream for them,” he said. “It’s a blessing to have them be part of the work.”

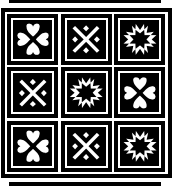
