“Faith Matters: Beloved Community” Summer 2022

“Let us love one another, for love comes from God. Everyone who loves has been born of God and knows God. Whoever does not love does not know God, because God is love. ... No one has ever seen God; but if we love one another, God lives in us and his love is made complete in us.”
(1 John 4:7-8, 12)

My dear friends,

There was an article in a recent issue of *Christianity Today* about the church as “Beloved Community” that really captured my attention. As you know, the pandemic has fostered a great deal of struggle for the Church of Jesus Christ in the U.S., Canada, and throughout much of the Northern Hemisphere. Many congregations that were already struggling with low energy and a waning sense of purpose pre-pandemic are now in dire straits. The number of church closures among what were once known as “mainline” congregations is at an all-time high. And anxiety has prompted fissures over secondary issues because the primary issue—the future life of the church—seems too challenging an issue to tackle.

Adding to that struggle the additional layer of the church having become synonymous with things like clergy abuse, hypocrisy, legalism, racism, gender conflict, intolerance and prejudices against persons of another ethnicity or gender identity, the situation has become even more grim because fewer and fewer people deign to walk through the doors of a church much less becoming part of a faith community.

But there is another way to live and be as the body of Christ. The late 19th century philosopher Josiah Royce developed the concept of “Beloved Community,” which was later popularized by the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

Dr. King taught and pursued a way of life in Christ in which “love and trust will triumph over fear and hatred.” The principles of Beloved Community as King described them are rooted in Scripture and provide a “kingdom-shaped framework for a richer way of living life together. They’re built around the love of Christ, love of others, redemption, reconciliation, nonviolence, and shared power.”*

Beloved Community is one that embodies love by honoring the image of God in every human being. To that end, Beloved Communities embody love by listening with the heart and an open mind, thereby creating room for empathy and compassion for others.

Beloved Community is one that fosters an active spirituality, allowing the dynamic Spirit of God to work in us and through us for the sake of the Kingdom. Such spirituality begins in worship, but it can't end there if it is to grow and thrive. Such spirituality means being in conversation with God and others around topics that may not be "easy" to discuss but are important to understanding who we are in relation to God and what God intends for the church of Jesus Christ at this time in human history. Such spirituality means being intentional about prayer, bible study, and Christian fellowship that enriches the soul as much as it delights the heart.

Beloved Community is one that strives to resolve conflicts peacefully—understanding, of course, that conflict is as much a part of the church "family system" as it is any other "family system." And if the church is to be healthy, we must not ignore our conflicts or, worse yet, intensify our conflicts. Rather, we must find a way to create healthy space for the Spirit to enter into those conflicts to help us resolve our issues peacefully. "We cannot do this work on our own; we must rely on the power of the Holy Spirit."*

Like me, you undoubtedly see signs of Beloved Community in our congregation already in the way that we show Christ-like love to others around us: welcoming the stranger, sharing in the warmth of fellowship, being present for one another in times of grief or transition, and taking our love out into the world by addressing poverty, hunger, substandard housing, and homelessness. The Holy Spirit is already moving and shaping our Beloved Community in the way of love, and the Spirit will help us grow our community further as we seek to embrace Christ's kingdom-shaped way of life.

In "The Role of the Church in Facing the Nation's Chief Moral Dilemma" in 1957, Dr. King spoke of what he believed to be his ultimate goal:

"The end is reconciliation; the end is redemption; the end is the creation of the beloved community. It is this type of spirit and this type of love that can transform opposers into friends. The type of love that I stress here ... is agape which is understanding goodwill for all men. It is an overflowing love which seeks nothing in return. It is the love of God working in the lives of men. This is the love that may well be the salvation of our civilization."

The world may see the church as hypocritical and intolerant, but we know there is another way to live and be as the body of Christ. It is the way of Beloved Community.

Kimberly Deckel, a priest in the Anglican Church in North America and executive pastor at Church of the Cross in Austin, Texas, wrote this for our consideration:

"The need for healthier churches is undeniable. It requires us to think creatively and to learn from others who have faithfully pressed into this type of work. It is not easy, but it is work rooted in the love of Jesus and the values of his kingdom—and it can help the church be known as a place of peace, justice, and health, as it should be....I believe the principles of beloved community can speak a word of hope to us. By the power of the Holy Spirit, it is possible for this type of community to be realized and for the church to be known for its agape love."

Loving one another with a love that comes from God, may we choose to embrace the model of Beloved Community that Christ modeled, Dr. King taught, and Pastor Deckel affirms.

If we are to successfully move into a new day in ministry, we must better understand who we are, how we function, and what it means to be ministry partners in a Beloved Community. We are thankful for all those who've participated in our "Coffee Hour Table Conversations" and we ask that you continue to do so. If you have not participated in these conversations as yet, please make it a point to do so. We need to hear your "voice" if our work is to be thorough and compelling. Look forward to our continued work over the summer and into the fall. We hope to be able to make our recommendations to the Session sometime in the fall. And, to that end, we ask that you please keep the Transition Team in your prayers and participate in the process of discovery as it is laid out for us. Our results are only as good as your contributions afford.

The pandemic has presented financial struggles across the board—to households, businesses, non-profits, and churches alike. But the Finance & Administration Committee would like to give a big "shout-out" of gratitude to all of those who have continued to meet (or exceed) their pledges this year. Because of your generosity, we have been able to maintain worship (in-person and Livestream), keep paying our personnel, do proper upkeep and maintenance on the buildings, keep our mission obligations, assist those in need of care, and reengage some of the ministries we had to "put on hold" for over a year. You have made a difference and we are so grateful for your gifts of time, treasure and talent. Thank you. And we hope you will continue to maintain your pledge over the summer months.



As I write this—on the cool, September-like morning of the summer solstice—the Austin crew is hard at work in the organ loft. It's happening! After all of the trials of the last two years, it's really happening!

We knew this day would finally come, didn't we? As I've been fond of saying lately, faith is not there for decoration. It's there to get used, and ours has had quite a workout.

Once again, let me thank you for your generosity and support for this project. Thanks to you, we shall soon have a pipe organ that should sustain our singing and be a musical beacon to the community for many years to come.

The single largest part of the project is the intensive re-wiring. All of the substandard materials—and all of the good, but very old, materials—are out. New materials are going in. Brian, Jody, and George have stood out as exceptional helpers in this process, facilitating the removal of the old console and wiring. There have been many others, though, including those who have contributed financially and/or by their prayers and good wishes.

The big, obvious items—all of the rebuilt reed pipes, and of course the console—are soon to follow. As soon as I know when, I'll let you know. The pipework that's still in place needs attention, too. Some pipes are still blocked off with scotch tape—I'm not kidding! The single most important rank for hymn leadership, the First Open Diapason on the Great, has not been heard in almost twenty years. I hear the Austin guys blowing through them and murmuring, "Oh, this is going to be great!"

I hope, and I believe, that they're right.

Expect an organ that sounds almost exactly as it did in 1931. There will be no digital voices, including those that recently gave brilliance to the tone. We have been able to add a Swell Mixture which will help in that area, but the organ's basic nature—its DNA—is warm, broad, and sustaining. All options are being left open for the future, including future acquisition of more of the brilliant voices (they are generally called "mixtures"). So the organ, while complete, will also be potentially a "work in progress" to the extent we choose.

A word on the sanctuary piano. The grand piano we've used for so long, a gracious gift of Orra Wood, began to show signs of fatigue over the long winter. The dry air in the sanctuary didn't help, and the built-in humidifier didn't entirely succeed. The piano is resting, pending future action. In the meantime, I'm happy to continue sharing my Yamaha digital piano. Thanks again, and yet again, to Orra for her gift.

Looking forward to continuing our journey.





- Arrange raisins in a row on the peanut butter.

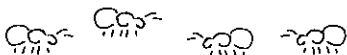


