## “Faith Matters: Warning—God is Here!”

My dear friends,

Our Transition Team will soon be tapping you on the shoulder for more input as they continue to make their way through the CAT report. (The Congregational Assessment Tool survey was taken by the congregation last summer, with a report shared by Holy Cow Consultant Michelle Snyder last fall.)

They may ask you to consider what drew you to this church, what inspires you to remain, and what you might do to inspire yourself and others as part of our shared ministry. We expect a wide variety of responses, all of which will be equally valid and equally noted because we trust that they will speak to *who* we are as a congregation and *whose* we are as beloved children of our great and gracious God.

It’s likely some of us are here because the church offers us a place and a space to commune with God. Or because it’s what we do—it’s been our church for years and will stay our church for years to come. Some may come because it offers a sense of community in a divided world, or because it’s a place of intersection between persons of similar faith orientations and disciplines. Some may come because the church’s connectional nature allows us to be missional in a way we could never be on our own, or because our involvement in the Body lends itself to a vital hearing of God’s intentions for our lives.

The reasons we belong are many and varied, and the Team looks forward to talking with you as it reflects on our core identity as a congregation.

But, of course, all responses will be studied against a backdrop of Reformed theology. For instance, the Westminster Catechism asks: “What is the chief end of man [humans]?” The answer? “To glorify God and *enjoy* him forever.” To *enjoy* God, in this sense, is not to experience a momentary blip of happiness, such as on date night or at a family reunion, but to be in a place of deep communion with God.

This *enjoyment* begins for us in worship. The middle section of our *Book of Order* contains a Directory for Worship which underscores our focus on glorifying God. The first paragraph reads:

*“Christian worship joyfully ascribes all praise and honor, glory and power to the triune God. In worship, the people of God acknowledge God present in the world and in their lives. As they respond to God’s claim and redemptive action in Jesus Christ, believers are transformed and renewed. In worship, the faithful offer themselves to God and are equipped for God’s service in the world.”*

Marvelous in imagery, these words describe the “worshipful work” of a Christian community dedicated to loving and serving a powerful, awe-inspiring, joy-provoking God who is deserving of our

praise and adoration. Don Hustad, writer and worship leader, suggests, somewhat whimsically, that a banner should be displayed over the entrance to any place of Christian worship saying, “Warning: God Is Here!”

God acts. In the world. In the church. In our lives. And God moves us, *compels us*, to act on Christ’s behalf, with an urging that begins in worship as we gather to celebrate the One who has shaped the lives of believers for thousands of years, providing guidance and direction yesterday, today, and tomorrow.

It is this God whom we worship and serve. It is this God whom we trust as being actively present in and through the Living Word, guiding us in a ministry of Christian discipleship that responds to the needs of the world around us. And it is this God whom we covenant to follow as we move from the safety of sacred space to the risky streets, schools, offices, and neighborhoods where life gets very real, very fast.

We live in a time where division is rampant on so many levels. If left unattended, these divisions will likely grow deeper and wider. But the cause for Christ is never one of fostering division. Even if we do not line up on every point of scriptural interpretation or church order, our calling is to work for the peace, unity, and purity of the church.\* A divided culture needs a united church.

Christian Blogger Carey Nieuwhof writes:

“Unity spreads. So does division. Build unity. After all, there is so much that divides us right now....*But...*and don’t miss this...there are far more things that unite us.”

I believe that to be true. There are far more things that unite us than divide us. And, as a people of faith, formed and transformed by God, we trust that we are loved without exception, equipped as both inspired and inspiring servants of the Lord, and sent forth to be the joyful body of Christ at work in the world meeting urgent needs with heartfelt compassion and doing “worshipful work” for the good of all humankind.

So, when you are asked, “Why are you here?,” I encourage you to share your story. Let the Spirit soar within you. Be an inspired voice. And pray that we will find, with time and God’s help, that the strength of our united voices speaks what the community so longs to hear: *God is here! Come, share our joy!*

\*All officers in the PC(USA) promise to further the peace, unity, and purity of the church. This vow springs from the Apostle Paul’s work in uniting a divided church. An article on PCUSA *Noodle* states:

The beautiful Chapter 13 in First Corinthians that is often read at weddings is really a rose among the thorns of a conflicted church. You can almost feel Paul’s weariness as he closes out this search for peace that spans two letters of the New Testament: “Finally, brothers and sisters, farewell. Put things in order, listen to my appeal, agree with one another, live in peace; and the God of love and peace will be with you. Greet one another with a holy kiss. All the saints greet you. (2 Corinthians 13:11-12, NRSV)” These serve as examples that the quest for peace, unity, and purity of the church is as old as the church itself.

## **County Executive Neuhaus presents Carly Glassé with May's Citizen of the Month Award**

Orange County Executive Steven M. Neuhaus has named SUNY Orange student Carly Glassé as May's Citizen of the Month Award recipient.

Glassé, of Goshen, was recognized for her many contributions at SUNY Orange and her dedication to the community. She was also honored at the County's Legislative session on Thursday, May 5<sup>th</sup>.

"Carly has had a positive impact on the college and our communities in multiple ways," Neuhaus said. "She serves as a role model to her peers, proving that going back to college at age 30 is challenging and difficult but possible. I know that Carly has a very bright future and are all proud of her commitment to making Orange County an even better place."

Over the past month, Glassé has received the SUNY Chancellor's Award for Student Excellence and was selected as one of only 20 community college students nationally to be named to the All-USA Today Academic Team, becoming the first SUNY Orange student ever to receive that honor. She was also named by Phi Theta Kappa (PTK) to its All-New York State Academic First Team and she is a semifinalist for the prestigious Jack Kent Cooke Foundation Transfer Student Scholarship.

Glassé, a regular member of the Dean's List at SUNY Orange with a 3.9 grade point average, will graduate this August with her degree in Business Administration. She intends to attend Pace University to pursue a bachelor's degree in business. At SUNY Orange, she serves as the student representative to the SUNY Orange Foundation Board of Directors and is a member of the Foundation Board's Alumni Committee. She is also vice president of both the College's chapter of PTK as well as the Business Club.

Glassé did not attend SUNY Orange until she was 30 years old, more than a decade after attending college at the Art Institute in Philadelphia. She decided to return to school during the COVID-19 pandemic. Glassé, a 2007 Warwick High graduate, worked as a Special Events Manager at Limoncello in Goshen and saw that the restaurant industry was struggling.

In addition to her studies, Glassé now works part-time at Safe Harbors of the Hudson. She has many other noteworthy accomplishments outside of the classroom.

In 2019, Glassé was presented with the Rising Star Award from the Orange County Junior League. The award recognizes men and women, between the ages of 21 and 41, who demonstrate outstanding leadership skills in their community, from the public, private, non-profit and/or volunteer sectors. A year later, in 2020, she received the Orange County Mental Health Association's Volunteer Service Award.

She was a mentor with the Big Brothers/Big Sisters program from 2014-2021, and also served as the president of Illuminate Goshen (a nonprofit based in Goshen N.Y.), a position in which she spearheaded and participated in many art-based community projects.

Glassé, who attended Warwick Valley High School, has volunteered for or led a variety of international humanitarian aid efforts, including Nicaragua Humanitarian Mission Trip - Bridges to Community in both 2015 and 2017; Mexico Humanitarian Mission Trip - Homes for Hope in 2017, and Dominican Republic Humanitarian Mission Trip - Bridges to Community in 2019. From 2017 through 2018 she was a project manager for a mission trip to Trebisht, Albania, to rebuild a fire-ravaged school. She enlisted a dozen

unaffiliated participants, most of whom had never taken part in a hands-on mission trip and raised more than \$80,000 for materials and travel expenses.

Glasse's dream is to run a non-profit organization that deals directly with making sure people have access to basic needs.

"This is yet another well-deserved honor in a long list of accolades that have come Carly's way in recent weeks, and I appreciate County Executive Neuhaus' recognition of Carly's contributions," said Dr. Kristine Young, SUNY Orange's President. "Carly is determined, motivated, and focused in everything she does, from academics to on-campus involvement to community service. Her compassion for others is remarkable and her energetic spirit is contagious. She has such a bright future ahead and has absolutely left a lasting mark on all of us who have met her at SUNY Orange."

Neuhaus introduced his Citizen of the Month Award, which acknowledges outstanding Orange County residents, in January of 2017. 
## Praise Posies



You will need:
