Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Session schedules celebrations of the Lord's Supper on most first Sundays of the month. In recent years, as the greater church has emphasized a more regular celebration of the sacrament, session has increased the number of times we celebrate the meal by celebrating it throughout all of Advent, the season of Lent, and during summer months. This brings us very close to the guidance of John Calvin: that it should be available whenever the Word is proclaimed.

On the first Sunday of each month, we celebrate with a served meal during which the bread and juice are brought to the congregants in their seats. On all the other Sundays, we celebrate the sacrament using a method called *intinction*, which is recognized as the oldest method of receiving the sacrament. **"Intinction: In Communion, the act of dipping a morsel of bread into the cup."** You will commonly find intinction used in congregations that celebrate the sacrament frequently or even weekly and also when the church gathers at Presbytery meetings, Synods, and at the General Assembly.

"Being called to the table rather than remaining fixed in place at a distance accents the fact that God's grace comes near to us and gathers us around. Moving to the table is reminiscent of our pilgrimage toward the heavenly city and the messianic banquet where people 'will come from east and west, from north and south, and will eat in the Kingdom of God' (Luke 13:29). Approaching the table also requires an act of volition—choosing to receive the gift of God—that is important to many as a weekly renewal of commitment" (*Companion to the Book of Common Worship*, p. 67). Remember that the table at the front of the sanctuary is the Communion table and not an altar. The table is set for the special meal, and during the intinction service, we come to the table as a family of faith.

Here are some practical suggestions: 1) Follow the directions of the ushers. 2) Maintain silence in an attitude of prayer. 3) Take a piece of the bread and dip a small portion of it into the cup. 4) Respond to the taking of the bread with "Amen" or "Thanks be to God." 5) Return to the pew and continue in prayer until all are served.

It is always acceptable for a person to remain in the pew because of preference or disability. Ushers aware of those who do not come forward can direct servers to these people.

I once mentioned that I find serving by intinction to be especially meaningful for me because it allows me to be in closer contact with the congregation and to serve members directly, instead of "presiding" as I do during the other celebrations of the Lord's Supper. We are a community of Christ in the sacrament, no matter how it is served.

MARCH—LENT CONTINUES INTO HOLY WEEK AND RESURRECTION

In March, we continue our Lenten journey for the first three Sundays, still reflecting upon our lives and the changes we might need to make as we prepare for Holy Week and Easter. In our daily meditation, we are still mirroring the reflective time spent by Jesus as he fasted in preparation for the agony of the cross.



On **Palm Sunday**, March 28, our chancel choir invites you to follow them on a *Lenten Journey—from Jerusalem to Calvary*. I have written a guide that will lead us on a journey together. We begin with Jesus' entry into Jerusalem. We then follow his steps through Holy Week and to his ultimate death. Our journey begins with a festive Procession of the Palms followed by the anthem *The Messiah Has Come*. Then, midway into our service, the tone shifts to a more somber one as we begin to reflect on the events of Holy Week.

We know the story well, but I want us to think about our response to what we witness. One of our anthems is *Before the Cross of Jesus* (however, we are used to singing *Beneath the Cross of Jesus*). This anthem removes us from the scene as observers and asks us to stand before the cross and respond. Given what we see, what do we do about it? How does this act of Jesus change our lives?

Expanding on this theme is the plaintive *Father, Forgive Us*, as our shortcomings are brought before our eyes and we plead for forgiveness. It asks us to identify with his suffering and live as if it mattered. Finally, our journey comes to a close with the interweaving of two moving spirituals: *Jesus Walked This Lonesome Valley* and *Swing Low, Sweet Chariot*. The closing words lift our spirits and give us hope:

*When we walk this lonesome valley, we shall not walk it all alone;
For Jesus, our Lord, will be there with us, and guide us to the journey home.
Jesus walked, Jesus died, Jesus lives!*

For those who are able to get out, please join us for the **Maundy Thursday and Good Friday** services. Yes, it is a somber time, but it gives us the space to move into and the space to share in the sufferings of our Lord as we recall his passion, death, and resurrection on our behalf. This can be a special time of response on our part, in gratitude for our salvation.

Please join us on **Easter Sunday, April 4**, as we celebrate the resurrection of our Lord, the foundation and heritage of our Christian faith. We always have an expanded congregation with music and flowers filling the sanctuary. We assemble all our musical resources to make this a beautiful time of worship and music befitting this celebration.



ANNUAL SPRING RUMMAGE SALE

It is that time again – with spring cleaning starting, I am sure many of you are putting away items to donate to the annual church rummage sale. It is possible that maybe your neighbors or coworkers have items they would like to donate as well. The chairperson for the event is again Glynnis Jorgensen. Glynnis would be grateful to anyone who can help with this annual event, as many hands are needed to set up during the week of the sale and also to clean up on Saturday, May 29, in the afternoon.

Remember, items can be brought in from the evening of Monday, May 24 through Thursday, May 27. *We need saleable items, no junk.* Please do not bring us things just because you don't want to throw them away. Items brought in should be **CLEAN**, not broken. We cannot sell chipped glassware, toys with missing parts, books without covers, items with missing pieces, or items with frayed electrical cords. We also cannot sell used computers or exercise equipment.

The better the items look, the more money we can get for them, so run those excess dishes through a wash cycle before you donate them, and try to pack items that are similar in the same boxes. This makes it so much easier for those setting up. In the past, we noticed that the jewelry table does well, so clear out that costume jewelry from your jewelry boxes. New and usable items are always welcome as well. We accept toys with all the parts and furniture that is still in good condition.

Watch the bulletin for any last minute information about the rummage sale. Please offer a few hours of your time to this good fundraiser for your church. All church members should be able to donate an hour or two to help. Don't wait for a personal invitation to come. ANNUAL STONE SOUP LUNCHEON

A Stone Soup Luncheon is planned for Sunday, March 7 during Coffee Hour. Funds raised at this luncheon will be used to help benefit the New Orleans mission trip this summer. If you can help with this luncheon, please plan on coming to church early on the 7th. We will need many hands to make this a successful event. For those of you who don't know the story of stone soup, it is this: *It tells the story of three hungry soldiers who come into a village and cleverly trick the peasants into sharing their food—by making a lavish soup out of seemingly nothing but stones.* Like the soldiers' soup, this recipe turns basically whatever vegetables you have on hand into a hearty meal.

We are asking each student to bring something for our soup when they first arrive at church on March 7. Please bring your contribution to the kitchen prior to worship. The suggested items are:

Pre-K	1 medium onion, peeled and chopped
K	a clove of garlic, peeled and chopped
1	1 small cabbage, chopped
2	3 small potatoes, peeled and chopped
3	3 carrots, peeled and chopped
4	1 stalk of celery, peeled and chopped
5	can of <i>Great Northern Beans</i> or another kind that you prefer
6	sweet red pepper, chopped or a cup of corn
7	zucchini or yellow squash, chopped
8	cup of cooked soup pasta

Anyone from the congregation that can contribute something to the luncheon is asked to bring an ingredient or two for the soup and drop it off in the kitchen prior to worship. Bread and simple desserts are also welcomed.

The magic of this event each year comes from the generosity of those who bring something for our soup pot. The soup is always a surprise, but each year turns out great! We trust that this year will be no exception. We hope to see you there!
