Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

The months of the saints are here—Saint Valentine’s Day in February and Saint Patrick’s Day in March. On the one hand, it’s interesting that the commercial world has found yet another way to exploit religious traditions in order to increase sales during the “slow months.” But on the other hand, we can view the days as opportunities to ask ourselves about our own sainthood.

The stories of these two saints, Valentine and Patrick, are famous for quite different reasons. Valentine has become famous because he is the patron saint of lovers (as well as beekeepers, happy marriages, young people, plague, and travelers (go figure). Patrick is famous as the patron saint of Ireland. We know him so well in the United States because of the tremendous Irish immigration that came about as a result of the potato famine in Ireland in the late 1800s. Whether you agree or disagree with the whole idea of patron saints, these men’s lives can teach us a few things about saintliness.

Valentine, though his story is not as clear as Patrick’s, is hailed as a saint primarily for his refusal to give up his faith in the face of persecution by Emperor Claudius of Rome. Story has it that he was clubbed and beaten and then beheaded. Surely, living during that time, he knew the consequences of refusal to submit to Claudius, and yet he showed great courage, even to death.

Patrick’s story is completely different. We know all sorts of specifics about him: his dates of birth and death, his writings, and especially his story. As a boy growing up in Britain, he was captured by Irish marauders and was made a slave. After six years, he escaped. Not long after, he came to faith in Christ, studied for the priesthood, did various adventurous priestly travels, and then returned to Ireland as a missionary. Patrick’s story has both courage and faith as well as tenacity and creativity. He is particularly known for not destroying the existing worship of the Irish. He invited them to see how their worship was the beginning of “true” worship of the “true” God and he then led them onward to faith in Christ. Patrick converted them instead of killing them.

In the Protestant tradition, we don’t venerate a particular person as a saint, but we do believe in the “saints”—all those who have and who will live in Christ. They are the great cloud of witnesses spoken of in scripture (see Hebrews 12:1 and Ephesians chapters 3-4). But, for me, I want to say that both kinds of saints can help us on our journey in God. Saints such as Saint Patrick or Saint Valentine may be remembered for something special in their lives, or saints may be among the many “commoners of faith.” One thing both types have in common is that they show us what is possible. By their lives they show us what we can do.

Saints were and are ordinary people, but what their lives show us is that even in the ordinary we can become amazing. So often we think that we can do so little with our lives; we think that holiness and saintliness is something for the very rare. In actuality, saintliness is something to which we are all called. To live the life of a saint is to live a life in Christ. If it becomes amazing by its courage or grace or love or compassion, then that is a gift of God to you and a gift to the body of Christ. But this won’t even show up on your radar, because the saints are looking more at God and their neighbors than they are at themselves. A good question to ask of

ourselves is, “Where is God in my life now? Where do I see God and how am I responding?” God’s reality and presence are all around us. As the psalmist says in Psalm 147, God’s abundance and creativity are in the stars and clouds, the rain, the animals and birds, the speed of the horse, the snow, the wind, and especially in those who hope in God’s love. That is the grand level of creation.

But there is also the grand level of God speaking and caring in the lives of individuals—you and me. If we listen and look, we’ll discover that we are being called in some part of our lives to pay attention to this “speaking of God.” Perhaps you are being nudged to become more forgiving, to learn compassion, to become less controlling, to trust more, to laugh more, or to share more. These nudges are often just little experiences that come here and there but they all continue to call or nudge us to look again. The saint, the one who lives in and with Christ, learns to pay attention to these nudges and honor them. Such a person learns to see as Jesus asks us to see, with the eyes of the heart and spirit.

This gift of holiness in seeing is part of what helps us to see Christ in all of life, and in turn, we find ourselves responding with more compassion, mercy, gentleness, love, and joy in life. Beginning to see God in all things as the psalmist wrote and then responding to God’s daily call is the path of the saint. So where is God in your life today, and what is God saying to you?


MIDNIGHT RUN

The next Midnight Run will take place in April. For those that do not know what we do on a Midnight Run, let me tell you. First, Midnight Run is a large, not-for-profit organization in New York City and it feeds the homeless community there. On the night of the run, we load several cars with pre-made bagged lunches, coffee, soup, clothing, and toiletries. We leave this area at about 9:00 p.m. and go into New York City with a preset route to feed, clothe, and minister to those in need on the street. We work through the night to care for as many souls as possible. We have at times also done what is called a “Brunch Run,” meaning we do the same thing during daytime hours, at one preset site.

We meet many grateful people on these runs. This is a safe event. We, and the organization at large, have never had an incident. MARCH LEADS US INTO LENT

On March 9, we finally reach **Ash Wednesday** in our yearly worship cycle. It is at this time that we stop to reflect upon our mortal condition and to hear those words, "Remember, from dust you are and to dust you shall return." We come with penitent hearts indicating our desire to search our hearts and change our lives. We humble ourselves and receive the ashes in the shape of a cross on our foreheads, which reminds us of the good news of the Gospel - forgiveness for all and life in Christ.



We leave and go back out into the world ready to do our soul-searching in a positive way, taking stock of our lives, our shortcomings, our separation from God and his will for our lives. 2011 Per Capita Dollars

\$6.50 goes to the PCUSA

\$3.95 goes to the Synod of the Northeast

\$17.55 goes to the Presbytery of Hudson River

In short: per capita is a sum of money we ask each member to pay in addition to his or her regular giving to help cover the administrative costs of our denominational bodies—the presbytery, synod, and General Assembly.

In long (from our Presbytery): the per capita apportionment is generally recognized as a fair way of spreading across the whole church membership basic operating costs of presbyteries, synods, and the General Assembly.

This funding system has deep roots in American Presbyterianism. The per capita apportionment was first introduced in the 1700s as a way for governing bodies to pay for commissioners' meeting expenses, stipends for the stated clerk, and the costs associated with printing and distributing minutes and reports. Per capita payments continue to provide funding for the administrative expenses of governing bodies, and this benefits the entire church and the local congregation.

The mission of our connectional church is funded by mission contributions to the church's General Mission Fund, which is separate from the administrative budgets supported by the per capita.

The \$28.00 **per member** per capita apportionment for 2011 goes toward the administrative operating expenses of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (USA), headquartered in Louisville; the Synod of the Northeast, based in East Syracuse; and the Presbytery of Hudson River. The expenses include salaries, office supplies, travel, and equipment.

The Presbyterian form of government could not function without all of our members participating in the paying of the per capita that provides for the financial resources to run the Presbyterian Church.

For calendar year 2011, our church will pay \$9,848.08. If our members do not contribute above their regular contributions, this money comes out of the General Fund and depletes the funds available for our operating costs. We are sure you will help your congregation and our mission by adding the per capita to your giving to the church.

MARCH IS COLORECTAL CANCER AWARENESS MONTH. The following are some excerpts from the CDC Web site (www.cdc.gov). My hope is that reading this will spare at least one church member from getting colorectal cancer. - Carol Gabella, church member/endoscopy nurse

Reducing Your Risk

Colorectal cancer screening saves lives. However, many people who are at risk for the disease are not being screened according to national guidelines.

It is estimated that as many as 60% of colorectal cancer deaths could be prevented if all men and women aged 50 years or older were screened routinely. In most cases, colorectal cancer develops from precancerous polyps (abnormal growths) in the colon or rectum. Screening tests can find precancerous polyps, so that they can be removed before they turn into cancer. Screening tests also can find colorectal cancer early, when treatment works best.

Some studies show that increased physical activity and maintaining a healthy weight may decrease the risk for colorectal cancer. Evidence is less clear about other ways to prevent colorectal cancer.

When Should You Begin to Get Screened?

You should begin screening for colorectal cancer soon after turning 50, then continue getting screened at regular intervals. However, you may need to be tested earlier or more often than other people if:

- You or a close relative have had colorectal polyps or colorectal cancer; or
- You have inflammatory bowel disease


If you are aged 50 or older, or think you may be at increased risk for colorectal cancer, speak with your doctor about getting screened.

What Are the Screening Tests for Colorectal Cancer?

Several tests are available to screen for colorectal cancer. Some are used alone; others are used in combination with each other. Talk with your doctor about which test or tests are best for you. These screening tests are recommended by the USPSTF:

- Colonoscopy (every 10 years)
- High-sensitivity fecal occult blood test (FOBT) (every year)
- Flexible sigmoidoscopy (every 5 years)

P.S. My husband would never go for a screening. His excuse was that cancer didn't run in his family. Albert died in 2009 and his cousin followed him about nine months later. Both had end-stage colon cancer...Don't make excuses. Get screened. It may save your life! - Carol
