Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

The months of the saints are here—Saint Valentine’s Day in February and Saint Patrick’s Day in March. On the one hand, it’s interesting that the commercial world has found yet another way to exploit religious traditions in order to increase sales during the “slow months.” But on the other hand, we can view the days as opportunities to ask ourselves about our own sainthood.

The stories of these two saints, Valentine and Patrick, are famous for quite different reasons. Valentine has become famous because he is the patron saint of lovers (as well as beekeepers, happy marriages, young people, plague, and travelers (go figure). Patrick is famous as the patron saint of Ireland. We know him so well in the United States because of the tremendous Irish immigration that came about as a result of the potato famine in Ireland in the late 1800s. Whether you agree or disagree with the whole idea of patron saints, these men’s lives can teach us a few things about saintliness.

Valentine, though his story is not as clear as Patrick’s, is hailed as a saint primarily for his refusal to give up his faith in the face of persecution by Emperor Claudius of Rome. Story has it that he was clubbed and beaten and then beheaded. Surely, living during that time, he knew the consequences of refusal to submit to Claudius, and yet he showed great courage, even to death.

Patrick’s story is completely different. We know all sorts of specifics about him: his dates of birth and death, his writings, and especially his story. As a boy growing up in Britain, he was captured by Irish marauders and was made a slave. After six years, he escaped. Not long after, he came to faith in Christ, studied for the priesthood, did various adventurous priestly travels, and then returned to Ireland as a missionary. Patrick’s story has both courage and faith as well as tenacity and creativity. He is particularly known for not destroying the existing worship of the Irish. He invited them to see how their worship was the beginning of “true” worship of the “true” God and he then led them onward to faith in Christ. Patrick converted them instead of killing them.

In the Protestant tradition, we don’t venerate a particular person as a saint, but we do believe in the “saints”—all those who have and who will live in Christ. They are the great cloud of witnesses spoken of in scripture (see Hebrews 12:1 and Ephesians chapters 3-4). But, for me, I want to say that both kinds of saints can help us on our journey in God. Saints such as Saint Patrick or Saint Valentine may be remembered for something special in their lives, or saints may be among the many “commoners of faith.” One thing both types have in common is that they show us what is possible. By their lives they show us what we can do.

Saints were and are ordinary people, but what their lives show us is that even in the ordinary we can become amazing. So often we think that we can do so little with our lives; we think that holiness and saintliness is something for the very rare. In actuality, saintliness is something to which we are all called. To live the life of a saint is to live a life in Christ. If it becomes amazing by its courage or grace or love or compassion, then that is a gift of God to you and a gift to the body of Christ. But this won’t even show up on your radar, because the

saints are looking more at God and their neighbors than they are at themselves. A good question to ask of ourselves is, “Where is God in my life now? Where do I see God and how am I responding?” God’s reality and presence are all around us. As the psalmist says in Psalm 147, God’s abundance and creativity are in the stars and clouds, the rain, the animals and birds, the speed of the horse, the snow, the wind, and especially in those who hope in God’s love. That is the grand level of creation.

But there is also the grand level of God speaking and caring in the lives of individuals—you and me. If we listen and look, we’ll discover that we are being called in some part of our lives to pay attention to this “speaking of God.” Perhaps you are being nudged to become more forgiving, to learn compassion, to become less controlling, to trust more, to laugh more, or to share more. These nudges are often just little experiences that come here and there but they all continue to call or nudge us to look again. The saint, the one who lives in and with Christ, learns to pay attention to these nudges and honor them. Such a person learns to see as Jesus asks us to see, with the eyes of the heart and spirit.

This gift of holiness in seeing is part of what helps us to see Christ in all of life, and in turn, we find ourselves responding with more compassion, mercy, gentleness, love, and joy in life. Beginning to see God in all things as the psalmist wrote and then responding to God’s daily call is the path of the saint. So where is God in your life today and what is God saying to you?

March Leads Us from Lent II to Palm Sunday



We have marked ourselves as penitent and contrite when we received the ashes on our foreheads on Ash Wednesday. That act marked the beginning of our Lenten journey -- a season of examining ourselves, of taking stock of our lives, of looking closely at our short comings and taking steps to set things right. Jesus spent forty days in the wilderness preparing for his death, and, as Christians, we spend the time preparing ourselves to arrive at Easter Sunday renewed and deepened in our faith.

I've been looking at what other Christians are doing that might be radically different and might make a positive changes in our lives. Here are some interesting tips for a more meaningful Lenten practice, guaranteed to change us from the inside out.

- Pray daily for our enemies
- Get outside every day and walk in nature or see your neighborhood anew
- Meditate -- spend some time in silence
- Journal your experiences of life as it unfolds around you
- Take pictures of things that interest you
- Reduce your media exposure -- stop the bombardment of bad news
- Don't allow technology to hold you captive -- unplug
- Follow a daily devotional such as "Our Daily Bread"
- Invite a friend to church
- Practice a random act of kindness each week
- Call someone you've neglected
- Hold peace instead of reacting to every disturbance that arises
- Memorize an uplifting passage that speaks to you
- Sing out loud to yourself
- Reach out and support relief efforts in a country far from you
- Answer these questions for reflection:

- What does it mean to be marked as "Christ's own forever" at baptism?
- What am I sorry for?
- What feels "off" in my life?
- Who do I feel drawn to reach out to?
- What can I do to make a difference in someone else's life?

to be loved as to love.

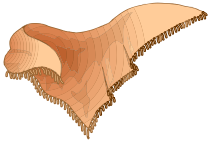

Recently, a lady from Warwick (who was a recipient of a shawl when she started her chemo for ovarian cancer) called and told me that she had yarn for us. I expected several skeins, but when she showed up, she had an entire tub of all sorts of yarns. She wants other people to get hugs from us, as the gift we gave her helped her during some very rough days. Thanks to Ruth and Mark for your donation to keep us going.

Some of the cards we received this month have again brought the blessings back to our church. The following are just several of the beautiful notes that came in this month.

Shawls were also sent to the Kless family in Warwick. Their twenty-three-year-old son was senselessly murdered in January in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. Beryl Yungman, a neighbor, took the family a shawl and prayers to help them through this tough time.

A shawl was also given to a fifty-two-year-old who is fighting lung cancer and Lyme disease. After giving the shawl to her, she requested two more, if we had them. She is taking care of her mother, who is a victim of Alzheimer's. Her daughter has intracranial hypertension and needs a shunt put into her brain. Of course, two shawls were delivered the next day, and she was deeply appreciative.

A shawl was also sent to Boston, Massachusetts for a forty-eight-year-old mother of two, who found out she has liver cancer. Still another was given to an Irish eighty-six-year-old grandmother, who is fighting many illnesses. I understand she has the shawl with her day and night and loves it so much. The family said it is so comforting to the mom and sincerely thanks us for bringing some love into her life.

Not all shawls are sent for illness; some are given as hugs for goodbyes. As Jack and Loretta Richner move south, we will be sending with them a shawl that they can place over a chair. We hope that when they see the shawl, they will be reminded of all the people in Goshen who love them. We made the shawl green, the color of **HOPE**, as we **HOPE** they enjoy the new home and the new adventures before them. Best of Luck, Jack and Loretta; we will miss you.

Joan Howell has not only been busy making shawls for us, but, from what I understand, her crochet hook is also never far from her. She has made numerous hats and scarves for the Giving Tree at the church, scarves for Special Olympics, several throws for the veterans, and some items for her family. Way to go, Joan! When you wear out your hook, we will be glad to get you another.

Remember, anytime you need a gift of love for someone, shawls, lap robes, and baby blankets, along with prayers for all occasions, are in the shawl room at the church.

Annual Stone Soup Luncheon – March 4

Our Annual Stone Soup Luncheon is planned for Sunday, March 4 during coffee hour. Funds raised at this luncheon will be used to help send our teens to Joplin, Missouri this summer. We will need many hands to make this a successful event. For those of you who don't know the story of stone soup, it is this: *It tells the story of three hungry soldiers who come into a village and cleverly trick the peasants into sharing their food—by making a lavish soup out of seemingly nothing but stones.* Like the soldiers' soup, this recipe turns basically whatever vegetables you have on hand into a hearty meal.

We are asking each of our Sunday school students to bring something for our soup when they first arrive at church on March 4. Please bring your contribution to the kitchen prior to worship. The suggested items are:

Pre-K	1 medium onion, peeled and chopped
K	a clove of garlic, peeled and chopped
1	1 small cabbage, chopped
2	3 small potatoes, peeled and chopped
3	3 carrots, peeled and chopped
4	1 stalk of celery, peeled and chopped
5	can of beans
6	sweet red pepper, chopped
7	zucchini or yellow squash, chopped or a cup of corn
8	cup of cooked soup pasta

Anyone from the congregation that can contribute something to the luncheon is asked to bring a vegetable or other contribution to our soup.

Thank you all for your support. The magic of this event each year comes from the generosity of those who bring something for our soup pot. The soup is always a surprise treat that turns out great every year.
