Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Let no evil talk come out of your mouths. . . (*Ephesians 4:29*)

In his fine memoir *Reflections on My Call to Preach*, Fred Craddock uses a phrase that I had not heard before. As if quoting a proverb, he places quotation marks around the words of a piece of folk wisdom which he has long known and frequently used.

At two unrelated points in the book Craddock writes, “He tempered the wind to the shorn lamb.”

The only common thread connecting his use of this phrase is the context of dialogue or conversation. At one point, Craddock applies the words to his mother and the way she spoke with her children. “She knew children could ask questions beyond their ability to deal with a full answer.” In another place, Craddock applies the same phrase to God’s call and the mystery with which God deals with us in varied ways as he reveals his will.

The saying is picturesque. Our gracious God “tempers the wind to the shorn lamb.” God will not unleash bitter winds when the lamb is exposed and unprotected. Neither should we.

We would do well to temper our words, to gauge carefully the Fahrenheit of our language. Our words have the power to scald and burn. Our words can also chill to the bone. Either way, words that are not tempered tend to leave a trail of wreckage. I have seen it happen many times in the churches I have served.

In Paul’s letter to the Ephesians, a singular verse gives practical biblical definition to this folk wisdom. Paul wrote, “Let no evil talk come out of your mouths, but only what is useful for building up, as there is need, so that your words may give grace to those who hear.” This verse merits careful and leisurely meditation. The negative command—let no corrupting talk come out of your mouths—is followed by three positive phrases that tell us how to “temper the wind to the shorn lamb.” Read it one more time, slowly, and notice what Paul is saying about the Fahrenheit of our language.

First, we should say only those things that are “good for building up.” Seldom are our words neutral in their impact. What we say will either build up or tear down, strengthen or undermine, bless or curse. As you speak to people today and especially at church, consider the overall impact of your words and speak what is “is useful for building up.”

Second, speak words “as there is need.” Sometimes a hard truth needs to be spoken. But whether it has the impact of building up or not might be determined by timing. Consider more than the accuracy or truth of your words. Consider also the timing and speak “as there is need.”

Finally, God intends that our words “give grace to those who hear.” This one phrase reminds us that language is a means of grace. God uses your words to pour his goodness into the lives of others. Consider all who will hear your words, and be a channel of grace in their midst.

Don’t take lightly the power of your words. “Temper the wind to the shorn lamb.”

March Leads Us from Lent III to Palm Sunday and Easter



We marked ourselves as penitent and contrite when we received the ashes on our foreheads on Ash Wednesday. That act marked the beginning of our Lenten journey—a season of examining ourselves, of taking stock of our lives, of looking closely at our shortcomings, and of taking steps to set things right. Jesus spent forty days in the wilderness preparing for his death, and, as Christians, we spend the time preparing ourselves to arrive at Easter Sunday renewed and deepened in our faith.

I've been looking at what other Christians are doing that might be radically different and might make positive changes in our lives. Here are some interesting tips for a more meaningful Lenten practice, guaranteed to change us from the inside out.

- Pray daily for your enemies
- Get outside everyday and walk in nature or see your neighborhood anew
- Meditate—spend some time in silence
- Journal your experiences of life as it unfolds around you
- Take pictures of things that interest you
- Reduce your media exposure—stop the bombardment of bad news
- Don't allow technology to hold you captive—unplug
- Follow a daily devotional, such as "Our Daily Bread"
- Invite a friend to church
- Practice a random act of kindness each week
- Call someone you've neglected
- Hold peace instead of reacting to every disturbance that arises
- Memorize an uplifting passage that speaks to you
- Sing out loud to yourself
- Reach out and support relief efforts in a country far from you
- Answer these questions for reflection:

- What does it mean to be marked as "Christ's own forever" at baptism?
- What am I sorry for?
- What feels "off" in my life?
- Who do I feel drawn to reach out to?
- What can I do to make a difference in someone else's life?

"Don't give up for Lent—give out!"



Starting off the month on March 3, the chancel choir will sing the beloved anthem "Prayer of Saint Francis of Assisi." We celebrate Palm Sunday on March 24, when we recall the entry of Jesus into Jerusalem. Our service on that Sunday begins with the procession of the palms as they are distributed by the youth. Midway through, our service takes a turn as we anticipate the events of Holy Week. The choir will sing Cesar Franck's famous "Panis Angelicus," a very fitting Holy Week anthem.

Our services during Holy Week will be on Maundy Thursday and Good Friday. I would encourage you to attend Holy Week services, which are short but meaningful times for reflecting and for remembering the suffering of Jesus who endured the cross for our sins.

March 31 brings us to a glorious celebration of the Resurrection on Easter Sunday. We enter the sanctuary in darkness and quiet. The first fire of Easter is lit, the black curtains are pulled from the windows, and we join in singing "Jesus Christ Is Risen Today." We are hoping to again close our celebration this year with "The Hallelujah Chorus" from Handel's *The Messiah*.

PRAYER SHAWL MINISTRY

February was a very busy month for the Prayer Shawl Ministry (PSM). We sincerely appreciate the donated yarn, which will keep our fingers working and the shawls getting to those in need. I thank those of you who sent me e-mails or told me to whom you have given the gifts. If I missed some of you in the following list, please let me know so that I can report back to our wonderful congregation.

- Elfriede Johnson sent a prayer shawl and a heart-shaped pocket shawl to her cousin in Hamburg, Germany, for her daughter who has been ill for eleven months. Elfriede reports that the daughter keeps the pocket shawl under her pillow and loves the shawl when she is in her wheelchair. Elfriede wanted us to know that the ministry is working its magic very far away, in another country, as well as close to home.
- Two lap robes were recently given to Shirley in Unionville, who reported that her granddaughter has two friends who are both thirteen and seriously ill. The granddaughter wanted to help her friends, but she didn't know what to do. Shirley suggested that she take a shawl to each of them and asked if our prayer ministry might have a couple shawls to spare for these young ladies. Of course, we were glad to accommodate. The one girl has an inoperable brain tumor, and the other one has a muscle disease. Both girls have about six months to live, and you can imagine how hard this is on their healthy friend. I understand that the gifts were so appreciated, and Shirley's granddaughter is even thinking of learning to crochet so she can help others. This is a wonderful outreach. Maybe the young lady will tell the people in her church about the ministry and get one started.
- We sent shawls (one lap robe) with Linda and Garfield Clark for Linda's parents, who have had some illnesses lately. Linda's dad was moved to Middletown Park Manor, and I am sure our gift was appreciated.
- A shawl was given to Tina McCloud for a friend who recently found out she has non-Hodgkin's lymphoma. We sent along some healing and comforting prayers as well, and Tina was glad to take the gift.
- Our secretary, Pat, let us know that her daughter's father-in-law, Anthony, had emergency surgery for an intestinal mass, which unfortunately was malignant. She made sure he got a lap robe and also sent his wife a shawl. This is the note we received: *"To the Prayer Ministry, Although we don't know each other, Pat Schwetje gave me a lap robe for my husband, Anthony, and a shawl for me, and I felt your love and good wishes in their warmth and beauty. We are connected through our Lord, so we are NOT strangers. I need your prayers for strength, and Anthony needs them for health, so they are deeply appreciated. God bless you all! Thank you very much. Gratefully yours, Carol Olimpaito."* We are glad that Pat sent the shawls to them in New Jersey, and we heard that she recently sent out a pocket shawl as well.
- Orra Wood took a shawl and pocket shawl to ORMC for Mrs. Stover, who is facing lung problems. Also sent was a folder with prayers for her to read while she recovers. Orra said the shawl was so loved and appreciated.
- A couple of friends of mine, who are twins, told me that their aunt had had a stroke. The twins had lost their mother when they were born, so their mother's sister, the aunt, is very important to them. Along with some healing prayers, we sent the aunt a pretty, long, blue and variegated shawl so she can wrap herself in it while she recovers.

As you can see, the gifts flew from our doors this month, and I am sure there were others sent that I was not aware of.

We recently filled up the basket in the narthex with more "Trinity Pocket Shawls." Many of them are extremely soft, and they are small enough for you to keep in a pocket or a purse (or to put under a pillow, as the one lady in Germany did). For those of you who didn't know about these pocket shawls, they are miniatures of the large, triangular shawls that we so often give out. Each pocket shawl has this small poem attached: *A Trinity Pocket Shawl, just for you, To carry with you in all you do...Let it be with you night and day, You will feel the love in many ways.*

These pocket shawls are also given to people going through tough times, to those facing surgery (the doctors often let the patients keep the miniature shawls in the surgical suite), to nursing home patients, etc. Pocket shawls are like small security blankets, but they also let these people know that they are not alone in what they are facing. Please feel free to take one or more anytime you need them. We will try to keep the basket filled. The pocket shawls have various borders, so if you need one for a breast cancer patient, you may find one in pink. Again, thank you for the donation of yarn, which helps us keep this part of our ministry going.

God bless each of you for helping us with this ministry.

Fifteen niches remain available in the memorial columbarium. Each niche allows for double or single interment with four purchase options:

Payment in Full = \$2,500

12-Month Payment Option = \$250 / month for 12 months (\$3,000)

24-Month Payment Option = \$130 / month for 24 months (\$3,120)

36-Month Payment Option = \$ 90 / month for 36 months (\$3,240)

Eleven new engraved pavers will be installed in the spring.
