Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

I wrote to the church, but Diotrephes, who loves to be first, will have nothing to do with us . . . he refuses to welcome the brothers (3 John: 9-10)

One summer, several years ago, my eldest sons and I planned to spend some time together. Jeff, the eldest, was living in Wisconsin. Robert, who was just out of the Air Force, and I were going out to visit and spend a week having fun together. It started out with a warm welcome filled with hugs and smiles. These two sons had been like oil and water growing up and it was a pleasure to see they had, I thought, matured past those earlier conflicts.

I didn't know how long it would last, but I didn't care. I planned to enjoy every minute of their love-fest. Of course, I harbored hopes that it would be days, possibly weeks, before either of them cried foul for whatever reason. My hopes were short-lived.

I don't want to sound like I'm throwing my sons under the bus. They don't make a regular practice of treating each other as enemies. Only eighteen months apart in age, they always have been and still are the best of friends, most of the time. But they are still siblings. It doesn't take much to evoke conflict. Annoyances creep up from out of nowhere--they bicker; they compare and complain of perceived injustices. I'm not too bothered by this for this is what brothers do.

What happens in the family happens with troubling frequency in God's family as well. The difference is that we expect this kind of thing between siblings who have lived in the same house. But when it comes to the community of faith, to brothers and sisters who are joined by the Spirit of God and gathered in their common desire to worship and to love God, we expect better.

Being a community of grace is not easy. Explanations for our failure to obey Jesus and "love one another" are many. However, in the little New Testament letter of Third John we get a specific insight into what goes wrong and why we sometimes struggle to love our brothers and sisters.

The entire letter of Third John is only 13 verses long. Right near the middle John mentions someone in the church who seems to be causing trouble. Diotrephes won't have anything to do with John, and "he refuses to welcome the brothers." John diagnoses the problem with a simple observation. Diotrephes loves to be first (3 John: 9-10).

"Me first." The words sound like something we might hear from young children, especially brothers and sisters. And these words will almost always invite resistance. "Me first" is always answered by "No . . . me first." And on it goes.

As we grow older we outgrow those petty words, but we find different ways to say the same thing: "Me first." And when "me first" is resisted or denied, when that approach to life isn't working for us, we find that hostility

towards our brothers and sisters grows. James put it this way: "What causes fights and quarrels among you? You want something but don't get it" (James 4:1-2).

The presence of brothers and sisters in our lives means that we do not have unhindered access to our own way. Sometimes we have to give way, let others go first, attend to the needs of someone else before our own. To truly love our brothers and sisters, we'll have to wage war against pride and against self.

We all love to be first. Having brothers and sisters means allowing someone else to occupy that place. How can you do that today?

Teen Voices will be at a retreat in Tuscarora, PA March 4, 5, 6. In April, they will also participate in a 30-hour famine event (only water, fluids for 30 hours) to try to experience what so many around the world and in the states experience as a matter of routine. We may have sponsors for them to raise money for the Goshen Ecumenical Food Pantry.

They have relocated the old Sunday school closet to the old computer room and tore down that closet wall to make more space for their growing numbers. They have new chairs and a TV screen for their curriculum presentations now; paint will come next. Many thanks to Pati and Mark Glasse and Michele and Brian Meek for all the serious help!!

Our Lenten Journey Continues . . .

Our ever-faithful Chancel Choir has been ministering to our souls with anthems reflecting themes of Lent. We sang “Take Time to Be Holy” on March 6 followed by “Panis Angelicus” on March 13.



On March 20 we arrive at **Palm Sunday** and the beginning of **Holy Week**. The service begins celebrating the entry of Jesus into Jerusalem singing the joyous entrance hymn, *The Palms* as the youth wave their palm branches in procession and lay them on the chancel. However, just as events took a sudden turn for Jesus as he faced his trial and ultimate crucifixion, our service turns more somber as we anticipate the events of Holy Week with the sublime choral anthem, “Ave Verum,” followed by the much-loved “Pie Jesu” and a tender communion anthem, “In Remembrance.”



We then continue our Lenten journey with the services of Holy Week. First, we observe **Maundy Thursday**, which derives from the Latin word “mandatum,” meaning “commandment.” The events of Maundy Thursday highlight the humility and servanthood of Jesus. His command to His disciples is a command that He leaves for us as well, “A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another. By this all men will know that you are my disciples, if you love one another” (John 13:34-35). As we enter, we extend our hands to be cleansed by our pastor. The chancel is transformed into a glowing candlelit space in which to experience the Passover Meal, the last supper or communion before Easter. At the conclusion of the service, the altar is stripped of all elements and windows are blackened out in preparation for the somber tone of the service on Good Friday.

On **Good Friday, March 25**, the service presents a dramatic reenactment of the events of Jesus’ trial and crucifixion in word and music. It is a moving and emotional experience for all. We depart in silence and darkness not to reenter the sanctuary until Easter Sunday morning.



March 27 brings us to the glorious celebration of **Easter**. We enter the sanctuary in darkness and silence, the first fire of Easter is lit, the choir sings an Easter acclamation, then -- the black curtains are pulled from the windows, the Easter lilies are revealed, and we join in our processional hymn, “Jesus Christ Is Risen Today!” The choir will be presenting an Easter anthem, *Christ Is Risen! Alleluia!* and Mary Lee Farris will be singing, *The Holy City*. Easter Sunday is always a joyous occasion in word and song as we celebrate the foundation of our Christian faith – the Resurrection of Our Lord.

He is Risen! He Is Risen, indeed!



TEEN VOICES

Grades 7 through 12 meets the 1st and 3rd Sundays of each month at 9:30am

"I'm So Tired!"

Almost every teen in our Teen Voices class doesn't get the recommended sleep for their ages - approximately 9 hours. Most reported getting two or three hours less sleep daily. Sleep is important for our health and to help make GOOD choices.

During one of our meetings, we looked to the Bible for guidance on how to sleep well: Get physical exercise and rest well (Ecclesiastes 5:12). We noted that video games and cell phones are stimulating, not relaxing. As one of our *wise* teens shared, video games are designed to stimulate the release of adrenaline.

Forgive others (Ephesians 4:26)-Do not let the sun go down while you are still angry.

Trust in God (Psalm 94:12,13)

What about us? Are we modeling good rest habits for our teens?
