## Faith Matters

... love one another with mutual affection; outdo one another in showing honor. Do not lag in zeal, be ardent in spirit, serve the Lord. Rejoice in hope, be patient in suffering, persevere in prayer. Contribute to the needs of the saints; extend hospitality to strangers. — Romans 12:10–13

To all my Goshen Presbyterian friends and family,

As you read this letter, the *holiest season* of the Christian calendar is upon us. The season of Lent is a time dedicated to spiritual renewal as we seek to grow in our relationship with God and neighbor. For many, Lent is often a time to give up something—perhaps a vice or an indulgence—or it is a time to take on a discipline which would open us to the blessings of faithful living—such as fasting or meditation.

And while both “giving up” and “taking on” are good Lenten disciplines, what if, instead, we spent Lent this year looking beyond our own personal disciplines to work together toward the goal of building a *beloved community* here in Goshen?

While it was 20<sup>th</sup> century American philosopher Josiah Royce who coined the phrase, “beloved community,” it was the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. who put the phrase into regular use. King often spoke of “beloved community” to illustrate God’s kingdom as a *kin-dom*. The word *kin-dom* better reflects the mission of the Church than does the word kingdom because it moves us away from a top-down understanding of power and control to a more level plain where there is kinship among participants – where those long-silenced have a voice and those often overlooked are recognized.

King’s beloved community was not some far-fetched utopia, but an attainable society based on justice for all and selfless love of one another. For King, a community became “beloved” when every person had their basic needs met.

Donna Frischknecht Jackson has prepared a Lenten devotional at the request of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), and she entitled it “Beloved Community” with a nod to Dr. King. It was her intention as a spiritual leader to help us consider what such a community would look like if put into practice. In her introduction to the study, she wrote:

“As Americans, many of us feed off of anger, disrespect, fear, serving ourselves, seeking quick results, maintaining independence and extending hostility to strangers. Yes, you read that correctly — hostility to strangers. Don’t believe me? Have you not opened your social media news feed today? As the church, we have

an amazing opportunity to model for our culture how to live in a community that is held together by mutual affection, honor, passion, service, hope, patience, perseverance, generosity, and hospitality.

“Hospitality is a good word to meditate on during Lent. Hospitality makes room for others and welcomes with open arms. Hospitality says, ‘There is always space for another’ and ‘Everyone should feel warmly welcomed and valued.’ Christian hospitality is demonstrating God’s love toward people who may seem different from us. As God’s beloved community, we get to embody a life of hospitality.”

For this season of Lent, Frischknecht Jackson has compiled devotions written by a wide swath of Christian leaders who highlight what it means to be a beloved, welcoming community where all people are made to feel at home. These devotions will be published daily throughout Lent and Holy Week to all those who are on our weekly Tower Tie list. Friends, during this season of longing and belonging, remember that ours is a welcoming God who goes to great lengths to welcome us. It is this God who invites us to make a home in Christ. Yes we, who were once strangers, are truly embraced by a grace-filled hospitality that never loses sight of us but always invites us into the kin-dom. In thanksgiving for that blessed welcome, may we seek the embodiment of the Holy Spirit in offering hospitality to all those we encounter this Lenten season.

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Lion or lamb...March is upon us! We have St. Patrick’s Day, the spring equinox, and the Annunciation (9 months to next Christmas!) this month. Musically, we express the spirituality of the season of Lent. There are voices that seek to remove from Lent all self-reflection, introspection, and yes, penance, but this spiritual housecleaning—the setting aside of pleasure to make room for happiness—makes deep human sense and is rooted in the season. The music honors this, not by being lugubrious (the dreaded “dirge” we hear tell of) but by moving us to reflection. That can be done in many ways, of course.

My own experience in sacred music goes back to my childhood—learning those new folksy songs for First Communion—but also hearing something higher, older, and frankly more enduring on Sundays, as well as in my father’s Episcopal church. Today we sing, at the very most, one or two of those “ditties,” and the rest would be met with eye-rolling...or worse...that’s the inevitable fate of a fad. But we still sing “Now Thank We All Our God,” and God willing we still mean it!

Some of the newer music has lasted, at least till now. For example, there is the Taizé music (pronounced *tay-ZAY* or *teh-ZAY*, by the way, not *tah-* or *tie-*). Done in its intended manner, with many leisurely repetitions, it can create a space for contemplative prayer and deep community. Sung standing, with two or three quick prattle-throughs, it achieves little or nothing. The village of Taizé, in southern France, has been home to an ecumenical Protestant community since the days of World War II. They use repetitive prayer—often in Latin, but also in a mix of modern tongues—to calm, settle, and unite the many visitors and permanent members.

This music seems to have found a home in many churches, but one hopes that the full and proper context may be present too.

During the twentieth century, most Protestant hymnals expanded their resources to include hymns of other denominations, as well as hymns drawn from *legitimate* folk sources. The best example of the latter is a tune like KINGSFOLD, often sung as “I Heard the Voice of Jesus Say.” This is an old folksong from the English countryside, and proved its worth by transmission over long, anonymous years. Other trends—like the including of Welsh tunes in an English hymnal—seem very obvious now, but weren’t so obvious in, say, 1906,

when Ralph Vaughn Williams broke that barrier. The question is always quality: can this music express faith, or does it only demonstrate that we Christians also listen to the radio?

The story continues, and so does the song. Enjoy a meaningful and songful Lent.

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## ***NEWS FROM THE CLERK OF SESSION...***

***“We strive to be a welcoming, loving church family united by our faith and committed to service in Christ”***

This is our new Mission Statement adopted last month by the Session. It appears on the back of the cover of this year's Annual Report. We feel that it concisely and accurately represents who we are as a church at this moment in time. Our previous Mission Statement was 60 words and was adopted by the Session over 25 years ago.

In January Session approved the 2023 church budget. The \$396,341.36 budget has a projected deficit of \$17,000. That doesn't necessarily mean that we will have a deficit at the end of 2023. In 2022, we had projected a deficit but ended the year with a \$5,632.37 surplus.

Elders have also approved, in an executive session, extending its contract with our Interim Pastor the Rev. Dr. Rhonda Myers another six months to September 16, 2023. The motion reads: “To extend the pastor's contract six months and beyond that in optional extensions of three month increments.” The majority of Elders feel it is important to keep Pastor Myers in place until the church calls a new pastor and although we now have a working Pastor Nominating Committee, no one knows for sure how long that process will take. It took the Interim Pastor Nominating Committee eight months to find an Interim Pastor for us. Following Presbyterian Polity, a contract with an Interim or Transitional Pastor is between the Session and the Interim. In other words, the Session hires and determines the salary of an Interim Pastor. When we have a called and installed pastor in place, the contract will be between that Pastor and the congregation. In other words, the Congregation votes to hire the Pastor and votes each year on the pastor's salary. (as we did with Pastor Kingsley).

As most everyone knows, we are looking for a new Clerk of Session. I will be retiring from the job in June. Presbyterian Polity requires that a Clerk of Session be an ordained Elder... someone who has served at one time or another as an Elder in a Presbyterian Church. In our church, the position comes with a stipend of \$2,828 a year. The Presbytery of the Hudson River puts out a guide, “Handbook for Clerks of Session” that contains almost everything you'd need to know. There is also a yearly educational meeting “Clerk of Session Day” for all Clerks in our Presbytery. It will be a zoom meeting this year on Sunday afternoon, April 30. If an Elder, currently on Session or not, thinks he or she may be interested in the position, please see Rev. Myers or myself

Don't forget that regular Session meetings are open to all church members. We meet in Fellowship Hall on the third Wednesday of the month, starting at 7 p.m. and usually concluding at 9 p.m. Observing a Session meeting will give you an idea of how decisions are made. If you'd like to address the Session, you will need to let either the Clerk or the Pastor know prior to the beginning of the meeting. The March meeting will be on zoom.

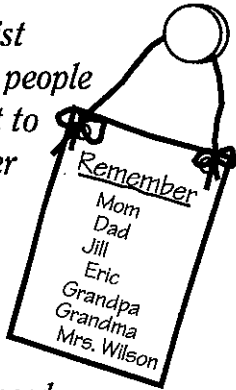

Make a list of all the people you want to remember in your prayers.



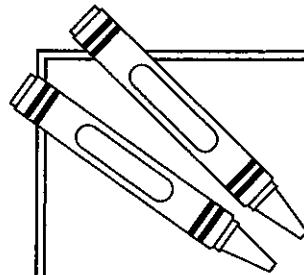
You will need:
