Faith Matters A Message from Pastor Rhonda—May 2021

"Will you pray for and seek to serve the people with energy, intelligence, imagination and love?"

(A Constitutional Question Asked Upon Ordination in the Presbyterian Church U.S.A.)

Dear Friends,

It has been my delight getting to know members of this wonderful congregation; and I hope that if we haven't had a chance to meet yet, we will be able to do so in person or by Zoom at some point soon.

Later this spring, we will celebrate the Ordination and Installation of a new class of Elders and Deacons, and one of the questions they will be asked at that time is this: "Will you pray for and seek to serve the people with *energy, intelligence, imagination and love?*"

This is, perhaps, my "favorite" of all the ordination questions because it encourages us to be open to God's Spirit of Wisdom and Grace, promising to approach new opportunities in ministry with passion while embracing the future with intentionality and Christian care.

The Rev. Dr. Steve Yamaguchi, Former Executive Presbyter of Los Ranchos Presbytery in California, encourages congregations in transition to use this interim time to 'unleash our godly **energy**, engage our **intelligence**, fire up our holy **imagination** and ground our **love** in thankfulness.' He believes the best way to manage change in the church is through conversations that draw out positive memories while prayerfully envisioning a new era in congregational life.

Such conversations often begin with small group discussions about what we appreciate in the church we love and how to bridge the best of "what is" toward "what might be." Using questions designed to provide a springboard for holy imagining, participants help craft a narrative about church life which speaks to its values, its passions and its mission. These questions are as unique as each congregation itself, but might include some like these:

- What do you value most about your experience in this church?
- What would you like to see carried forward?
- What would this church look like if our wildest dreams for ministry were realized?
- What would you like to say about this church and what it has meant to you? To the community?

God has brought us together for a holy purpose: to embrace a new day in ministry. And one of my responsibilities as your Interim Pastor is to get the process of transition rolling, with God's help and your support.

Therefore, it is with a humble, yet passionate, heart that I invite you to join me in praying for our congregation every day and, when the time comes, to participate in a process of discovery that the Session and I believe will help further our God-given purpose to be a vital congregation of faithful believers in Jesus Christ, our Easter Lord.

Memorial Pavers

To order a memorial paver to honor or remember your loved ones, please see Pat in the church office. The cost of each paver is only \$100. We will place an order when we have 10 requests (as of now we only have one order).

Only 3 Niches Remain Available for Purchase in the Memorial Columbarium

Each niche allows for double or single interment with three purchase options:

Payment in Full = \$2,800

12-Month Payment Option = \$250 / month for 12 months (\$3,000) 18-Month Payment Option = \$180 / month for 18 months (\$3,240)

We will need to consider constructing a 2^{nd} and 3^{rd} columbarium wall soon. The estimated cost for these two new walls is \$40,000+.
