## "Faith Matters: Being Presbyterian 101"

"For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ. For in the one Spirit we were all baptized into one body." (I Cor. 12:12)

"And they devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and the fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers." (Acts 2:42)

My dear friends,

We recently celebrated with joy the news of our risen Lord on Easter Sunday and, soon (June 5<sup>th</sup>), we will celebrate the coming of the Holy Spirit upon the early believers on the day of Pentecost, giving birth to the church. In its earliest days, the Apostle Paul described the church using this visual: we are the *body of Christ*. And just as a human body has many different parts—limbs and organs and bones and ligaments—the body of Christ alive in the world has many parts, too. When those parts come together through the mutual waters of baptism, the Holy Spirit binds us into one body united in faith, hope, and love. And while each individual member of the body retains their own personal characteristics and identity, when joined with the unique qualities and gifts of other baptized members, the body is equipped to accomplish the ministry of Jesus Christ in the world.

A modern look at the verse from Acts 2 above would suggest that a vital, healthy church is one that is committed to accomplishing its ministry through: learning, sharing in community, connecting with the lives of other believers, and growing in spiritual depth. What's more, the Lord's Great Commission, to "Go therefore and make disciples...." (Matt. 28:19a), instructs us to be outwardly focused as much as we are inwardly connected.

The church is both a place of sanctuary where the Spirit offers comfort and guidance through life's travails as well as a gateway to the community, providing the hands, feet, heart, and mouth of Christ for those people and places in need. We are "sent out" (the very definition of *apostle*) to joyfully serve the Lord by sharing the gospel and tackling the major issues facing the world today. If you attended the Peace Service for Ukraine this spring, you might have seen how this commitment to discipleship and justice come together to model a missional love which works to change circumstances to better reflect God's intention for humankind.

For Presbyterians, the core of our identity lies in our secure hope in the grace of God, whose Spirit empowers us to live lives of gratitude for the gift of a redeeming Lord who chooses to love us unto death. And it is with gratitude that we exhibit our faith through acts of generosity and hospitality, the pursuit of social justice, and the proclamation of the gospel. And while every congregation must choose how to live missionally as the body of Christ, we do so trusting that the Holy Spirit guides our way.

As part of its work, the Transition Team has sought to explore what it means to be Presbyterian. And the Session has asked that I offer the congregation an opportunity to learn more about the faith we share. So, I will be offering a "Being Presbyterian 101" workshop on 3 successive Mondays in June: 6/6, 6/13, and 6/20. We will meet in Fellowship Hall at 7pm to look at the basics of our Beliefs and Doctrines, our History and Polity, and the meaning of Membership. Everyone interested in learning more about the church is invited to participate; in fact, the more the merrier. But please note that the 3<sup>rd</sup> session will intentionally be developed for those seeking to join the church. If you are already a member, join me for one or more sessions. If you would like to become a member, please join me for all 3 sessions.

Thank you, again, for the opportunity to serve as your Transition Leader.

# Music Notes...



Kids-always ask your parents before downloading a game!

Did I ever mention that I have a favorite computer game? I do! I have been playing *Plants versus Zombies* since it came out in 2009. I still play the original game, but mostly now I play *PvZ 2*, which came out in 2014 and has been adding features ever since.

The game has a simple premise. The middle of the screen is your front lawn, divided into a field of 9 x 5 squares. On the left is your house; on the right are zombies trying to cross your yard. If they get into your house, you lose (your brains)! Despite that, the game is quite tame. The zombies are goofy. There is no gore.

Your job is to plant a magic garden to ward off the undead. The plants have many functions. The Sunflower produces sun, which you need to buy more plants. Then there are Peashooters (which shoot peas at the zombies), Split Peas (which shoot forward and back), Frozen Peas (which shoot frozen peas, of course), and others. There is a Squash which, you guessed it, *squashes* them. There is a Potato Mine which blows them up. There is a Cherry Bomb which does the same thing, but with different sound effects (it says "Cha-BOOF!" instead of "Spu-DOW!").

For all their supposed menace, the zombies are amusing. Some wear road cones, others sport metal buckets on their heads, some carry parasols, and quite a few wear a shirt and tie. There are imps, chickens, weasels, pirate zombies with parrots, teenage zombies on surfboards, disco zombies with boom boxes, futuristic zombies with jet packs...*ad infinitum*.

There's even a Caesar zombie who throws bottles of *salad dressing*, which turns your plants into...yes...*salad*.

Silly as it is, *Plants versus Zombies* hones important skills. It calls for time and resource management, strategy, careful choices, memory, and reflexes. It's surprisingly easy to learn despite the many dozens of characters, and the seemingly endless array of levels and worlds.

But for me, the best part of *Plants versus Zombies* is its moral aspect. It is a cheerfully black-andwhite moral universe. *Zombies bad, plants good*. There is never a question as to whose side you're on, and where goodness lies. In their brain-dead stubbornness, the zombies show the absurdity of evil. In their cheerfulness and resourcefulness, the plants show the joy of goodness. One does not "journey" with a zombie!

It's nice to play a game that reaffirms the beauty of nature, the power of innocence, and the joy of a cooperative spirit against monotonous gray waves of adversity. It's nice to laugh at the same time!

## Mission

The Mission Committee would like to thank you for the great support you have shown for the church's mission initiatives this spring. Due to your generosity, the Blanket Fund collected over a thousand dollars which will be used to support the purchase of blankets by Church World Service to be distributed to victims of violence, warfare, natural disaster and more throughout the world. In addition, you gave just under a thousand dollars (\$990 to be exact!) to sponsor several walkers from our church in the Habitat for Humanity of Greater Newburgh Walk in April. Generous gifts like these will continue to help revitalize Newburgh's most blighted neighborhoods.

FPC Goshen will be hosting a Habitat for Humanity Talent Show on the evening of May 21<sup>st</sup> beginning at 7:00 p.m. Funds will be used to construct a Unity Build sponsored home for a Habitat family. PresbyBuild, EspiscoBuild, and Methodist & Friends are partnering in the planning and staging of the event. No tickets required. A free-will offering with be taken during the show.

#### **Nominating Committee**

On Sunday, April 24<sup>th</sup>, the Congregation voted to reduce the size of our Session and Board of Deacons from their current number (18 and 21 respectively) to 12 each. This was done to better represent the size of the congregation in the current day. This means that the number of Elders and Deacons to be nominated at our June Congregational Meeting will be fewer than in recent years, but the Nominating Committee is still on the search for the right individuals to serve as officers of the church. ## Mary's Soliloquy

We have been asked about the story Pastor Rhonda read about Jesus' mother Mary during Holy Week Services. This story was written by the United Methodist church pastor, artist, and poet about what Mary's thoughts might have been in the hours and days immediately after Jesus' death. Remember: this is a reflection of what her thoughts may have been in the *pre-Easter darkness of death and sorrow*.

Listen, it's suddenly become so quiet . . . so deathly quiet. Everyone must finally be asleep, everyone except me. John keeps telling me that I should get some rest, but how can I rest? Every time I even try to close my eyes, I can still see Him there. It's so cold . . . and dark. Has it ever been so dark?

Oh, God, where are You? Never in my life have You seemed so distant as You seem tonight. Not even when my beloved Joseph died, did I feel this alone. What happened? It wasn't supposed to be this way. You said He was to be the Messiah. That one day He would sit upon the throne of David. Instead, I watched them place my son in a tomb. Why? How could You let this happen?

There was nothing that I could do . . . but watch. There was nothing that any of us could have done. But You, Lord, You could have stopped them, and yet You did nothing.

At first, when He came into Jerusalem, and the people shouted His praises and laid palm branches before Him, I thought, at last . . .At last I would see Your promises for my son fulfilled. But something went wrong . . . terribly wrong. Did He say or do something that displeased You so much that You would allow them to do this to Him? Could it be that Joseph and I were both so wrong? Did we somehow deceive ourselves and in doing so, deceive Him?

Oh, God, is it my fault . . . am I somehow to blame for my own son's death? Yet, I remember so clearly the night Your angel came to me . . . all the things He said. Then there were the shepherds . . . and the wise men from the East. Would they have traveled so far . . . would they have brought such gifts, if He were to be just an ordinary child?

And then there was Anna . . . and Simeon. There were so many things that spoke to my heart, Reassuring me that it was so much more than a dream. But if not a dream, then what . . . a lie? But God does not lie. No! I will not believe it. He was the Messiah, just as You promised . . . wasn't He?

Joseph said that the angel told him that His name should be Jesus, because He would save His people from their sins. But He didn't. He didn't even try to save Himself. It was almost as though He willed it to happen, just as it did. I don't understand, but then I never understood what made Him do a lot of the things that He did.

He was so kind . . . so full of compassion . . . so wise for one so young. And yet, there were times when He almost seemed to go out of His way to provoke the anger of our leaders. He was my son, and I loved Him, but I don't know that I ever truly understood Him. There were a few times when I began to wonder if maybe His brothers were right, that maybe He had gone mad . . . but, in my heart, I knew.

Oh, why wouldn't He just come home when I asked Him?


I should have found a way to make Him come home, then none of this would have happened. But He would not be swayed, not by me, not by anyone. He was determined to fulfill what He was sure was Your purpose for His life. But, if He was truly the Messiah, then how could You have allowed Him to die before His work was finished?

God, I don't understand any of this and I need so desperately to understand. If only He were here . . . I need His strength. But, I will never know His strength again, will I? Nor His peace? I will never hear His voice again . . . or feel the touch of His hand on mine. I will never see His face . . . Oh, God, when I close my eyes, I can still see the agony on His face. I can still hear Him crying out. God, help me! Why did this have to happen? Why did You let them do this to my son? Why?


