Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Thanksgiving is upon us already! But ready or not, we are entering the home stretch of our calendar year and the beginning of our Christian year. With such big beginnings and endings, it's a good time to ask ourselves, "Where are we in our spiritual lives?"

Like most of you, I find that time between now and Christmas seems to double in speed. Suddenly, fun things to do and things I need to get done blossom before my eyes. Before we know it, this time for reflection on God's presence in our lives blips past, and we all collapse in an exhausted heap at the "finish line" on December 26. Most of us don't plan for this to happen; in fact, most of us tell ourselves that this year will be different, that we'll find time to slow down and savor the small wonders of this beautiful time of year. But then we say yes to "this" and go to "that," and suddenly, we've done it again!

What's interesting about these next weeks is that they are really a microcosm of how we live the rest of the year. These few weeks, though, are so intense that we see it more clearly than all the rest of the year. In truth, we are very busy people all year round. One reason we're so busy is that we associate our actions with who we are. For instance, when someone gets to know you, they usually ask what you do, what your action is in life. The mistake we so often make is believing that our actions are all that we are.

This is when the message of Jesus can help us so profoundly. He asks us, just as he asked Martha, "Why are you doing what you are doing?" "What is the real reason for all your activity?" Jesus doesn't condemn activity; he asks us to see how what we do is the warp and weft of our life of faith. A life of faith is rooted in God's Spirit; it is fully alive and present to the moment, enjoying the gift of life, even in its smallest joys. When our activities are so relentless that our minds are filled with anxiety about whether or not we will get everything done, then we've lost our connection to the present moment, to each other, and to our awareness of God's Spirit.

Jesus doesn't tell us that life is either action or contemplation, either busyness or quietness. Jesus tells us that we need to be mindful about what we do and why we are doing it. We need to be present in the moment as we do things so the presence of God's Spirit is alive in us. This, then, is how we practice living faithfully every day. This is how others begin to perceive that our lives are different because of our faith. This is how we, as a community of faith, can be present to one another and develop a bond of deep friendship and trust.

So friends, as we enter The Race to the Finish, **walk**. Be alive and present. Smile. Enjoy the small wonders and beauties of these days. Listen to the Spirit within you and within others. Do with joy the things that need to be done. For all of it is living our faith, every moment.

Dear Sisters and Brothers:

A problem has come up, and I want to share with you my thoughts and the steps I have taken to resolve the situation.

Trucks and cars have been driven on the sidewalk that leads to Fellowship Hall. Over the years, this has caused the portion of the sidewalk toward the parking lot to sink down below the level of the parking lot, and this area now collects a large pool of water every time it rains. There is also a dry well under that sidewalk, and it could be damaged by the weight of the vehicles.

As you are well aware, we just completed a retaining wall along the outside edge of the Memorial Garden. Yesterday, someone hit it and dismantled the end portion of the wall. This will be repaired soon, and bollards will be put in place to protect against further damage. Of course, no one came forward to admit that he or she had struck the wall.

The solution is quite simple. No trucks or vehicles are to be permitted to back up to Fellowship Hall. I have sent a letter to inform the Ecumenical Food Bank, since they have brought the largest trucks onto the sidewalk. However, **no one** should drive in this area.

WORSHIP AND MUSIC

The addition of an early service to our method of worship creates more opportunities for members to give their services back to the church. The Worship and Music Committee coordinates volunteers in the following areas:

Greeters—(needed for both the 8:30 a.m. and 10:30 a.m. services) A greeter/Greeters can be an individual, two individuals, a couple, or an entire family. The tasks include arriving fifteen to twenty minutes early, standing in the narthex (preferably with name tags), and welcoming arriving worshippers.

Lay reader—(needed for the 10:30 a.m. service) The task is to read selected parts of the service. The church secretary, Pat Schwetje, will make your text available (by e-mail or pick-up), usually by the Wednesday prior to your reading.

Acolytes—Acolytes are members of our church family in the third grade or older.

Elders—Elders are needed to serve Communion on the first Sunday of every month, during Advent and Lent by intinction, and every Sunday during July and August (this year).

Lighting the Advent wreath candles—As we progress through the season of Advent, usually a family will participate in a short section of the worship service, reading a short text and lighting the candle(s) on the Advent wreath.

Good Friday service—Eight men are needed to read roles in a Passion play.

Sounds simple—and all the tasks are actually quite easy. If you add them up, there are nearly **five hundred** vital tasks that are filled by volunteers each year. Nearly ten volunteers are needed each week. Please help. Use the sign-up board in the narthex for greeting and reading, or contact Bruce Crandall (651-1483 / bcran12@earthlink.net) if you would give the gifts of your time and talent.

We get a fresh start each day to improve our lives and love more in our relationships and interactions with others. Isn't that what it is all about? Let us come together to offer praise, worship, and thanksgiving to our God, who has so richly blessed us.

SUPPORT YOUR CHURCH HOME **2008 CAPITAL CAMPAIGN**

The 2008 Operating Budget consists of operating revenues and expenses only, not capital expenses needed to maintain and improve our church home and grounds. The Operating Budget consists of income and expenses anticipated for the day-to-day operation of the church facilities and programs.

The Finance and Administration Committee has prepared a Capital Budget for prioritized capital expenses to maintain and improve our church home and grounds. The plan is to fund the Capital Budget through an annual Capital Fund Campaign targeted specifically for need-based projects.

The Finance and Administration Committee and the Property Management Committee will work collectively to fund and complete the following 2008 prioritized projects:

2008 Capital Fund Budget

1. Continue church and Fellowship Hall masonry repairs that are needed desperately (the small towers on either side of the rear Tiffany window are pulling away from the wall)—approximate cost: \$18K
2. Church Park drainage (the Village of Goshen DPW has already asked permission from First Presbyterian Church to install a catch basin)—approximate cost: \$5K
3. Repair one church sanctuary window—approximate cost: \$2K

The above costs are estimates, and all projects will move forward after several bids are received and evaluated.

Our church home needs your financial support for the 2008 Capital Campaign—an amount you agree to pledge over and above any 2008 pledge you already made toward our 2008 Operating Budget. You can pay the Capital Campaign pledge in periodic increments or in a lump sum between now and the end of the year.

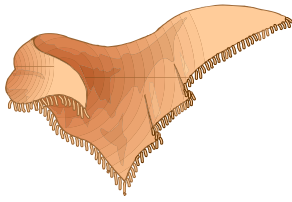

Prayer Shawl Ministry (PSM) News

Shawls continue to be sent from our church, and the blessings continue to flow back to us. This month, we delivered twelve shawls, twelve baby shawls, and two baby blankets to the maternity ward at Orange Regional Medical Center in Middletown. Others also went out with church members. The maternity ward will use them when needed. Many will wrap the shoulders of mothers who have stillborn babies, children with Sudden Infant Death Syndrome, or children with birth defects. Wendy and Darlene met with the nurses and volunteers, who were most appreciative. We also left a copy of the Debbie Macomber book that inspired us. They said they would pass it around to the members of their staff, and each person will sign the book after it is read. We hope that there isn't much need for our shawls, but we are glad we could help them when the need does arise.

Barbara Hankins gave us a pattern to make triangle shawls, which are made quickly and come out beautifully. These are perfect as the three corners are a reminder of the Trinity. We continue to give a folder of prayers with each gift. Several of these prayers, along with the name of our church as being one with a PSM, have been posted at www.shawlministry.com.

STAINED GLASS WINDOWS

“The favrile iridescent stained glass windows which form the background of the pulpit were made possible by a contribution to the church by a former member, Gates W. McGarrah in 1925. The windows were designed by Louis Comfort Tiffany of Tiffany Studios and memorialized John Wallace, Mrs. McCarrah’s father, and her uncle, Charles Goodrich Elliot, who were both elders, twenty six years and thirty seven years, respectively.

The stained glass windows depict The Resurrection – the kneeling women with the reassuring angel before the vacant sepulcher (tomb or chamber often carved out of a hillside) – in three gothic panels and are acknowledged by Louis Tiffany as his finest work.

These gifts, both small and large, are treasured by the church.”
