Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

I love coffee. In fact, I love coffee so much I can't walk past most gourmet coffee shops. The distinct aroma of roasting beans and bakery goods just beckons my attention.

Once I entered a café that I had not previously visited and was most impressed not only by the brewed coffee of the day, but also by the proprietor of the shop who went out of his way to pleasantly greet his customers. As I inquired about his roasting machine, he told me an interesting fact of the raw coffee beans he was able to purchase from Columbia, South America. Apparently, for years the Columbian government required all coffee bean growers to sell their crops through a government run co-op. The inherent problem with this practice is that the best beans were mixed with those of inferior quality.

This ineffective co-op system was successfully challenged by a few plantation owners who received special permission to sell their beans independently. Pointing to the empty burlap sack, which had once transported the highest quality raw coffee beans, the shop owner translated the Spanish words on the bag into English: **"reserved for the father."** The face of the man also printed on the burlap bag seemed to fit with the theme.

Reserved for the father - this is a banner we should all hang in our homes and in our places of work as a reminder that the best of everything we are or possess should be "reserved for the father." Of course I'm speaking of God, our Heavenly Father, the creator and sustainer of life. We read in Genesis: "So God created humankind in his image, in the image of God he created them; male and female he created them. God blessed them, and God said to them, "Be fruitful and multiply, and fill the earth and subdue it; and have dominion over the fish of the sea and over the birds of the air and over every living thing that moves upon the earth." "' (Genesis 1:27-28)

How important it is for us to remember that everything we have in life is a gift from God. God has blessed us according to his divine plan. Jesus warned his disciples, however, to be faithful and wise managers of what God has entrusted to us, saying, "From everyone to whom much has been given, much will be required; and from the one to whom much has been entrusted, even more will be demanded." (Luke 12:48b)

Today as we reflect upon all the many ways God has provided for us in life, we should ask ourselves what is the best of our produce, our product, and our investments in life?

These are the blessings we need to set aside and mark as **"reserved for the Father,"** for these are the gifts with which God has entrusted us in order that we might serve. The more we have, the more he asks us to reserve for his work, his glory: the proclamation of his Word in our world.

As I look around our community I often pray, "Lord challenge me to proclaim that, with so much given to so few, we have a responsibility to give that others might know of the love of the Father." Indeed, what have you reserved for the Father? Is it your best? Is it worthy of presenting to God that he may be honored as the creator, the redeemer and the sustainer of all life?

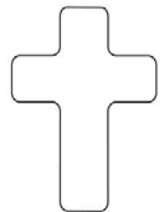
