Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ.

In 2010, we first went to New Orleans to do what we could to continue the clean-up from Katrina. Now we were headed back down with the same goal in mind. What would we find? It had been nine years since the storm had put 80% of the city under water. What could possibly be left undone? The vast majority of the city had been restored, the side that brings in revenue, but, the ninth ward, where most of the inhabitants are poor, black folk, trailed that restoration process. Two factors caused this situation. First, the insurance companies had a peculiar phrase in the agreements with these people which stated, "If a natural disaster occurred, payment of claims would be made first to the banks that held the mortgages." And that, of course, is what happened. Thousands of people who had been faithful in making their mortgage payments over the years ended up owning a decimated property with no funds to restore it to a livable state. Second, because FEMA had a horse trader in charge of the agency, no help was provided in an orderly fashion to assist the average person in how to proceed with contracts and contractors that swept into the city offering help. Unfortunately, many people were victims to unscrupulous contractors who took the money they had and skipped town. It was, indeed, a sorry state of affairs with no guidance from those from our government charged with caring for people at such a time.

Churches and nonprofit organizations rushed in to help fill the gap and performed miraculously. Our trip in 2010 had been under the direction of the Presbyterian Disaster Relief Organization. This trip was with the nonprofit organization formed to take over the work started by PDR, Project Homecoming. Just a few months prior to our arrival the federal government had taken an important step in helping the poorest of the city. The congress passed a bill that stated that anyone who had the clause in their insurance that gave first payment to the mortgage company could get a federal grant to rebuild their homes and that anyone who had been defrauded by a contractor could also receive federal money. Finally, Uncle Sam was stepping up to the plate.

When we arrived in New Orleans we found dumpsters positioned all over neighborhoods being filled with the refuse from homes in the process of restoration. Our job was to provide labor in order that the restoration money could be stretched to its fullest. So, down into the ninth ward we went guided by members of AmeriCorps. The streets were horrible. No city help down here. We drove down the cratered, heaved pavement to a house on a corner of Independence Street. It was nearing completion and we would be involved in putting some of the finishing touches on it. Spackling, painting, cutting and installing moldings around floors and windows, sanding the floors and cleaning, cleaning occupied us every day that week. The owner of this little five room house had been living in his workshop in the back yard from where he ran his lawnmower and tractor repair business. He came in every day to thank us and tell us how much what we were doing meant to him. The discomfort of high temperatures, high humidity and dusty, dirty work melted away with his visits. He moved home two weeks after we returned to Goshen.

It was hard work separated by good jazz, good food and a wonderful visit to the Mardi Gras Museum all done with a great group of people.

Love is also something you do.

#### OCTOBER SETTLES US INTO OUR FALL ROUTINE

Here we are once again with the season changing, the leaves starting to color, and everyone is back settling into their fall routine with school and work. I like fall; I revel in its glories.

A confession: I've sometimes gone into the sanctuary early on Sunday morning, sat at the organ bench, and contemplated, "what are we actually doing here?" Is this service going to make a difference in lives? Will our anthem touch someone's soul in a meaningful way? I started thinking about the elements of our worship service and how each one fits into a complete whole. Each Sunday we:

- Gather around the word
- Proclaim the word
- Respond to the word
- Share with Christ in the Eucharist
- Offer our gifts
- Receive a benediction for the week to come as we go out into the world
- Fellowship with other church family members at coffee hour

These themes are given life in our prayers, music, scripture reading, and sermon--all of which can summed up as "word" and "sacrament" with equal emphasis on both.

We sing hymns together as a community because song is response which engages the whole self in prayer and unites us together in common prayer as an assembled congregation. The choir ministers by leading the hymns and by offering its own prayer in the singing of an introit and anthem each Sunday. Our goal is to touch someone through song and allow the healing power of music to be felt. I think I've answered my own questions: we come to worship as a community of Christians and to recharge our souls for the week ahead. It is good to come together as a church family to worship, listen, sing, pray, and offer our gifts.

Each year the Jeff church hosts the Sullivan County CROP Walk – 10-5-14 - 1:30 sign-up, 2:00 Walk. It's a nice easy stroll – just one uphill stretch and the rest is flat or downhill. So sign up at http://hunger.cwsglobal.org/site/TR?fr\_id=19219&pg=entry (or simply search 'Sullivan County CROP Hunger Walk and this will come up) and bring your friends – a great fall day outdoors! Of course you know that 25% of what's raised will come back to us and we use these funds to support the county's Food Pantries (including the one at the Jeff church).

Speaking of which...

Our Food Pantry tried to give out fresh meat a few months ago, only to be told that folks don't have anywhere to cook it! Shortly afterward, a bunch of us watched the movie 'A Place at the Table' (available from Lori Hylton at the Presbytery office) and the HS (Holy Spirit) sprang into action, creative juices flowing. We have arranged for Cornell Cooperative Extension to come give a Slow Cooker cooking class for the folks who come to the Food Pantry, focusing on foods that can be received from the Food Pantry. But the best part is that we're purchasing slow cookers to give away to the folks from the pantry who come to the class. Most of them work long days and don't have the energy to cook (even if they did have a stove/oven). So having a slow cooker and a supply of good food will give them the chance to have a healthy meal waiting when they get home. We currently have 12-13 slow cookers in a variety of sizes. If you'd like to donate <u>new</u> slow cookers, they'd certainly be welcomed since we typically serve 30 families (the most has been 70).

It gets even better! Cornell has purchased vacuum-packing equipment. They will take the vegetables from our church garden and prepare/seal them for distribution and give the packages back to us, so we can give out 'soup kits'.

SO HERE'S HOW WE NEED YOUR HELP! We're putting together a cook book of our favorite easy slow cooker recipes (primarily soups and stews), recipes for which the majority of the ingredients would be available from the Food Pantry, to give away at the cooking class. We need RECIPES! Email your favorites to acwood@warwick.net. THANKS!!

Next...The Youth Economic Group, div. Rural & Migrant Ministries has found a new headquarters in the Liberty Methodist Manse. This is a group of high school students, from disadvantaged families, who are being taught how to put together a successful business model, implement it and reinvest the proceeds for continued business health. They manufacture tie-dyed bags and shirts which have been sold at General Assembly, Presbytery, etc. (hopefully at Goshen's Christmas Craft Fair) and they're GROWING! Having the Manse allows them to have a main street shop at their production facility, with meeting rooms and a bit of housing for the college intern/Assistant Coordinator. Louise Spencer and Sue Varden (bless them!) have joined me to help scrape, paint and otherwise ready the manse for use. Watch for notices of Work Days (coordinated by Presbybuild) on your email.

And, personally, perhaps the most exciting of all...

There's a lot that needs to be done in the County. But County officials seem to have their hands full. We've now got the beginnings of a County Clergy group going. All agreed that it's time for the churches to step up and play a role here. Our first step (an idea that came from Pastor Carlotta Wilson of Youngsville's Word of Life church) is an All Night Prayer Vigil for Sullivan County (ANPV, heretofore). Yesterday, we met for the first time at the meeting for County Connection (monthly meeting of Sullivan County Presbyterian Church representatives) to begin planning this ANPV. We've set the date! 4/10-11/15, 7:00 p.m. to 7:00 a.m. At the very least, this is the beginning of coordinated clergy conversations. At best, we hope to set some ideas in motion, get people involved, and help make Sullivan a happier, healthier place to live and work.

So that's about it. We had a wonderful VBS this summer. Our Sunday school is planning to collect canned goods to mail off to a mission in Belize. Lots happening! Come visit!!

It is that time again—with autumn cleaning starting, I am sure many of you are putting away items to donate to the annual church rummage sale. Maybe your neighbors or coworkers have items they would like to donate as well. The chairperson for this event is again Glynnis Jorgensen. She would be grateful to anyone who can help with this event, as many hands are needed to set-up during the week of the sale and to clean-up in the afternoon on Saturday, October 19.

Items can be brought in on Monday, October 20 through Thursday, October 23. Please don't bring in anything before that. Space is limited. <u>We need saleable items, no junk.</u> Items brought in should be **CLEAN**, not broken. We cannot sell chipped glassware, toys with missing parts, books without covers, items with missing pieces, or items with frayed electrical cords. We also <u>cannot sell</u> used computers or exercise equipment.

The better the items look, the more money we can get for them, so run those excess dishes through a wash cycle before you donate them, and try to pack items that are similar in the same boxes. This makes it so much easier for those setting up. The jewelry table does well, so clear out that costume jewelry from your jewelry boxes. New and usable items are always welcome as well. We accept toys with all the parts and furniture that is still in good condition. Holiday items also sell well in the fall.

Please offer a few hours of your time to this good fundraiser for your church. If you would like to help set-up, come at 5:00 p.m. Monday- Thursday (or whenever you can get there). Help is also needed during the sale and clean-up on Saturday. All church members should be able to donate an hour or two. We welcome all. Bring older children who can help as well. #### Gifts of Memorial and Celebration

From time to time, members and friends may make gifts to the Memorial Fund or the Dedicated Capital Gifts Program to honor or memorialize loved ones, or to celebrate special life occasions. The Dedicated Capital Gifts Program uses all contributions for the repair and restoration of the church. All other gifts shall be placed in the Memorial Fund. The Session may designate a specific use of such gifts if not designated by donor.

Memorial gifts for special causes (e.g., choir robes, hymnals) shall be reviewed by the committee moderator responsible for the designation and the Finance and Administration committee before they are accepted by the Session. Memorial gifts not designated for a specific purpose shall be placed in the Memorial Fund for use as determined by the Session.

Memorial gifts of anything to be placed in any area of the outdoor property of the church, (ie. trees, shrubbery, flowers) shall be proposed to, and reviewed by, the Property Management Committee before acceptance by the Session.

Acknowledgment shall be made by the Church Secretary of all gifts, whether designated or undesignated. All Memorial gifts shall be recorded in the Book of Remembrance.

Gifts of Property – Gifts of property, all non-monetary gifts, shall be approved by Session before the gift is accepted. Prior to this approval, the proposed gift shall be reviewed by the appropriate committee, the Property Committee and the Finance and Administration Committee.

Durability of Gifts – The donor of property, or monetary gifts designated to procure specific items, must be made aware prior to receipt of the gift that the gift is not made in perpetuity. While the gift may provide for a specific need at the time, future needs of the church may not include that need. The disposition of dedicated gifts shall be made in a manner that recognizes the sanctity of the gift.
