"Faith Matters"

"For everything there is a season, and a time for every purpose under heaven." (Ecclesiastes 3:1, ASV)

Dear Friends in Christ,

In 1974, my friend David Myers introduced me to the music of Pete Seeger. And one of my favorites of Pete's songs was "Turn, Turn," which is basically the first 8 verses of Ecclesiastes 3 put to music. The melody is lively and bright, but the lyrics are even more vivid as they talk about the changing seasons and the ways in which God makes use of time and the cycles of life to bring about God's "every purpose under heaven." I would not have learned that song in my home growing up as folk music wasn't received very well. (If it wasn't Bach, it wasn't good.) So this awakening to Seeger's use of scripture as an expression of faith and a trust in God's providence was glorious to me.

While first recorded by The Limeliters, it was The Byrds who made "Turn, Turn, Turn" a hit record. But it was Seeger who had envisioned a way to take some of the Bible's wisdom literature and turn it into a song, thereby creating a spirited and beautiful method for expressing our trust in God's spirit of intuitive imagining as it brings about the fullest expressions of life and faith.

Hearing the song again recently, I was reminded that just as there are cycles and seasons in human life, there are cycles and seasons in church life, too. As I mentioned in my follow-up letter to our CAT report, we're at a point in our life cycle where important decisions about the church's future must be made. Our ancestors in faith planted good seeds of faithful witness to Christ which we, in turn, have watered, weeded, nurtured and pruned. And some of those healthy seeds have grown to full blossom as God's Spirit has led us to worship with joy, pray with vigor, learn with eager curiosity, share with generosity, and make a difference each day as we serve in ministry in our little corner of the world.

But some of those seeds have also created struggles through the years, including struggles over matters of theology, liturgy, biblical interpretation and the mission of the church. Perhaps, then, it is time to "pluck up" some of what has been planted. Perhaps it's time to pluck up, for instance, the seed of opposition to change and replant the soil with seeds of imaginative risk-taking and an openness to new ways of knowing and sharing the Word of Christ in and around the community of Goshen. Perhaps it's time to recognize the seed of nostalgia for what it is—a potentially damaging lament—and strive to make new memories.

Over the next year, the Session will work with a consultant for discernment purposes as we move forward in faithful witness to the Lord. I'm sure you know that the pandemic has changed the way churches in America understand their role as prophets, truth-tellers and witnesses to the gospel. We can't take for granted anymore that the church will be full on Sunday mornings, that there will be a steady stream of income to keep the lights on, or that there are 40 people willing to serve as leaders

every year. And we can't consider livestreaming to be a temporary "fix." Virtual worship will become a standard option for most churches as they seek to reach out to the community.

We also can't give in to the longing to bring back the glory days of the church in the mid-20th Century. (The boom of the 50's and 60's was actually an anomaly by the way—it was a peculiarity in church growth brought about by our nation's victory in World War II and the desire to "nest.")

And, finally, we also can't be satisfied with primarily doing what is comfortable and known. We must be willing to "try on" new ways of doing ministry. We must be open to discussions about the role of the church in society today and how we, as agents of Christ's ministry on earth, are called and empowered to share an ancient but living gospel in a post-modern culture.

My friends, only God knows what the future holds for us. But the writer of Ecclesiastes reminds us that God has made everything beautiful "in its time," and that same God journeys with us as we enjoy the sweetness of life in these changing seasons.

Columbus Day

Just a reminder that the church office will be closed on Monday, October 11th in recognition of Columbus Day—or Indigenous Peoples Day, as some would say. The office will open up again the following morning at 9:00am.

Music Notes...



Choir is resuming its rehearsals. You're welcome to consider resuming your singing, or joining up! Thursdays in the Sanctuary, 7:30 PM. Even with social distancing there is room!

Handbells will resume soon. Your contributions to our worship services in the spring were invaluable, and remain deeply appreciated.

We're still planning on a Halloween event on Sunday, October 31, in the afternoon. Of course, that is subject to cancellation if necessary, but right now it's a "go."

The organ restoration, which you so generously funded, is moving ahead, most likely with a much-desired additional element which your gifts made possible. The organ is going back to its 1931 specifications (with a 1931 console, the cousin of our old one), and the original warm tonal palette. To that, we can now add a Swell Mixture. This will add a bright, sparkling, silvery tone that the original rather design didn't have. In the future, additions can be made easily if we choose; nothing in the current project will be irreversible or immutable.

Above all, the wiring will be correct, the instrument reliable, and the tone rich and warm again (and a bit sparkly!)

Last night (as I write this) I watched the ending of the Yom Kippur services on TV, broadcast from the Synagogue of the Hamptons. It was an Orthodox service, different from the Reform services I played for so many years. Still, I recognized the melodies—the *nusach*—from the Yizkor and N'ilah services, and then of the Reform Havdalah that followed on the same channel. It was all startlingly familiar, even after a lapse of years. I caught myself singing along. The closing service (N'ilah) I love in particular; the mode contains a few tantalizing major notes that suggest (to me) the rays of the setting sun. Light, even as the dark approaches. Hope, even as the gates begin to close. I continue to feel enriched by my work in the Jewish liturgical world.

Glad to share this journey with you.

Memorial Pavers

To order a memorial paver to honor or remember your loved ones, please see Pat in the church office. The cost of each paver is only \$100. We will place an order when we have 10 requests (as of now we only have one order).

Only 3 Niches Remain Available for Purchase in the Memorial Columbarium

Each niche allows for double or single interment with three purchase options:

Payment in Full = \$2,800

12-Month Payment Option = \$250 / month for 12 months (\$3,000) 18-Month Payment Option = \$180 / month for 18 months (\$3,240)

We will need to consider constructing a 2^{nd} and 3^{rd} columbarium wall soon. The estimated cost for these two new walls is \$40,000+.


THE KID'S PAGE

MAKE A REMINDER BOARD

Sometimes we need something to help us remember things. A Reminder Board can help.


You will need:

- a piece of cardboard (one side of a cereal box works well)
- white or colored contact paper
- a hole punch
- scissors
- clothes pin (the kind with a spring)
- \land glue
- wipe-off marker



How to make it:

- 1. Cut the contact paper a little larger than the cardboard.
- 2. Stick the contact paper to the cardboard, folding the edges over to the back.
- 3. Punch 2 holes at the top.
- 4. Tie yarn to the holes to make a hanger.
- 5. Glue the clothes pin to the front. When dry, it will hold the marker.
- **6.** Write notes on your new reminder board!
