Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

“Arise and eat, for the journey is too great for you.” (1 Kings 19:7)

As I enjoyed watching the Olympics, my mind got turning as I watched scores of athletes expending themselves in pursuit of their goals.

When long-distance runners or cyclists hit a state of depletion, it is usually a sign that something is going wrong. The body is beginning to shut down. Runners call it “hitting the wall.” Cyclists call it “bonking.” Whatever you call it, if you are an athlete, you don’t want it happening to you.

As strange as it seems to us, unlike physical depletion, a depleted soul is not always a mistake. In fact, God often has a design in our depletion. If we’ll linger with Elijah under the broom tree, we might detect what God’s design is. Here are five lessons drawn directly from the text:

1. A depleted and empty soul is not the same thing as a loss of faith; people of faith find themselves in this valley of emptiness (19:1-9).

Throughout the entire story, Elijah is in constant conversation with God. This is the essence of a life of faith. Faith is insisting that in all things (questions, complaints, doubts, everything) we must deal with God. People of faith experience this depletion, this emptiness of soul.

2. Our depletion and emptiness of soul may be grounded in a disordered view of reality (19:2-4).

When Elijah stood on Mt. Carmel, God was the defining reality of his life. God was large; Baal and his prophets were small. Jezebel and Ahab were small. But under the broom tree, Elijah’s view of reality changed. Jezebel was suddenly large and threatening, and God was small. How does this happen?

3. Depletion of soul and body are connected (19:5-7).

When God responds to Elijah’s complaint, God does so with bread and water and sleep. Spiritual depletion and physical exhaustion are integrally connected. Sometimes the best thing you can do for your soul involves taking good care of your body. Eating and sleeping can be spiritual disciplines.

4. In our depletion God is bringing us to himself; be patient with this journey (19:8).

The journey from Beersheba to Mt. Horeb can be done on foot in about fourteen days. However, God led Elijah on a forty-day journey. In our depletion, God is at work to bring us to himself. That might take longer than we expect. Be patient with the journey.

5. Depletion is remedied by hearing the word of God in a fresh and personal way (19:9).

On Mt. Horeb, Elijah heard God’s voice in a powerful way. The word of God came to him and restored his vision of reality and renewed his call. What we need more than anything in our depletion is the voice of God in a fresh and personal way.

You may not be school-age, but you can embark on learning something new or sharing your gifts as a learner, a teacher, a singer, or an organizer.



A good affirmation to set for yourself might be: "You know, come September, I am going to expand my horizons just like I did when I used to start back to school each September. I am going to get involved in a new learning activity, be open to new experiences, and see where the journey takes me. I will look forward to September and going 'back to school' in a new way as an adult."

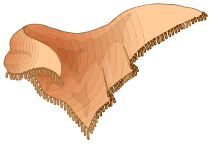

We have met our goal, and we have sent out over one thousand gifts since we started. That in itself is quite a feat for a few ladies with crochet hooks.

The thank-you binder is bulging, so the cards that have come in recently have gone into a box for safekeeping. Eventually, we will find a place to keep them.

Darlene Bartley made some shawls and attached pocket shawls (which can be removed to put in a pocket), so they can be used when it is not feasible to take the large shawls. What a great idea! She also sent Robin Roberts of ABC News a shawl for her and her sister. Robin had breast cancer several years ago and now has MDS (bone marrow) cancer. She will get a transplant from her sister in the future. I am sure they appreciate the kindness and all our prayers.

Barbara Hankins took it upon herself to organize the supply of yarn that we have gathered in the past few years. Some of the yarn needed to be sorted into colors and weights. It was a job that needed to be done, and, like most of us, I put it off, too. Thanks, Barbara! Remember ladies, if you need yarn, check the shawl room first.

Laura Colacci has taken the idea of the pocket shawl and made it into a heart shape. She is also working on writing our prayers in a beautiful calligraphy so we can copy and send them out in our folders. I know this will be sincerely appreciated. There is a basket of pocket shawls in the narthex if you know of someone who might need one. Just take what you need.

Thanks to everyone who kept crocheting the summer away. Our supply has always been there when the needs arose. If anyone in the congregation needs a shawl to give, please do not hesitate to get one. In the shawl room are tissue paper, gift bags, folders, and prayers to make your gift special.

HAVE YOU GOTTEN YOUR BUCKET?

You may be asking yourself, "What bucket?"

Well, back in May, we started a fundraiser to raise money for the repair of the leaking roof above the sanctuary and for a new roof for the manse. We tried to think of a way that is painless and easy to do. We had a brief fundraising meeting, and Wendy had the idea of having a little house that we could fill with change. We all tried to find one, but we were unsuccessful.

After checking several places, I came up with the bucket idea and shared it with several people. I then purchased and donated enough buckets for our 120 church families. We have given out about forty and have about eighty buckets (one per family) left. The slogan is, "FILL ME WITH CHANGE, NOT RAIN." We are asking you to put your loose change into the bucket, bring it to church at least once a month, and empty its contents into the large pail located in the front of the church.

Since we started fourteen weeks ago, we have collected a little over \$1,400, and we were able to patch the roof above the sanctuary. The poster at the front of the church shows how much we are collecting. Each blue or green tile is worth \$100. We need to raise a total of \$8,000 to complete both projects, and with your generous donations so far and your continued support, we can do this.

If you have not yet received a bucket, please see me or Grover vonPentz at church. If you stop by the church office during the week, Pat also has some.

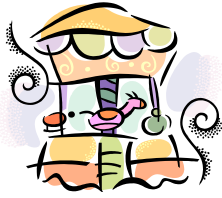

JOPLIN MISSION TRIP

A Moving Experience

JOPLIN, MO. – Ed Hanna is like many of us, finding it hard to make ends meet during this recession. He sold his restaurant and was starting a catering business out of his home. He had difficult financial choices to make. He decided to let his homeowner's insurance lapse. A month later, the deadliest tornado in America in the past sixty-four years cut a mile-wide, six-mile-long path of destruction through the city of Joplin.

There was little advance warning. Ed grabbed up two of his three dogs, ran through the kitchen, and headed to the cellar door in the rear of the house. Just then, his back door blew off its hinges. Ed ran back to the kitchen and crouched on the floor next to the dishwasher, his dogs still in his arms. But seconds later, the kitchen window blew out and his two dogs blew out the window with it. About eight long minutes later, the tornado took its 200 mph winds and moved out.

One of the many miracles of that day was that Ed's two dogs made their way back to their home. Two days later, his third dog, the eldest, was found trapped under the rubble in what was once his bedroom. While he survived, the dog passed away months later.

There were twelve of us who had the opportunity during five days in August to help rebuild Ed's house. He would stop by on his lunch hour and after work to marvel at the progress and thank us for being there. He was a soft-spoken, likeable guy. He brought his boss from his temporary job with Job Corp. to show her and sent a friend who has donated appliances to him to stop by to see us. He had a journal for volunteers to sign because he wanted to remember all of us.

The view from the second story of Ed's house, in all directions, is of a barren landscape where the dirt blows freely across the vacant lots, to which people have decided not to return. In the far distance is the shell of what was once a hospital. Eventually it, too, will come down. There is some building activity going on, but less than expected. There are fewer volunteers, too. Down the street, an elderly man sits in a rocking chair on the front porch of a new home, not yet ready to move into. A hand-written sign says "THE MIRACLE IS THAT I SURVIVED." No one was working on his house the week we were there.

Our twelve-person team (eight from our church, a pastor from Union Presbyterian, two PresbyBuild workers from Calvary Presbyterian, and a Habitat worker from Montgomery) were able to use our skills, and learn some new ones, to bring Ed that much closer to his Move-In-Day. The last thing we did before we left Friday afternoon was re-hang the original front door which we had stripped, sanded, refinished and in which we had installed new hand-frosted glass. The door was hung, the polished brass knob and hinges were shined, and we know that when Ed sees it, he will be proud.
