Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

John 6:41-51

Then the Jews began to complain about him because he said, "I am the bread that came down from heaven." They were saying, "Is not this Jesus, the son of Joseph, whose father and mother we know? How can he now say, 'I have come down from heaven'?" Jesus answered them, "Do not complain among yourselves. No one can come to me unless drawn by the Father who sent me; and I will raise that person up on the last day. It is written in the prophets, 'And they shall all be taught by God.' Everyone who has heard and learned from the Father comes to me. Not that anyone has seen the Father except the one who is from God; he has seen the Father. Very truly, I tell you, whoever believes has eternal life. I am the bread of life. Your ancestors ate the manna in the wilderness, and they died. This is the bread that comes down from heaven, so that one may eat of it and not die. I am the living bread that came down from heaven. Whoever eats of this bread will live forever; and the bread that I will give for the life of the world is my flesh."

There is much in the Gospel of John that I love. Yet there also is much that can be troubling. Sometimes we have to dig through layers of culture and context to find the beauty. I often can't find the beauty without naming the ugly. If one is not careful, this text could be used to justify Christian supremacy. At this point in the text, the church does not exist and Jesus and his disciples are having a dialogue with their Jewish peers—because Jesus and the disciples were Jewish. The writer of John seeks to convince the readers of Jesus' divinity. In his perspective, we find wisdom and meaning. But we must remember that when we read John criticizing "the Jews" in gross generalizations, that's a problem we must not repeat towards Judaism or any other religion or group of people.

What I love about this passage is Jesus' bread metaphor. Bread is made through a disruptive chemical reaction—flour, sugar, yeast, water. Its shape physically changes with the combination of ingredients and the appropriate temperature. Although bread tastes and smells delicious, the making of it is disruptive and transformative to its ingredients. Jesus refers to himself as the living bread, which he gives for the life of the world. It's another way of trying to imagine the power of internalizing Jesus' message of love, inclusion, justice, and healing. It literally transforms us. We become part of Jesus' body and can join in the bread-making of the world. It's hopeful to imagine how a little yeast and a little sugar—a little compassion for one another and the courage to seek change as Jesus did—can really make a difference in this world.

The New Guy on Stewardship

Hi! I'm Ken Phelan, your newly minted Elder and I'm here to talk to you a little about Stewardship.

First, a quick public service announcement for any of you who have not served on a Presbyterian committee. Apparently, when someone voices an idea, like "Hey, we should put something in the newsletter about stewardship," what that really sounds like to the committee is "Hey, I'd really like to write something about stewardship for the newsletter." Just so you know, be prepared to actually do stuff or keep your bright ideas to yourself.

Anyway, stewardship is a difficult conversation. I'm guessing that you and I share a couple things in common. First, we work hard for our money, and second we really don't have any extra at the end of the month. I do have a recurring dream that I'm in my office paying bills and I call up to my wife and ask if there's any more room under the mattress for all the extra money we have in the checking account but so far, it hasn't happened. I guess God knew what he was doing when he asked for our first fruits instead of our leftovers.

Having said that, I think it's important that we prayerfully consider our giving and I'll share a couple of things that I keep in mind about giving to the church.

Churches spend their money in a lot of ways but I often break it into two buckets, inside and outside. Inside spending has to do with the stuff we need as a church and we need a lot. The building, the pastor, the roof, etc. Outside spending is the money we spend helping our neighbors in the world. At First Presbyterian Goshen, we do a lot of this, too; Community Dinners, schools in Albania, Midnight Runs, Habitat for Humanity, etc. Too often, our giving stops at inside issues and fails to support outside issues sufficiently. The inside stuff has to be where we start, not where we end. I believe that as Christians it's our job to fund a church that can be generous outside.

I also try to contextualize my giving with the rest of my spending. As a kid, my family went to a small financially struggling Episcopal church. As many of you probably know, when you're involved with a church like that, you're fully involved. Growing up, I mowed the lawn, cleaned the church, and did every fundraiser. I felt like I practically lived at the church. When I was lucky enough to find someone to marry me, I went to the priest, who I had known almost my whole life, to make the arrangements. I was shocked and frankly insulted when he told me that he expected me to pay to get married in *my* church. Really?! I hadn't done enough? He looked me in the eye and said, "Tell me about the reception." So I told about the super nice place we had picked out and all the stations at the cocktail hour. Then he said, "What about the band?" Oh, great band, 9 pieces, going to be fantastic. "And the flowers?" Great too. He looked me in eye and said, "You can pay whatever you want. I know the church and the service isn't nearly as important as the reception, I get that. We certainly can't compete with a 9 piece band. But maybe you can put us on the same level of importance as the flowers? What do you think?"

So, when I think about giving, I think about the other places my money is going and how that fits into what's important in my life. I'm not trading one thing for the other, just trying to level the playing field. I'm not giving up going out for dinners or my kid's karate classes, but maybe my church giving can be somewhere in that neighborhood.

Anyway, that's just a couple of thoughts I have. I know that we have a generous and thoughtful congregation, that's why I joined and why I'm glad to be an Elder. I'm confident that the work of the Stewardship Committee combined with the nature of our congregation will provide all that we need to meet our mission as a church family. Look forward to seeing you on Sunday.
