Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Holiness or Havoc? Passing the Peace during Worship

For some, passing the peace is the best time of the service; it's warm, friendly, and joyous. For others, the passing of the peace is disruptive, chaotic, and annoying.

Why do we do it? What does it have to do with worship? What should we get out of it? What should we put into it? How can we accept the passing of the peace as an integral part of worship and understand our role during that time?

According to scholars, the tradition dates from the earliest days of the Christian church. The Apostle Paul encouraged believers to greet one another with a "holy kiss." Jesus said, "Peace be with you," many times when speaking with people. About thirty years ago, the passing of the peace was incorporated back into many Protestant services.

As Robert W. Bertram said in a sermon titled *Forgiving One Another Out Loud*, "The passing of the peace, while it does have an element of greeting about it, is not meant primarily as a greeting. Primarily, it is Christians forgiving one another now that God in Christ has forgiven them." Through our corporate confession and celebration of the Eucharist, we are capable of passing to one another the peace we have just received, a spiritual peace. The passing of the peace is a way to experience the divine presence of the Christ.

The time of passing the peace is indeed a joyous time, but it is not a big party. As we greet one another saying, "The peace of Christ be with you" or "Peace be with you" and hear the reply, "And also with you," we are participating in a ritual of unity in the Spirit. We are not rushing around to get the latest news, check up on the past week, or make a date for lunch following the worship service; we are participating in worship just as much as while we are praying, singing, or listening to the scriptures.

Passing the peace is not about us. It is about what God has done for us in Christ, as we have been forgiven and freed to love one another, to pass that love and peace to one another, and then to go out into the world to serve in the name of Christ.

POST-EASTER: LIVING THE FAITH

Our looking forward to Christ's birth, longing for the Messiah to come, has been fulfilled. Our journey with Jesus through his teaching ministry, ending with his death and resurrection, is now complete. What's next?

Now comes the response of believing Christians in the first years following his death and resurrection. They must have asked, "How do we continue this ministry of the Gospel of Jesus?" It's our quest today as well.

I'm feeling it is time to revisit the ministries of Jesus—his passions. Who did he stop along the way to talk to? What miracles did he do, and what were the meanings behind them? What were the real teachings? What does it all have to do with me?

Perhaps we might move into a time of exploration, of taking a fresh look at Jesus' life and work, of questioning our faith. Not in doubting, but in the implications for living. How do we live our lives? Who matters to us? Do we have any broader concerns and outreach beyond our own homes? Who's out there that needs our help—the homeless, neighbors struggling to survive, people needing friendship, people that are lonely, those feeling down, those away from friends and family, those that are sick, or those in war-torn countries. Need is everywhere we turn—look around. As a great spiritual leader once said, "You needn't travel to a far-off place, climb a mountain, or meditate in a cave for enlightenment. Just walk outside your door; it's right there in front of you—someone needing your help."

We have a very active congregation in which many members are already living their lives in response to the call of Jesus to serve. I encourage even more of you to look around, observe the ministries and outreach here at First Presbyterian Church, and take the step to join in and help. Committees are already functioning, ready to guide you and show you the ways you can help. It will turn your life around, and you will be responding to the call of Jesus and following in his footsteps as he did the same thing on Earth.

In our music ministry during the upcoming months, we will continue to explore new forms of musical expression to convey the Gospel. The message is always the same, although the form may change to reach different groups of folks among us. Our music ministry asks the same question—what can we do musically to inspire and challenge the faithful to reach out and live their faith? Our music program is, like each of us, on a journey of discovery as we also seek to live lives of Christian service. Join with us, lend your talents, and help us as we explore our music ministry in this church. You could be a missionary just by singing, playing hand bells, or playing an instrument.

Prayer Shawl Ministry

Crocheting for a Cause Ministry's Power of Giving

GOSHEN - Hook in, yarn over, pull through.

Father, Son, Holy Ghost.

Wendy Paffenroth does everything in threes when crocheting her prayer shawls. Three rows of single crochet, three colors, three corners to her patterns that bring comfort and joy to the community.

Paffenroth and about 14 other women are part of The First Presbyterian Church Prayer Shawl Ministry, which began in September and has since given out more than 100 shawls as well as baby blankets, scarves and lap robes. The women gather each Sunday in the church parlor – a cozy, corner room decorated with watercolor paintings and old-fashioned couches – to crochet and gab the afternoon away.

The group came to be after church member Darlene Bartley read Debbie Macomber's "Back On Blossom Street," a tale of women knitting prayer shawls. She was inspired to bring members of her church together, and quickly had a large group of women – from beginner to experienced crocheters – gathering every week.

While the group says an opening and closing prayer before crocheting, members believe it's the power of giving that brings comfort as much as the blessing of the garment. Recipients especially appreciate the love and care put into a gift that is homemade, Paffenroth said.

"It's a constant reminder that they're not alone," Anne Wood of Goshen said.

Paffenroth knows well how much comfort her work has brought, as the people she's touched with her crocheting send effusive thank-yous. One woman, who Paffenroth met in a doctor's waiting room, said she remembers her conversation with Paffenroth every night she wraps herself in the shawl.

"They really appreciate it, because it's something you put your time into," Darlene Bartley said.

The recipients of the shawls aren't necessarily church members or friends or family. The crocheters keep their ears open for a recipient, and send along their work. And the shawls aren't always given for comfort; some are for celebration.

The group made an elaborate shawl for two deacons at their church who recently married. "They've knit their lives together to be one," Paffenroth said.

The prayer shawl ministry meets from noon to 2 p.m. Sundays at First Presbyterian Church, 33 Park Place, Goshen. For more information, call 294-7991.

PROJECT LINUS—Carolyn and Betty attended the workshop in February. Over eleven thousand blankets have been distributed to children in crisis.

HABITAT AND PRESBYBUILD—Bill attended the meeting on March 14 at 4 p.m. in Cornwall. Two main items were discussed: 1) Information and sponsor sheets concerning the April 27 Habitat Walk are now available. This is a wonderful family opportunity. Teach the kids about helping others by example, and spend the afternoon doing something fun with them. 2) A talent show will be held for PresbyBuild on May 17 in Monroe. This is the same night that the fifth annual Comedy for a Cause Show will be held at Goshen High School.

COMEDY FOR A CAUSE—This year's show will feature some of the most talented Goshen High School kids along with professional comedian Brett Leake (who has had several appearances on The Tonight Show and is a national regular on the Jerry Lewis telethon. Brett has muscular dystrophy and is as inspirational as he is hilarious.) Closing the show is Chaz Elstner, who has had over thirty-six different T.V. appearances. As always, half the money goes to our FOOD PANTRY!!! The other half goes toward Goshen High School college scholarships.

FOOD PANTRY—Our French toast breakfast was a big hit! It was a busy morning as over one hundred families were served! The number of needy families in our community has been on the rise. We distributed over 275 bags of food, and each family received a ShopRite gift card. Our shelves have been alarmingly empty lately. "Scouting For Food" has helped and people are very generous around the holidays, but it's the times in between that have us worried. Our committee will make more frequent announcements to remind people that there is a very real need for donations.

If you know of anyone (a friend, family member, or even your arch-nemesis) in need of help or are currently experiencing some tough times yourself, please see Bill or Carolyn, our representatives and board members for the food pantry, and they will very discretely supply you with needed groceries.

FISH DINNER—We are aiming for a date in November to have a "Tastefully British" fish dinner. The Boy Scouts would be willing to help us with this fundraiser. We'll do the preparation and baking, and they'll do the running!
