Striving and Stillness

*...judgment without mercy will be shown to anyone who has not been merciful. Mercy triumphs over judgment
(James 2:13)*

Tyler Wigg-Stevenson is the author of *The World is Not Ours to Save: Finding the Freedom to Do Good*. I'm intrigued by the book's provocative title.

Skimming the opening pages, I came across a sentence that seems to capture the intent of the book and the meaning of the title. Wigg-Stevenson argues that the spirit of activism that pervades much of contemporary Christianity "engages issues in such a way that presupposes that, or at least acts as if, the human condition can be changed through human effort — that the world is ours to save. This is a problem" (p. 12).

The 'Yes' and the 'No'

Notice how the title combines a negation and an affirmation. On one hand, we are not meant to be the world's saviors. That's not our job. And yet, positively, we eagerly strive to do good in this world. We are called to engage the world in its most broken places. We do so freely, not begrudgingly. The author fears that we are headed for "cause fatigue" unless we sink the roots of our well-doing into some rich theological soil.

This week I've been thinking about what it means to "love mercy." I looked at Jesus' well-known story of the Good Samaritan, told only by Luke (Luke 10:25–37). In order to get a full picture of what mercy is and how we are to love our neighbor, we need to keep reading. Luke shares another story with us right on the heels of the Good Samaritan — a story about sitting still and listening to the words of Jesus.

Mercy from a Full Heart

Professor Charles Talbert of Baylor University observes that these two stories are strategically placed side by side. The stories of the Good Samaritan on the Jericho road and Mary seated at Jesus' feet are both designed to show us what it means to live out the great commandment: to love God and love neighbor.

If we refuse to sit still and be attentive to the words of Jesus, we will exhaust ourselves in doing mercy. And, if we never move with compassion toward what is broken, we have not truly heard the words of Jesus.

There is good for you to do as you move into this day. There are people who need compassionate acts of kindness and mercy, and God sends you into this world to mirror who He is as you love your neighbor. But, before you rush headlong into whatever this day holds for you, be still. Let your mercy flow from a full heart.

APRIL – HE IS RISEN! HE IS RISEN INDEED!

We began our Lenten Journey at the end of February, we moved into Palm Sunday and Holy Week at the end of March, and now we arrive at Easter Sunday and a glorious celebration of the resurrection. We enter the sanctuary in darkness and silence, the first fire of Easter is lit, the choir sings an Easter acclamation, then -- the black curtains are pulled from the windows, the Easter lilies are revealed, and we join in our processional hymn, *Jesus Christ Is Risen Today!* The choir will be presenting an Easter anthem, *Christ Is Risen! Alleluia!*, and Mary Lee Farris will be singing, *The Holy City*. Easter Sunday is always a joyous occasion in word and song as we celebrate the foundation of our Christian faith – the Resurrection of Our Lord.



At this time the world around us is awakening from winter slumber, we sense our inner being becoming more alive, we feel the longing to get outside and soak up the warmth. Yet we also pause weekly to recharge and reenergize as we come together to worship and fellowship with one another. I find that our weekly coming together provides the stability, the structure, and the renewal that we need to face whatever may confront us in our daily lives. As we listen to the joys and concerns each week, we learn that out of the clear blue sky any number of things can happen to us when we least expect it. If we are vigilant in the practice of our faith, we can be better prepared for life's unexpected events.

The "Soul Food" we so desperately need is right before us -- prayer, readings from scripture, reminders of our fellow Christians in need of prayer and healing, hymns of faith, and words of wisdom from the sermon. Our services are deep wells from which we can drink, and we follow Jesus' command and take communion for our hungry souls to nourish us spiritually for the week ahead.

As we allow the Holy Spirit to indwell us and open our hearts, we are promised in Galatians 5:22-23:

But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, longsuffering, gentleness, goodness, faith, meekness, and temperance . . .

Thank you to everyone who placed yarn into our bin in the narthex during the February yarn drive! Every time a few skeins of yarn go into the bin, another gift can go out. I read recently that a shawl ministry in the south asks each member of the congregation to donate one skein of any kind to their shawl ministry each year. They place a huge basket on the chancel, and when everyone comes forward for communion, they place the yarn in the basket. The basket overflows with the colors, and it is a joy they look forward to each year. By the end of the service, they had amassed over 200 skeins of all types and colors. The ladies then create some of the most beautiful gifts – like the shepherd Joseph’s “coat of many colors” given to him by his father, Jacob (*Genesis 37*). With the abundance of yarn skeins, they have to use their talents to come up with some very unique and unusual shawls. This is a wonderful idea for the future. Any takers?

My daughter was invited to a crochet /knitting group at a Methodist church in Tennessee where she has been attending. During the meeting, she told them about our PSM, and they were very interested. She asked if she could share our prayers and poems with them along with some of the articles we have had in the paper and in our *Tower Tie*. I immediately put a box together and also added the book that got us started in 2007 for them to share. It will be interesting to see what the feedback is from them.

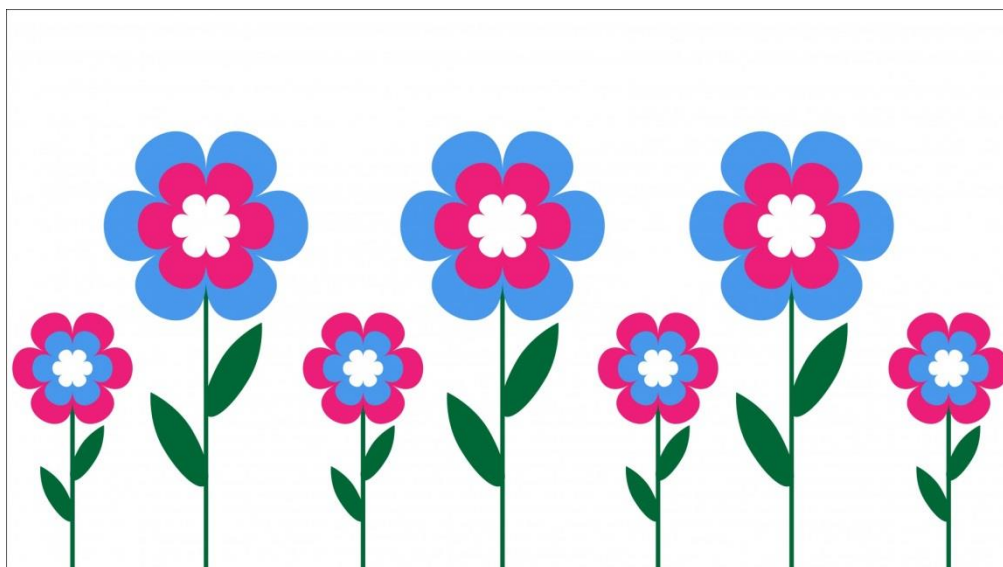
