All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me . . . (Matt. 28:18)

In my mind, Jesus' Great Commission has forever begun with the word, "Go." If I were to try and say those words by memory, that's where I would start. And I would very likely slip into the Elizabethan English of the King James Bible. "Go ye." That's how I learned those words, soaking them in throughout my childhood in Sunday school classes and Vacation Bible Schools, sermons and songs.

Somehow in my mind "the great commission" became "the great go-mission." But every time I open the Bible and actually read the words that Jesus spoke, I'm confronted with my error. Jesus is already speaking before he gets to the word "go." If we begin with "go," we're late to the party, and what we miss out on just might be critical for how we go or whether we go at all.

"All authority in heaven and one earth has been given to me."

This is the opening line of the great commission. Jesus doesn't begin with us and what we do, he begins with himself and who he is, his authority over all things in heaven and on earth.

We can think about this in a couple of ways. For starters, Jesus' statement about his authority sounds like it compels our obedience to his command to go and make disciples. Since Jesus has authority, we need to take seriously what he says. And if he says "go," we go.

But there is a different way that authority works in our lives, and this may be what Jesus wants us to know. His authority over all things doesn't simply compel obedience, it fills us with confidence. Without this confidence we will not go and carry out his mission.

If we skip this opening line and begin with 'go' we are likely to go in our own authority. And when we take on a spiritual calling in our own authority, things get weird. We become pushy. We do violence to others. We are not relaxed. We find it hard to love. We neglect prayer.

There is plenty to talk about when it comes to the word "go." What does going look like? Where does going lead us? These are good questions, but they are not a good beginning. Unless we are convinced that Jesus is indeed alive and actively accomplishing his will in this world, we will not go at all.

Maybe as you read this you're getting ready to go somewhere. Today, before you go, take a moment and give thanks to Jesus for his authority over all things. The decisions you're facing at work, the parenting tasks that consume your thoughts, the errands you need to run, and the people you'll encounter – Jesus has authority over all of those things. He is already at work in those places and his commission is an invitation to join him there. So go. But before you go, rest in his authority. And pay attention. Wherever you go, Jesus is already there.

APRIL MOVES US FORWARD INTO SPRING

We have made our Lenten journey, lived with our Lord through Holy Week, and celebrated the Resurrection on Easter Sunday. He is alive! We continue our journey with Jesus during the seven-Sunday season of Easter that starts on Easter day, March 27 and continues through Pentecost on May 15.



The world around us is awakening from winter's slumber, we sense our inner being becoming more alive, we feel the longing to get outside and soak up the warmth. Yet we also pause weekly to recharge and reenergize as we come together to worship and fellowship with one another. I still hold to the dictum that our weekly coming together provides the stability, the structure, and the renewal that we need to face whatever may confront us in our daily lives. Life is uncertain.

We learned that with the passing of Lori Baird so suddenly. Life is a precious gift. If we are vigilant in the practice of our faith, we can be better prepared for life's unexpected events when they do occur.

The "Soul Food" we so desperately need is right before us -- prayer, readings from scripture, reminders of our fellow Christians in need of prayer and healing, hymns of faith, and words of wisdom from the sermon. Our services are deep wells from which we can drink, as we follow Jesus' command and take communion for our hungry souls to nourish us spiritually for the week ahead. We are a community of faith.

Then she said, "How did you know my living room was green? The shawl is perfect for the room!" I didn't know, but I think God directs where our gifts go and which ones go where.
- ➤ I also recently heard from a mom in North Carolina whose daughter, a young principal in the area, is battling brain cancer. We sent a shawl a year ago when my girlfriend told me of this situation. Jackie said that Katie still uses her shawl and loves it so much; she always has it with her during treatments too. We wish Katie a full recovery and an easy time with treatments.
