Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

It's hard to believe that Thanksgiving and Advent are almost here! As all of us enter into this season that is so beautiful and celebrative, as well as intense and often overwhelming, it's good to begin with thanksgiving, the verb. If we look at Luke's Gospel and the story of the Last Supper, we find that Jesus gave thanks (thanks + giving) to God for the bread as he broke it. The word thanksgiving in Greek is eucharistia which is where we get the word Eucharist. That's one reason why we call communion the meal of thanksgiving and celebration.

But what was Jesus thanking God for? In his life, Jesus always reflected two great realities. The first was the reality that his life and our lives are created, loved, and sustained by God. The second reality was that Jesus knew that the bread he held in his hands didn't just fall from heaven. He knew that bread was a practical reality of his life and that someone grew the wheat, harvested it, threshed it, ground it by hand, bought it, mixed it with muscle and skill into dough, shaped it into loaves, baked it with wood that had been gathered, and then finally, cooled before it was ready to sell. Bread was something to be thankful for.

As we enter into Advent and look both to the past of Christ's birth and to the future hope of his return, we often think about Jesus in ways that are mixed with heavy doses of fairytale-like thinking about his life. But Jesus giving thanks can help us find a stronger and more helpful rock to stand on during the holiday season. When we imitate him in our lives, as he asked us to do, we find that giving thanks to God for the daily care and sustenance of our lives creates a whole new way of relating to God and to our lives. Giving thanks daily, in spite of circumstances, helps us to begin to rest in God more fully. In addition, we discover that giving thanks is an attitude of the mind that reflects the reality of the heart. As we know, the attitude of our mind is something we choose every morning. It's one thing to know that our lives are rooted in God as if that was a piece of information from the library, but it is another thing to respond to that knowledge by being open to its reality and choosing to trust in it by the simple act of giving thanks to God.

Jesus knew the reality of putting bread on the table and even going without bread. But he also knew that the greater part of life's reality is God's love for us, daily. So in his simple act of giving thanks, Jesus showed us the attitude of his mind that was rooted in the knowledge of God's love in his heart. So, may we give thanks for the bread on the table and the love of God all around us and within us.

ADVENT – A SEASON OF PREPARATION



We completed the church liturgical year on the last Sunday in November with Christ the King. Our national Thanksgiving holiday has been celebrated, and now we begin a new church year as we look forward to the coming of the Messiah to Earth as incarnated in Jesus the Christ. As we prepare our hearts inwardly, we also see the Advent wreath in the sanctuary -- a visual reminder of the season. Each Sunday, we light a different candle on the wreath and sing our hymn of preparation for that Sunday. The sanctuary is swathed in greenery, the tree goes up,

and our music helps us to focus on the coming of Jesus to earth. It is a beautiful time of year.

The choir will be opening our Advent season with *Advent Celebration* and *Advent Prayer* – two very beautiful moving anthems focusing our hearts and minds on the coming of the Christ.

On Advent III, December 15, we will hear from the spirited youth in our Christian education program, who always reflect the joys of innocence in their exuberant expressions of faith. When I see shepherds, angels, and all the costumes, they always take me back to another time -- "Ah, yes, I did that, too, once upon a time."

On Advent IV, December 22, the choir will be presenting a **Celebration of Carols**. We open with the Swedish carol *Rejoice, It Is Christmastime* followed by choruses of *O Thou Joyful, O Thou Wonderful*, the French carol, *Sing We Now of Christmas*, and the beloved Polish melody *Infant Holy, Infant Lowly*. It is the final Sunday before we celebrate together the Nativity of our Lord on Christmas Eve. We welcome you to come hear the carols and enjoy the music of Christmas. Catch the spirit!



We are again presenting our traditional candlelight **Service of Lessons and Carols** on Tuesday evening, December 24. This service originated on Christmas Eve 1880 and has been repeated worldwide by Christians down through the ages. The most famous service is conducted annually in Kings College Chapel, Cambridge, England. The famous boy choir was first broadcast by the BBC on Christmas Eve 1928 and can now be heard worldwide. I will be listening to the service on my computer or PBS radio on Tuesday morning, December 24. Historically, the service begins with singing, *Once in Royal David's City*.



The Presbyterian Church (USA) follows the same format of readings and carols as well. We will be joining our voices with Christians around the world as we celebrate the birth of Jesus. Hearing *O Holy Night* sung by Mary Lee Farris and singing *Silent Night* together with our candles raised are highlights of the service for me. The luminaries will be lighting the path to the church doors, and it will be a special time for all.

Come prepare your hearts with prayer and longing for the coming of the Messiah. In the midst of the frantic season, take time to be quiet and reflect on the true nature of what is taking place -- we are getting ready for the birth of a child. This is a season of hope, joy, peace, and love. Let us feel those themes in our hearts as each week passes and leads up to Christmas Eve's celebration of the birth of Jesus, our Savior.

There is a new library at the First Presbyterian Church! Hannah Welshoff, Kristen Gotsis, and Kate Laskoski worked together to create this library and a library at HONOR EHG (Helping Others Needing Our Resources, Emergency Housing Group) as their Silver Project for Girl Scouts. The church library will serve children who are interested in learning more about God and the shelter library will help children who need to pass the time in a positive way during a difficult time in their lives.

Several years ago the former church library was dismantled and replaced by the cell tower equipment. The girls thought it would be a good idea to get all those books out of storage and back in a bookcase. They sorted through the old books and rebuilt the bookcase. This involved finding usable wood, sanding, painting, and decorating. They worked with the Sunday School Superintendent, Mrs. Boardman, and members of Session to gain approval for the library and make plans for its installation. The girls are pleased that the books will once again be able to be enjoyed by members of the church and community.

In addition to adding a library to the First Presbyterian Church, Kristen, Hannah, and Kate installed a bookcase at a shelter in Middletown for people in need of emergency housing. The housing is available to men, women, and children. The girls found an old, broken down shelving unit on wheels and refurbished it to make it more cheerful. They then held a book drive at Vacation Bible School and weren't disappointed by the number of books received.

Hannah, Kristen, and Kate came up with some creative and fun ways to involve others in the project and to raise money. To get others involved with the project, the girls recruited volunteers for a fun bookmark making workshop. They taught the younger helpers how to make bookmarks with creative and easy techniques using yarn, colorful beads, and straws. Everybody had a good time...the girls even held a watermelon eating contest to finish out the day! In total, approximately one hundred bookmarks were made for the church library and the mobile bookcase for the shelter. To raise money for the bookmark workshop, the girls held a fundraiser at Shoprite. It was a huge success! Over a hundred-seventy dollars was raised!

Kristen, Hannah, and Kate learned a lot about helping others and built valuable leadership skills through all their work on the Silver Project. When you add up all the hours the girls spent on the project, it's over 150 combined hours! They are so pleased to have re-established the church library and to have donated the mobile bookcase to the shelter. They hope that other churches and shelters will create similar libraries and that more children will enjoy reading because of their project.
