Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

I found this so moving, I wanted to share it with you. Hope you get a laugh and a cry.

It is with great joy that I share the news of the birth of Sarafina Wenying Paton-Kaye, born to Selene and Drew (Drew is Pastor at South Church in Dobbs Ferry). Sarafina was born on Friday. Drew shared the details in a Facebook post. Since it was all so amazing, funny and moving, I received permission from him to share it with you:

"At around 8:15 a.m. on Friday, November 10th, 2017, Selene felt a single, swift kick from within... and her water broke. Contractions came up fast and furious (along with her breakfast). Soon we were on the phone with our wonderful doula, Jeni Howe, then with a forthright nurse in our obstetrician's office who told us to come straight in. We had only a few brief moments to consider the fact that our due date was still three weeks away; that the family meeting we had scheduled for later that night with a single agenda item - "pack hospital bag" - would never come to pass; that the disarrayed condition of our bedroom would certainly be judged "unsuitable" for a homebirth by the midwives of Nonnatus House... By 10:00 a.m. Beckett was discharged into the care of his faithful babysitter, Ruth, and we were in the car, speeding towards Phelps Memorial Hospital. As we passed Main Street in Tarrytown, Selene - who was on her knees in the front seat - reported that she was feeling an uncontrollable urge to push. As we crossed into Sleepy Hollow she said, "The head is coming!" We got Jeni back on the phone and she expertly coached us. Then she said simply - in a way that conveyed both gentleness and seriousness - "Drew... drive fast." And then a moment later, Selene exclaimed, "The head is out!" I reported to Jeni, "Selene thinks the head may be out." Selene promptly corrected me, "NO! The HEAD. IS. OUT!" As we turned down the hill towards Philipsburg Manor, Selene called out, "She's born!!" As I turned in disbelief I saw Selene's hands moving deftly, powerfully, to bring the child into the world and unto her chest - as if she had done it a thousand times before. She collapsed into the seat with the child wrapped in her robe and held in her arms. Jeni, in her infinite wisdom, had gone ahead to the hospital and rallied the troops. She and a radiant fleet of hospital personnel were eagerly awaiting our arrival at the doors of the emergency room - but the height of the action was already past. And all was well with mama and baby.

Serafina Wenying Paton-Kaye was born at about 10:15 a.m. in a red Honda fit, traveling at about 60 mph in a 30 mph zone, somewhere in the vicinity of Philipsburg Manor. Six pounds, five ounces and 18 inches long (we later learned).

Here's to the kid who almost literally kicked down the door just to get into this world - and to the amazing, badass mama who delivered her own baby in a speeding car."

Please lift them all up in prayer.

Presbyterian Women's Association

The Presbyterian Women met on November 7 in the parlor and were so happy to see some new faces and hear some new ideas. Fran Hoffmann gave the Minute for Ministry the day before in church and for those of you that weren't there; here are a few brief notes of what Fran said:

"I became a member of this church in 1951 and went to my first meeting of the Presbyterian Women. All ladies of the church are automatically a member of PW; there is no joining of this group. Things were different then. We didn't have a Fellowship Hall or even a kitchen with shiny new equipment or a comfortable parlor to hold our meetings in. We actually used a large house called the Parish House that sat across from St. James Episcopal Church. It has since been torn down. My children went to Sunday school in that building and our women met there on the first Monday of each month, just as we meet now on that same day. I didn't know many people and I was so impressed by the warm welcome I received and some of these women became my closest friends.

***So, what do Presbyterian Women do?** Sometimes we raise money by working at the Great American Weekend at our booth, holding bake sales among other things. And, you ask, where does the money go? Some of it goes to the needs of the church like helping to replace the oil tank a few years ago, to the brass railings you see at the chancel, a donation toward the new stove, linens for receptions in Fellowship Hall, and curtains for windows were also purchased. Over the years the women have donated to the Tiffany window restoration, as well as making sure lilies and poinsettias are on the chancel for the holidays. Also, money raised is donated to St. Margaret's Soup Kitchen, People to People Fund and each December we put together Christmas cheer boxes for our shut-ins, lonely or ill members of the congregation.*

Once a year we honor someone of the church and celebrate with a luncheon. We have honored a total of forty-two women and one man so far. On the first Friday in March, we celebrate World Day of Prayer and this past year it was held at our church. The service is written by women of a different country each year and we gather with our neighboring church sisters for the afternoon. We held a beautiful reception this year. We have also had teas with these fine women of other Goshen churches.

*As you can see PW, has come a long way since we were at the Parish House 65 years ago. This small group of women are doing the Lord's work right in our own church house. We invite you to come and join us the first Monday of each month at 7:00 p.m. in the parlor. All I can say is **"Try it....You'll Like It!"**

The church is doing a few new things when it comes to stewardship and one of them is a one minute segment of the worship service called "A MINUTE FOR MINISTRY." Each Sunday during the collection a member of our congregation will be sharing some aspect of the church's ministry they are involved in or what special way the church has touched their lives. What follows is another of these which we wanted to share with you.

Good morning everyone. My name is Mark Glassé. I am currently the Chairperson of the Fundraising Committee. I am an Elder and serve on the Mission and Christian Education Committees. I am not here today to speak about any of that. I am here to share with you why I am a part of this congregation.

My story is, while unique to me, is probably no different from most. I don't have a long history with this church. I wasn't raised Presbyterian, I don't live in Goshen, and my family and I have been here less than 5 years. What draws me here is not the steeple or the stained glass windows or even the building itself, while all are beautiful. Being charitable I view it as a mixed blessing. I am here because of you sitting in the pews. It is us together that make this the church. I am here because our congregation believes in a version of the Gospel rooted in love. We do not look to judge others. We look to share our love and our blessings with the world around us.

This gives us an openness, to those all around us. This openness is evident in the way our building is open to the community. There are multiple meetings of AA, NA, NAMI, the Girl Scouts and others. Our communion table is open to all who would confess Christ. We don't care what denomination you come from, we don't care what your past was like, we don't care about who you love. What is important is that we come together, to work for a better world.

I am proud to be part of a congregation that is willing to show its love. We show that love by sending teams to New York City, to help feed and clothe our homeless brothers and sisters. We show that love by helping to rehab homes in Newburgh. We show that love by helping to build housing and a medical clinic in Nicaragua. These are the things that we can all be proud of. No matter our age or physical condition, we can help to make these things happen. I'll never forget seeing Carol Gabella's, 101 year old mother, Mae, helping to make sandwiches to send down to New York City for a Midnight Run.

Most of my adult life was spent away from the church. My Sundays were spent reading the New York Times having awesome omelets and drinking mimosas. My Sundays were without obligation. But my life was not as complete. I invite you to have a fuller life, work a little harder on behalf of those you don't know and may never meet. But I guarantee you will have a more meaningful life. When our Lord asks "Whom Shall I send" will you join me in the reply "Here I am Lord" and be a better disciple of Christ, as we share God's love with everyone we meet.


