Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

I will destroy the wisdom of the wise; the intelligence of the intelligent I will frustrate (1 Cor. 1:19)

Don't waste another minute.

Right now, on the porch steps of a new year, before you get too far in, go ahead and resign as manager of the universe. Offer your resignation freely before life teaches you the hard way that you're really not well suited for the job.

Who's In Charge Here?

I received such a schooling years ago when my son was quite young and still playing football. A Saturday game had been scheduled for 2:00 p.m. Around 1:30 it started raining – a nice steady ground-soaking downpour. I noted this fact to my son with calm objectivity, but inside I was elated. It looked like I'd be getting back some of my Saturday afternoon. Surely they'd be canceling his game.

But the automated message that updates field conditions and cancellations said otherwise. "Get dressed. Until we know your game is canceled we're going to assume it's not."

I was trying to teach a life-lesson, a basic principle of sportsmanship: if you belong to a team you do what the team is asked to do. If the team is on the field, then you'll be on the field. To say that my son "resisted" my teaching on this point is stating the matter mildly.

To my amazement, when we arrived at the field, games were indeed being played. The sight of this evoked further protest from my young athlete. I tried to keep teaching the team-player life principle wondering all the while why these games hadn't been called off.

Already late, we walked to the field. My son was put in as a lineman and the rain kept falling. The game continued for about five minutes – and then someone walked out and told the refs to stop. Game over. By now every young man was drenched and muddy, including mine.

Frustrated, I drove home trying to be outwardly stoic with my son, wondering inwardly about the intelligence and wisdom of whomever it was that hadn't made that decision thirty minutes sooner.

It's a character flaw, I know. But I want the world to be operated according to my own sense of judgment about what makes good sense. I want the kid at the drive-thru window to do his job like I think it ought to be done. I want the people at Time-Warner to deal with my TV problem the way I think they ought to deal with it. I want someone at the athletic fields to call the game when it starts raining, not when everyone is wet, muddy, and irritated.

Because that rarely happens, I am well acquainted with frustration: frustration at the drive-thru window, frustration with the cable company, frustration with the folks who run the football program. And sadly, I am sometimes frustrated with God.

I've got some ideas as to how the universe should operate and how my life ought to unfold. I don't have all the answers, and I'm careful not to be too demanding with the answers I think I have. But I'm a fairly intelligent person. I have a functional moral compass. I have a clear sense of what seems good and right. And when things don't work according to my understanding of good and right and reasonable, I complain.

Baffled . . . but blessed.

Paul has an important word for all of us who think we know something about how life should be and how things should work in this world. God takes delight in frustrating us; God is almost playful in talking our wisdom and showing it to be folly. God is equally reckless in doing what we think is foolish and proving it wise in ways we would have never dreamed.

You may be totally baffled as to what God is doing in your life today. There's encouragement in this: God's wisdom rarely strikes us as wise. God frustrates our intelligence, makes light of our rational good sense. That can be either frustrating or freeing. The question is whether we will we trust God and God's wisdom.

IT'S MORE THAN HOUSES

Jeanine Jennings and her son, Jahmere, lived in a mold-infested apartment in Newburgh where the pumping leaked constantly. The single mom worried about the impact on their health, but when she petitioned the landlord to make improvements in the apartment, she was served with eviction papers. Then homeless, they lived in a motel, trying to get by.

"In our darkest moment, when we were homeless and Jahmere was facing being held back in school, Habitat gave us hope," Jeanine said. "I don't know where Jahmere would be today if we hadn't found Habitat Newburgh."

In 2012 Jeanine applied to be a Habitat partner family. She worked hard but had a low-paying job which made her eligible for the Habitat program. She attended Habitat homeownership classes and completed her 250 sweat equity hours working on a Habitat construction site alongside volunteers and other partner family members. At the conclusion, she was able to purchase a home for herself and her son.

"I'll never forget how I felt on the day we moved in. For the first time ever, I saw a sense of relief in Jahmere, knowing that this devastating period in our lives was finally over. Knowing that we would have a table to sit around for dinner, a place to do homework and talk about Jahmere's future, and a place to build a life and make memories. A place where we were safe."

There are many stories like that of the Jennings. The City of Newburgh is designated as the most distressed urban area in New York State, and its shortage of livable housing has created worst-case scenarios for thousands of hard-working families.

To date, Habitat Newburgh has built 78 houses and accepted over 90 families into its homeownership program. All combined, the new home owners contribute over \$375,000 annually to the city and school tax rolls. Habitat homes have restored more than \$7 million to the City's assessed property values and are a driving force in the revitalization of Newburgh.

Habitat for Humanity is one of the most recognizable and well-respected nonprofit organizations in the world. It has witnessed first-hand the results of having a place where children can thrive, self-esteem grows, and families can bond. Its work helps stabilize and revitalize neighborhoods, which often see a reduction in crime and an increase in the quality of life of the community.


