Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

For God so loved the world that He gave His Only Son, that whoever believes in Him might not perish but have everlasting life. (John 3:16)

Between his infancy and the age of 30, the Bible describes only one event in Jesus' life. We are told that it was His family's custom to attend the Passover festival in Jerusalem. The distance between Nazareth and Jerusalem was about 70 miles and would have taken several days. But the journey was probably a happy annual pilgrimage in the company of many family and friends. In his 12th year, Jesus was so preoccupied by activities in the temple that he missed the family's departure when they left for home. He remained instead in the temple where the teachers were astonished at his knowledge.

Twenty years later, the temple would become a very dangerous place for Jesus. It had ceased to be his Father's House of Prayer having become instead, a massive money machine. The conflicts that Jesus had there had a lot to do with his eventual trial and crucifixion.

President-elect Trump recently invited a number of leaders from the technology industry to a roundtable conversation. During his campaign, Trump had been vocally critical of the technology industry on a number of fronts. Tim Cook, head of Apple, accepted the invitation even though many criticized him for it. He responded by saying, "I've never found being on the sidelines a successful place to be. The way that you influence these issues is to be in the arena... and we engage when we agree and when we disagree...you don't change things by just yelling. You change things by showing why your way is the best."

That was certainly Jesus' philosophy. He didn't just stand outside the temple yelling. He went right on in to show that his way was the better way. It did, of course, cost him his life, but in the end, the loss of his life has given us life.

Richard Rohr says that it is always a lot easier being over and against than being in love. It is tempting to believe that we have done something constructive and creative by simply being critical. But Jesus teaches us that if you want to really make a difference, you've got to engage at the level of love. That's why the summary phrase of the Christian faith is this:

For God so loved the world that He gave His Only Son, that whoever believes in Him might not perish but have everlasting life. (John 3:16)

Music for our young people is also on the horizon. I had a great time at the Christmas pageant and hope to be involved in future programs for our young people.



THE TABLECLOTH

A beautiful story . . . makes you understand that things happen for a reason.

The brand new pastor and his wife, newly assigned to their first ministry to reopen a church in suburban Brooklyn, arrived in early October excited about their opportunities. When they saw their church, it was very run down and needed much work. They set a goal to have everything done in time to have their first service on Christmas Eve.

They worked hard, repairing pews, plastering walls, painting, etc., and on December 18 were ahead of schedule and just about finished. On December 19 a terrible tempest - a driving rainstorm - hit the area and lasted for two days. On the 21st, the pastor went over to the church. His heart sank when he saw that the roof had leaked, causing a large area of plaster about 20 feet by 8 feet to fall off the front wall of the sanctuary just behind the pulpit, beginning about head high. The pastor cleaned up the mess on the floor, and not knowing what else to do but postpone the Christmas Eve service, headed home.

On the way he noticed that a local business was having a flea market type sale for charity, so he stopped in. One of the items was a beautiful, handmade, ivory-colored, crocheted tablecloth with exquisite work, fine colors and a Cross embroidered right in the center. It was just the right size to cover the hole in the front wall. He bought it and headed back to the church. By this time it had started to snow. An older woman running from the opposite direction was trying to catch the bus. She missed it. The pastor invited her to wait in the warm church for the next bus 45 minutes later.


She sat in a pew and paid no attention to the pastor while he got a ladder, hangers, etc., to put up the tablecloth as a wall tapestry. The pastor could hardly believe how beautiful it looked and it covered up the entire problem area. Then he noticed the woman walking down the center aisle. Her face was like a sheet. "Pastor," she asked, "where did you get that tablecloth?" The pastor explained. The woman asked him to check the lower right corner to see if the initials 'EBG' were crocheted into it there. They were. These were the initials of the woman, and she handmade this tablecloth 35 years before, in Austria .The woman could hardly believe it as the pastor told how he had just gotten "The Tablecloth." The woman explained that before the war she and her husband were well-to-do people in Austria. When the Nazis came, she was forced to leave. Her husband or her home again. The pastor wanted to give her the tablecloth; but she made the pastor keep it for the church. The pastor insisted on driving her home. That was the least he could do. She lived on the other side of Staten Island and was only in Brooklyn for the day for a housecleaning job. What a wonderful service they had on Christmas Eve. The church was almost full. The music and the spirit were great.

At the end of the service, the pastor and his wife greeted everyone at the door and many said that they would return. One older man, whom the pastor recognized from the neighborhood, continued to sit in one of the pews and stare, and the pastor wondered why he wasn't leaving. The man asked him where he got the tablecloth on the front wall because it was identical to one that his wife had made years ago when they lived in Austria before the war and how could there be two tablecloths so much alike.

He told the pastor how the Nazis came, how he forced his wife to flee for her safety and he was supposed to follow her, but he was arrested and put in a prison. He never saw his wife or his home again in all the 35 years between. The pastor asked him if he would allow him to take him for a little ride. They drove to Staten Island and to the same house where the pastor had taken the woman three days earlier. He helped the man climb the three flights of stairs to the woman's apartment, knocked on the door, and he saw the greatest Christmas reunion he could ever imagine.

MIDNIGHT RUN

It's time to start thinking about our next Midnight Run scheduled for March 11. It will be another evening run; we'll pack the vehicles around 7:30 p.m., leave Goshen by 8:30 p.m., and return somewhere between 2:00 and 3:00 a.m. If you haven't gone on a run before, I can personally vouch for the incredible feeling of providing food and clothing for people who have so little. It is also quite sobering to realize that many of those folks aren't much different than any of us and that "there but for the Grace of God, go I." Even though we are ensconced in the bucolic environment of Goshen, most of us could find ourselves on the street with any series of unplanned events--a loss of job, a catastrophic illness, fire or natural disaster. We are lucky. BECAUSE we live in Goshen, we have a community and a church family that would come to our aid to prevent us from resorting to the streets. The people we serve through Midnight Run aren't as lucky. Participating in any way will help us keep our Midnight Run efforts going strong.

There are many jobs coming up in February. Our March 11 run will distribute light winter/early spring clothes. Pants, lightweight shirts, lightweight jackets, etc. Sturdy shoes, sneakers, and new underwear would also be very helpful. As you begin cleaning out your closets for the next season, please consider donating to the Midnight Run. You can leave at the church office or contact me directly to make arrangements for pick up or drop off.

We will be resorting all of the current inventory of clothes, toiletries, etc. during February. I have purchased a few new tubs; anyone who has extra storage bins (the large Rubbermaid or similar clear tubs are great) or would like to purchase a few for us, it would be greatly appreciated. Much of the work that goes into preparing for a run involves sorting and resorting after and before each run. Our goal is to create an inventory by gender/season and size so that we can easily add new donations to our inventory and pull out what we need for each consecutive run. We can also use more shelving in our GOVAC space; we spend a lot of wasted time trying to move bags and tubs around to find the appropriate clothing for each run. Anyone who could help us with that would be greatly appreciated.

There is always a need for food donations as we get closer to the March 11 date. We will need hard boiled eggs, peanut butter and jelly, bread, cold cuts, granola bars, and more. Anyone inclined to donate food or \$\$\$\$, please let me know and I'll give you specifics. The itemized list will be in the bulletins throughout February.

Thanks in advance to all the wonderful people in our church and throughout the region who have stepped up to help in this effort in the past and to those who will join us going forward. Please remember that we have many opportunities for your kids to get community service hours by helping this cause.
