Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

An article in the New York Times reported an event that took place awhile ago in the Harbor Gateway section of Los Angeles. Members of a Latino gang were driving the streets with the intention of shooting a black person, any black person, in retaliation for a racial slight. They succeeded. Fourteen-year-old Cheryl Green was sitting near her scooter, talking with friends, when she was killed in a barrage of bullets. Cheryl did know anything about the slight; she was just one more innocent victim of yet one more senseless hate crime.

The shooting occurred just days before January 15, a federal holiday that honors the birth of Martin Luther King, Jr., who was, himself, gunned down in Memphis, Tennessee in 1968. It is a holiday designated to remember the man who said we "must evolve for all human conflict a method which rejects revenge, aggression, and retaliation. The foundation of such a method is love." The day is designated to honor a dream. For it was Dr. King who once said, "I have a dream that my four little children will one day live in a nation where they will not be judged by the color of their skin, but by the content of their character."

Lately that message seems to have been forgotten. Statisticians report that in Los Angeles in 2005, racial, religious, and sexual orientation discrimination crimes increased 34%. **Thirty-four percent!** The problem, as we well know, is not only in Los Angeles, but also all over the world. Daily, we hear about violence, destruction, abuse, discrimination, payback, retaliation, revenge, ethnic cleansing, genocide, Jihad, holy war, and the myriad of other terms used in a world with people that just can't seem to learn how to live together.

Although we have come a long way since 1968, we have not come nearly far enough. Maybe it was youthful optimism, but as I was growing up in those years, I truly thought we'd be better at this by now.

I applaud those who have dedicated their lives to improving our ability to live together, but we have to remember that this isn't something we can just watch others do. We, too, have to join in the effort to end discrimination wherever we find it. As Dr. King once said, "Injustice anywhere is a threat to justice everywhere." Let us put aside our fear, our uncertainty, and our own prejudices and do our part in uniting our community and our world. I still have hope that God's vision for one world united with equality and justice for all is not just a dream, but a dream that can actually come true.

May God's blessing and peace unite us all.

JANUARY ALLOWS THE LIGHT OF CHRIST TO GROW IN OUR HEARTS

We received the light of Christ on Christmas morning. His incarnation is complete. Our task now, as we move into the new year of 2008, is to allow this light to grow in each of us, to bring it forth into the world, and to illumine our paths as we live each day. Can others see the light of Christ in us? How can we make a difference in others' lives? How can we bring forth peace in our fractured world?



In Judaism and in Christianity, a white dove is generally a sign for peace. Noah released a dove after the Great Flood in order to find land. The dove returned, carrying an olive branch in its beak, telling Noah that the flood had receded and that there was land once again for man. The dove in flight bearing an olive branch is a motif representing "hope for peace" and even a peace offering from one to another, as in the phrase "extend an olive branch." Often, the dove is represented as still in flight to

remind the viewer of its role as messenger of peace. How can we, as Christians, be messengers of peace to a broken world? Can we bear the olive branch and extend it to others? This Christmas gift from God, the gift of His Son, comes with a responsibility. Let us reflect on what we can do to live peace, to be peace, and to spread peace in our everyday lives.

We move through January with the celebration of Epiphany, a feast day on which we commemorate the coming of the Magi to present their gifts to the Christ child. They recognized his divinity and responded with gifts. Can we do no less in response to the birth of Christ in our hearts?

Thank you all for a great two and a half years.

Let me first say that I have the greatest respect for all of the dedicated Sunday school volunteers. I said that when I started as the superintendent, and that respect has continued to grow ever since. You are truly special people.

- Don't be constrained by the judgments of others. Generosity of spirit trumps a lack of genius every time.
- Others may recognize your talents before you do; listen to them. We are often blind to, or discount, our own gifts. Necessity may be the mother of invention but it's also the mentor of hidden talents.
- Mistakes make for new and entertaining opportunities. Wouldn't life be boring if everything worked right the first time?
- Performing with others is better than stealing the spotlight. When our talents mix with those of others, a true performance takes place, and the spotlight is big enough for everyone.

I am pleased that I had the opportunity to serve our Sunday school. To work on something that I truly care about has brought great satisfaction. But it is time for me to regain my personal life and focus my energies where they are most needed: here at home. I thank you all. It has been a great ride!
