From the Pastor's Desk....

In this New Year let us focus on personal integrity. The story is told of a Christian high school senior who was honored as one of the best and brightest in his community because he provided a forceful demonstration of integrity.

When his school team was given the word "auditorium" in a regional spelling bee, he glanced down to ponder his response and noticed that the word was printed on the microphone stand. He called this to the attention of the judges who responded with a more difficult word. The young man did what he knew was right whether others noticed or not.

We don't know when our actions may become an example to others — we're always on display. But if we live each day to honor Jesus, our behavior will model His righteous life (Gal. 2:20; 1 John 2:5-6), no matter who is watching.

Uprightness and honor should be goals for Christians of every age. Paul told Timothy:

"Let no one despise your youth, but be an example to the believers in word, in conduct, in love, in spirit, in faith, in purity" (1 Timothy 4:12 NKJV).

As Christians, one of our goals in life should be to change the world around us for good while never compromising ourselves — one person at a time (Acts 10:38 NKJV; cf. 2 Timothy 2:1-2 NKJV; 1 Timothy 4:16 NKJV). Let us all echo this prayer from W.J. Fitzpatrick.

O to be like Thee! blessed Redeemer, This is my constant longing and prayer; Gladly I'll forfeit all of earth's treasures, Jesus, Thy perfect likeness to wear. O to be like Thee! O to be like Thee, Blessed Redeemer, pure as Thou art; Come in Thy sweetness, come in Thy fullness; Stamp Thine own image deep on my heart. —W.J. Kirkpatrick

I write this in mid-December, right after the annual Christmas Carol Sing-along and the choir's program at Glen Arden. Both events put me in the holiday spirit! I'm hopeful for a very merry Christmas, not to mention a spiritually fruitful one.

My idea behind the Christmas caroling program is that I think we are hungry to sing together again. I don't think of music as something consumed in isolation, though of course it's possible—in a busy house, headphones can be an act of mercy! Overall, though, music should bond people. It's also not primarily an industrial product, involving the cynical manipulation of taste and the propagation of harmful ideas pasted together by a small group. Music is made by all of us.

Having studied music very seriously for a long time, I have to say that what we call "classical" music—a very broad term including quite a lot of popular music!—is essentially an effort to tease out the music inherent in God's creation. The association of intervals and string ratios, the Pythagorean discovery that an octave is a 2:1, a perfect fifth a 3:2, and so on, is united to Christian faith so that the beauty hidden in physics may be turned to the praise of God in song. A dance: pure geometry meeting pure joy.

A good analogy is the diamond hidden in the mine...the "stone poems" that we still covet, even though we can make them in a lab...or the pharmaceuticals lurking in a fragrant flower.

The poet Alexander Pope wrote about the laws of poetry, calling them "the rules of old, *discovered not devised...*" There is nothing arbitrary about art. It flows from the nature of things themselves, discovered, deduced, polished, and framed by the intellect. This is why music also speaks to the heart, for a human being is a union of body and soul, and what touches the heart probably also touches the mind somehow.

How can an organist not respect engineering, whether or not he's an expert in it?

Can God, then, also be praised by digital means? Yes, of course He can. The question is the intent, the design and purpose of the music, and the words that go with it. Music that inflames physical passion is unhelpful to the soul. Music that promotes anger and anti-social moods is hurtful to all. Music that distorts religious truth can't be healthy. Fast music isn't better, nor is slow: some music is "unsafe at any speed!"

Good music is *alive*: the rhythm and melody, the harmony and counterpoint, and yes, to a point the rhythm and bass line, all conducing to a single purpose, a holistic remedy, "charms to soothe a savage breast," and, if approached in the right spirit, a way to find God amid the noise.

Come to church in 2025 and be moved by music, opened to higher and better things, and readier to hear what is proclaimed in the pulpit and whispered in the depths of your own heart.

A MISSION ENDEAVOR: PLEASE HELP

During the month of January the Mission Committee will be collecting donations in order to make breakfast bags for the guests at the **Warming Station** in Middletown, NY. A collection bin will be located in the Narthex.

We are asking for donations of: breakfast or nutrition bars, small bottles of water, individual servings of juice, commercially packaged muffins or coffee cakes, fruit cups or fruit bars.

OTHER ITEMS GRATEFULLY ACCEPTED: Men's small and medium tee shirts, boxers and long johns, coffee, hot cocoa packets, toilet paper.

ABOUT the Warming Station: "The Warming Station provides a warm and safe environment for homeless adults living on the streets of Middletown." It is open from the end of November to the beginning of April and can accommodate up to 30 people. It is open to folks on a first come first serve basis. It is organized by the Greater Interfaith Middletown Council and is run by professional help and volunteers who assist by helping at the facility, and by donating either breakfast bags or meals. Since its opening in November, it has been at full capacity. Many nights more than 30 people come to the door for shelter. The overflow are treated to a meal and assisted to find alternative accommodations for the night.

To donate a meal or breakfast bags: Go to the website *takethemameal.com*. Click on "Find a meal schedule" and type in the words <u>Warming Station</u> in the Client section. The password is <u>meal</u>. Suggestions for amounts of food needed are listed.

To the Deacons and My Church Family,

Christmas is one of my favorite holidays. I love all of the lights and the glitter and the decorations and the trees, etc. But (yes, there is a 'but') it is all a lot of work! Garland doesn't get hung by itself; trees don't get assembled, lit and decorated by themselves. It all requires work. I am so blessed to have the hardest working group of Deacons ever! We were hanging ourselves over the balcony to get the garland just right; precariously climbing ladders to hang the garland over the doorways; crawled under the stage to search for last year's décor; ran up and down the tower steps at least 50 times toting boxes and candles.

At the Craft Fair we helped vendors set up their booths by carrying in some of the heaviest boxes ever! We baked, made soup and chutney, fed our vendors, and when it was all over, we helped them pack up and load their cars. We will do it all over again next year! (Cheerfully, I might add!)

Christmas Eve is one of my favorite services. Getting ready for it is not easy! There are 78 candles for the pews and windows that have to have batteries. There are 30 for the choir loft. Those wooden poles in the pews (14 of them) have to be brought down from the balcony; the window candles have to be zip-tied in place and outfitted with candles, also.

It's a lot of work, but we all feel a sense of satisfaction once everything is done. I want to reiterate that I am so blessed to have the best crew of Deacons!!

A message from the Treasurer: Please consider paying your per capita assessment for 2024 to offset the more than \$8,000 the church must pay out to cover expenses for the Presbytery of Hudson River, Synod of the Northeast and General Assembly of Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). This year it remains at \$39.75 per member (not per family). Please assist with this expense and write a check for your family assessment and either mail it to the church or place it in the Sunday offering plate. We ask that you pay this by February 1, 2024. Thank you for doing your share to support the expense of being a church in active ministry.

The Live Stream camera generally captures the first 4-5 (rarely 7-8) rows of the sanctuary in its feed. Normally we only see the back of your head. If you would rather stay out of camera range, please know that we do not capture the seating under the balcony (on either side) and we don't capture the back rows at all. Regarding the Children's Message: We keep the camera zoomed out. As children leave to go to Sunday school, we will pan up to the stained glass windows so no children's faces are caught on camera.

PLEASE NOTE: A niche in the Memorial Columbarium has become available. If you are interested in purchasing it, please contact Pat in the church office.

The price of the niche is \$2,800. There are two payment options:

12 month = \$250/month for 12 months (\$3,000)

18 month = \$180/month for 1 month (\$3,240)

Once this niche is sold, the Session/Congregation will need to consider if constructing a second/third wall is desired and/or financially possible. If it is, a new estimate for the work will need to be created, considered, approved and project timeline established.



Make a Maker to Celebrate Special Days

You will need:

- empty kitchen matchbox (NO matches)
- foil
- tape
- dried beans or rice
- unsharpened pencil
- 2 rubber bands
- stickers, glue and glitter (optional)



- Put beans or rice in the matchbox, so that it rattles when you shake it.
- Tape the box shut.
- Cover box with foil.
- Poke 2 small holes on opposite sides of the box near one end.
- Stick the pencil into one hole, through the box and out the other hole.
- Wrap rubber bands around the pencil on both sides of the box, so the pencil won't slip through the holes.
- If you want, you can decorate the box with stickers and glitter.

How to use:

- Hold the pencil and move your wrist to spin the box.
- Make lots of happy noise to celebrate special days throughout the year.
