Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

This spring has been strange. The weather has changed from cold, chilling rain to record heat within the span of a week. Such natural rhythms make us think about the rhythms of our daily world: earthquakes killing thousands, governments refusing aid for typhoon victims, rising oil prices creating food shortages, rising prices of everything, and just the beginning of suffering for many. Mixed in with this daily news are the occasional stories of good things being done and possible new solutions. All in all, like this spring, the rhythms of this world feel unpredictable right now, without the reassuring "warmth" that comes when we feel we know what will happen tomorrow.

With all these changes, I have been thinking about history, about what previous generations did when they were faced with the unknown, an unstable economy, and the daily news filled with hardship and devastation. Not long ago, I saw a poster advertising an upcoming "World War II Weekend" to celebrate aviation victories and other events of the war. Such events seem to happen a lot since the "Greatest Generation" was recognized. The further in time we come from that war, the more we seem to remember it fondly.

Yet, I doubt that the men, women, mothers, fathers, and children felt that the war was glorious, wonderful, and a time of celebration. From the many television specials, interviews, and books, we know that they experienced that time as one they wished had never happened to them. And, I believe, so it is with all who come face to face with challenges and sufferings in their own lifetimes. To borrow a line from J.R.R. Tolkien, in his book *The Fellowship of the Ring*: "...so do all who live to see such times. But that is not for them to decide. All we have to decide is what to do with the time that is given to us."

Tolkien was a very good friend of C.S. Lewis, author of many books on Christian faith and the Narnia Chronicles. Both men were of deep faith, and both lived through World War I and World War II. When Tolkien was a young man in 1918, which was the end of World War I, only one of his close friends remained alive. And yet, both he and Lewis went on to write about and live lives of great faith. The times that had been "given to them" encompassed two terrible wars and immense suffering, and they not only survived, but they also created a way to understand it for future generations. For them, their choices about what to do with the time given to them were rooted in their faith in Christ and in the goodness of God. Perhaps they did not suffer as much as some, but they did not pass blithely through, untouched by suffering. They did not always see the way clearly or feel calm and confident. They held fast in their belief in goodness, love, and a loving God made known through Jesus.

It sounds so simple on paper, just like World War II sounds so glorious to a generation apart. But it is never simple or easy when we are living it. So, here we are in the unknown present. Challenges are definitely ahead, and the horizon has shadows upon it. What will we do with the time given to us? How will we hold to faith and goodness, not only for our sakes and our children's sakes, but also for the generations to come?

SUPPORT YOUR CHURCH HOME 2008 CAPITAL CAMPAIGN

The 2008 Operating Budget consists of operating revenues and expenses only, not capital expenses needed to maintain and improve our church home and grounds. The Operating Budget consists of income and expenses anticipated for the day-to-day operation of the church facilities and programs.

The Finance and Administration Committee has prepared a Capital Budget for prioritized capital expenses to maintain and improve our church home and grounds. The plan is to <u>fund the Capital Budget through an annual Capital Fund Campaign</u> targeted specifically for need-based projects.

The Finance and Administration Committee and the Property Management Committee will work collectively to fund and complete the following 2008 prioritized projects:

2008 Capital Fund Budget

- Continue church and Fellowship Hall masonry repairs that are needed desperately (the small towers on either side of the rear Tiffany window are pulling away from the wall)—approximate cost: \$18K
- 2. Church Park drainage (the Village of Goshen DPW has already asked permission from First Presbyterian Church to install a catch basin)—approximate cost: \$5K
- 3. Repair one church sanctuary window—approximate cost: \$2K

The above costs are estimates, and all projects will move forward after several bids are received and evaluated.

Our church home needs your financial support for the 2008 Capital Campaign—an amount you agree to pledge over and above any 2008 pledge you already made toward our 2008 Operating Budget. You can pay the Capital Campaign pledge in periodic increments or in a lump sum between now and the end of the year.





The First Presbyterian Church in Goshen, NY, was built in the late 1800s and is a respected place of worship for many in the community. It is also recognized as an architectural icon dominating the Church Park Historic District. The church has been a home to numerous families, and we all appreciate the elegance and charm of this significant structure.

The stone used in the construction of the exterior masonry walls has withstood the tests of time and Mother Nature. However, the building envelope system, which consists of a multiple-wythe masonry wall, is being compromised by the failing mortar joints. (A singular vertical section of brick masonry, one unit in thickness, is referred to as a *wythe*.) The deteriorated joints are expected for a structure of this age, and deterioration varies with exposure conditions. The Brick Institute of America recognizes that a typical masonry structure will require maintenance of its mortar joints every twenty-five years.

Preventative maintenance of mortar joints (i.e., repointing) is required to ensure the structure's longevity and is the single most effective way to decrease water entry into the stonework. Repointing is a time-consuming task, and the process has not changed with modern construction techniques. It is basically a method performed by "hand." The mortar joints are inspected visually and "sounded" to detect cracked, spalled, and brittle joints. Once identified, the outer damaged layers of the failed joints are cut out, removed, and replaced with new mortar.



Our past visual inspections have identified a concentrated failure of the mortar joints located on the elevated portion of the wall behind the chancel. Not readily visible from the ground level, this joint failure was observed from an aerial man lift when the box gutters were replaced. This observation identified a substantial movement in the masonry walls associated with external corners located above the chancel. It is perceived that the resultant forces from the weight of the gable end wall (the vertical triangular portion of the end of the building) and the decorative external towers with their wood louvers have allowed the wall to shift outward. At this time, it appears that the shift may be stabilized; however, we are attempting to prioritize the repairs and are soliciting donations from the congregation. Please note that the deterioration includes loose or missing mortar joints with gaps between the mortar and masonry units. These are all signs that can lead to further accelerated deterioration of the mortar and stone. This will compromise the stability of the structure.

We have budgeted between \$15,000 and \$20,000 to address this issue. The use of an aerial man lift to perform the repointing will permit a more detailed review of the shift in the stonework and will facilitate the development of a course of action to stabilize the structure.

MEDITATION GARDEN—SUMMER UPDATE

By the time you read this update, the center section of the columbarium wall will have been erected, and the twenty-eight double-niches will have been installed. The nineteen-foot labyrinth will be installed in July. Eighty inscribed pavers, along with other garden elements, have been ordered for August arrival and installation.

The Garden Committee has raised over \$41,000 (all from donations outside of the operating budget) for the garden. We still need approximately \$15,000 additional to complete the majority of the project.

Double-niches are currently for sale at the "pre-construction" cost of only \$2,500 (until August). Each double-niche is 11½ inches cubed and allows for either double or single interment. Given the cost of cemetery plots and gravestones, this is a remarkable value. After August, the niche cost will be \$3,500.

As of this writing, five niches have been purchased, leaving twenty-three left for sale. If you are considering... NOW is the time to purchase your niche, as you will be saving \$1,000 and helping the garden to come to fruition this fall!

Once we have sold fifteen niches on the first columbarium wall, we will have enough funds to erect the second columbarium wall (with another twenty-eight niches). After we have sold a total of twenty-five niches, the third columbarium wall can be erected. That will allow our church to then sell the remaining fifty-nine niches and realize a profit of well over \$200,000!

I would like to ask the members of the congregation to please also consider purchasing inscribed memorial pavers to honor and remember loved ones. Pavers are only \$100 each, and our garden has the ability to continuously expand the number of memorial pavers we install. Please spread the word to the community atlarge, too. Remember, this is a non-denominational, memorial meditation space, and it is open to everyone!

As we move into September, the landscaping phase of the garden will begin. Please think about any way you can help with this "finishing touch" phase. The Garden Committee is eager and willing to discuss any ideas you may have. Just give me a call!

We are working toward a dedication date, which will be during the weekend of October 25 and 26. We will continue to provide regular updates on the garden's progress.
