Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

In Acts 20:35, Paul is said to have shared this: "In all this, I have given you an example that by such work we must support the weak, remembering the words of the Lord Jesus, for he himself said, 'It is more blessed to give than to receive."

This month, a larger group of people than have ever represented our church before will be going on a mission trip to Nicaragua. Sixteen people will be going to an area just south of Managua, the capital, to work on the house that Wayne and Diane George paid for in memory of their son, Jonathan. What a wonderful tribute to Jonathan and what a wonderful statement of support for Wayne and Diane that so many wanted to work on such a tribute. I find it very moving to know that a needy family has a substantial roof over their heads and a home in which to raise their family.

In Nicaragua, the second most impoverished nation in our hemisphere (Haiti ranks number one), there are no safety nets. When hurricanes hit the nation, as Hurricane Mitch did in 1989 when 22,000 people died from the storm, there is no money from the government to help their people out of the disaster. People simply die.

As most of you know, I was able to make the trip to Nicaragua in 2000. I worked to help build a community center on the eastern coast for the village of Puerta Cabezas, which had received a direct hit from Mitch. The center was built according to California earthquake standards. Last year, Hurricane Beta lashed Puerta Cabezas. Over 250 people were able to weather that storm in the community center I helped to build, and there was no loss of life. When I received that word, let me tell you, a warm and wonderful feeling swept over me.

This year, I return with nine adults and six of our wonderful young people to work on the construction of this memorial home. We are not looking forward to the blistering hot weather, the outdoor latrines, the arduous work, or the presence of malaria-carrying mosquitoes. We are looking forward to helping people who absolutely do not have the means to help themselves. We are rewarded by the smiles of gratitude, the tears of joy, the camaraderie of brothers and sisters in Christ within our group, and those we find within the community to which we go. It is the prayerful support of the people of this church from which we venture out that buoys and enables us to do this work for the sake of Christ.

Again this year, no monies came from the church treasury. All of the funds to send this group came from fundraising activities supported and created by the group. For the first time, a concession stand was set up for the downtown parades, and the group made a **substantial** amount of money from this new idea for fundraising.

As a congregation, I know your prayers will be with us as we head out, but as you offer those prayers, I also want to encourage you to begin the prayer process for the next mission trip. I hope that you are aware that, by decision of the session, mission trips will alternate between the U.S. and foreign countries. Next year, those who would like to make a work trip within the states should start now to plan what that trip will be and how best to accomplish the task. Our Mission Committee, under the capable leadership of Elder Bill Keller, will be organizing this endeavor, so you can contact him to help get the effort going.

Hello...

So school started last week. We just sang all week for the opening of the new market; the market opening ceremony was like seven hours long. Then, on Saturday, I met up with the Savi'ians from my group; Paul, the other peace corps volunteer at my school; Supy, who lives a ten-minute bike ride away; and Phil, who came from the other side of the island and stayed with Supy overnight. We all went to this waterfall that was not flowing. But normally it is; it has just been really dry here, even though it is not the dry season. But there is a little place to swim, maybe a fifty-foot-radius pool. And it drains into a stream; there was a little water coming in from smaller waterfalls, but the main forty-foot one was dry. But the water is a really nice color blue and really clean. And it was also surprisingly not that cold. I can only compare it to similar places I've been to in Mexico and North Carolina, and it wasn't cold compared to those places.

But there are ledges to jump off. One is probably thirty feet and the other is maybe forty-five feet. So we had a good time jumping off the ledges and swimming. The pool is very deep, probably thirty feet deep, and you can see all the way to the bottom. The whole place is in the shape of a semicircle with big walls, maybe seventy to eighty feet tall all around. There is a way to jump off the eighty-foot walls and land safely into the pool, but I couldn't find a way up the walls. Next time, I'm going to find a way. This place is only a ten-minute bike ride from my house and directly across the street from Supy's house. It looks safe. I've jumped off bigger cliffs, and I probably have the best health insurance I will ever have right now. So now is the time to do it.

Then we went to this place Lucias in Salelologa, the wharf town, to eat and have a few beers. They have a big dock that is about eight feet tall that you can drive off right into the ocean. It is really nice; the food is really good but a little pricy. A beer is 9 tala (\$3), and I had a burger for 18 tala. A burger and a few beers later, you have a pricy tab, at least on a peace corps budget. But it's fun to go two or three times a month. That is the good thing about Savai'i; there isn't anywhere to spend money. You buy food at the grocery stores or little shops in the village, and that is it. Not like in Apia where you are tempted to go out for lunch or dinner; here, you don't even have that option. Then we are also on a time limit. The last bus leaves the wharf at 5:15, so we have to catch that last bus or we are stuck taking a 20-tala cab home or sleeping in the mouse-infested peace corps office.

But school on Monday was good. The other carpentry teacher, Fuifui (or fui for short), and I worked on the syllabus for years one and two, for a good part of the day. It was supposed to have been done, but we were waiting for the syllabus from our sister school. Once we got it, I was like, "No, we are making our own." They wanted to teach eight weeks on safety. Three weeks on safety equipment. I thought, half the kids in the school don't own shoes, the other half only have sandals, we have no hardhats, no earmuffs, no dust masks, no gloves, and no eye goggles. I was like, "Why are we gonna teach stuff that we don't have and that the kids will never use?" This is Samoa; there is no safety, no insurance. I said that we have to teach the kids how to build stuff and use the tools. So I've spent almost three days teaching the kids how to use a tape measure, or at least an English system tape measure. We only have one, so if that is all we have, then they need to know how to use it.

I also have one period of science every day. Ninth graders. They are all good kids, with a very mixed level of English. The tech kids I want to teach in Samoan because their English is horrible, and I want them to understand. But the science kids need English more than they need science. So if they listen to me in English and learn a little bit, that is more important for them in the long run than to understand the different parts of the root system. But I've done plants all week. I have to really "dumb it down." I can't really have them explain photosynthesis chemically; they just need to know that it makes the plant's energy. The schools here don't teach kids how to think; they make them just memorize and copy things. So I'm really trying to get the kids to understand the stuff, not just spit back the wording. It is hard; it goes against everything they know and everything ever other teacher does, but it is the right way. So school is good; nobody really lets Paul and me know what is going on, but we are just doing our own thing.

Then today I woke up, went to school, and all the kids were in normal clothes, not the school uniforms. All the boys had their machetes and were cutting the grass on the rugby field and around the school, and the girls were picking up trash and pulling weeds. And we had no school. It was an unannounced clean up day. Paul and I both were in our school clothes and had all our books and stuff and went to the principal and asked if we had school

today. He said, "Oh well, it was announced that today is a cleaning day yesterday at closing assembly," and we were like, "Our Samoan is O.K., but we don't understand everything. If nobody tells us stuff like that, then we don't know." The principle was nice and apologized and said that he would make sure we get all the announcements that we need. But I find that very hard to believe, since we are very often excluded from what is really going on at staff meetings and everything else. Then Paul and I went home; all the kids were pulling weeds around my house and picking up trash and cutting the grass. I kept offering them water, but most refused, even though it was very hot and they were working hard.

Maney-Hawkins Meditation Garden

Summer Update

The June 14 dedication service was wonderful! Over 100 people gathered in the Maney-Hawkins Meditation Garden on the labyrinth and along the walkways as Pastor Kingsley installed a memorial paver celebrating his tenth year of service to our congregation and led the group in a touching dedication service.

The meditation garden is officially open to all, every day and every evening. If you have not spent a moment there at night with the lighting on, we'd encourage the experience.

There are sixteen niches in the columbarium wall that are available for sale. Each double-niche is 11½ inches cubed and allows for either double or single interment. This is a remarkable value given the cost of cemetery plots and gravestones.

Four purchase options are now available to help make owning a niche more affordable:

Payment in Full = \$2,500 12-Month Payment Option = \$255/month for 12 months 24-Month Payment Option = \$125/month for 24 months 36-Month Payment Option = \$90/month for 36 months

Consider purchasing an inscribed memorial paver to honor and remember a loved one. Pavers are only \$100 each, and our garden has plenty of room to continue expanding. This is a non-denominational memorial/meditation space and is open to everyone!

We are looking to establish a team of people who will be "Stewards of the Garden." There will be groups (either one person or a couple) who will be responsible for visiting the garden one week every month or two and performing required, light maintenance like pulling out weeds, raking some mulch, etc. It is an ideal way for retirees or anyone who enjoys gardening to help develop and administer regular, ongoing maintenance to keep this beautiful space beautiful. If we can get up to eight "volunteers" or couples, that means each group would be responsible for only one week every two months. More importantly, that will also prevent the garden from falling into disrepair.

Survey Results

As most of you are aware, a survey was sent out in early May to gauge the congregational response to the new schedule that was implemented last August. In addition, a congregational meeting was held on May 31 to allow everyone to voice his or her opinion. The results of this meeting are not included below, but the general sentiment of those who gathered for that meeting and those who filled out the survey were similar.

The Christian Education Task Force was created in January 2008 to evaluate the Sunday school program and to fill the Christian Education Director position. There was concern at the time that Sunday school attendance was not nearly the same as it was in the past. This had been an ongoing problem for a few years. One of the reasons we believed this was occurring was because many kids had graduated from the program and younger families were not coming in to replace them. It was also difficult to attract new teachers because they would have to miss the sermon in order to teach. Our Christian Education Director missed the sermon every week. Our three main goals became:

- 1) Find a Christian Education Director
- 2) Find a way to make Sunday school more attractive for kids and teachers
- 3) Attract younger families into our congregation

After several meetings, it was decided that we needed to re-energize our congregation. We found that many successful churches offered at least two worship services to give people flexibility and to attract new families as they evaluated different places of worship. They also offered Sunday school for children and adults between the two services. Having Sunday school at a time other than during worship was a way that might attract new teachers and revive our program. We also liked the idea of offering a Christian education program for those adults who were interested.

The new schedule was approved by session and implemented in August 2008. We mailed out 175 surveys in May 2009 and received ninety-two back (about 50 percent), which represented 134 people (about 40 percent of our members).

Survey responses to the 8:30 a.m. service showed that seventy-four attended the service at least once. Of the sixty-five who said we should continue this service, thirty-nine attended the 8:30 a.m. service at least once, and twenty-six never attended the 8:30 a.m. service. Of the forty-five who did not respond to whether this service should continue, nineteen had attended, twenty-one had not attended, and five did not respond as to whether they attended. Fourteen never went to the service and didn't want it to continue.

The 10:30 a.m. service had 110 who attended and twenty-four who did not. Eighty-three want this service to continue and twelve do not.

Almost half of the twenty-six who attended the early coffee hour had children in Sunday school. Eighteen of those would be willing to host. The 11:30 a.m. coffee hour was better attended with sixty-three attending, thirty-six saying they would host, and seventy-one indicating it should continue. Most liked coffee hour after the service because it was better attended. Several no longer attended because they felt it was getting too close to the lunch hour.

Only sixteen families in the congregation responded that they have attended the Sunday school program at least once this year. Eleven families had attended the old Sunday school. Thirty-two wanted Sunday school during worship, with twenty-one actually having children who attend Sunday school (or about ten families). Ten out of sixteen families would like to have Sunday school moved back to worship following the children's sermon.

Regarding the heavily debated "one service to two service" division, seventy-five want to go back to one service, twenty want two services, and thirty-nine did not comment one way or another. It is difficult to interpret whether those who didn't comment were happy with the current schedule or not.

Many stated the current schedule divided the congregation; they didn't see everyone, and it was stressful with the limited volunteers to handle the additional requirements of two services. Also, many believed that our attendance does not warrant having two services. It was indicated that having Sunday school and worship separately was too long for their kids and that Sunday school should be offered during the service.

Those who were happy with the two services like the flexibility it offered and that it allowed them to get out earlier if they attended the early service. Some suggested having Sunday school during one of the services.

So did we attain our goals in nine months? Some would say it is too early to tell, and we haven't given the new schedule a chance. Others believe it is causing too much of a division and needs to be fixed. Looking at numbers, our attendance increased by 2 percent compared to the same time period the year before. Twelve new members joined the church in 2008. As of May 31, six new members have joined in 2009. Sunday school attendance is the same to slightly lower than it was in the previous year, and no one is pounding down the doors to teach Sunday school. Adult Christian education held its own with an average of six to ten people per class.

The comments and numbers included above are a good, overall look at the results of the survey. There were so many comments, both related and unrelated to the new schedule. It is impossible to list them all. All unrelated comments have been passed on to session, who will evaluate and pass them on to the appropriate committees, if necessary. The committee has met and will be making a recommendation to session at the end of June.

I would like to thank all the committee members for all their input and hard work over the past seventeen months. I would also like to thank everyone who participated in this survey and to those who attended the meeting on May 31.
