WORKS OF WORSHIP

The Service of the Eucharist (or Communion)

Even though there is a lot going on in the Service of Communion, most of it doesn't take much time. With an efficient system of distributing Communion, it only lasts ten to fifteen minutes. It is done reverently, but we don't run it into the ground.

Unlike the Service of the Word, the Service of Communion never stands alone. The Service of Communion always immediately follows the Service of the Word, and Calvin, Luther, and Knox taught that it should ALWAYS follow the Service of the Word. Somehow we got away from that. If you are attentive, you can see how it recapitulates the entire Easter story, from Palm Sunday to the Resurrection.

The Jewish parallel to the Service of Communion is the kiddush after their service, following the pattern in Nehemiah 8. In Christian worship, it became the Eucharist, which is the original name. "Eucharist" means "thanksgiving" in Greek.

Allow me to explain a few technical terms that will help you to better follow the discussion. The technical terms sound pretty imposing until you get used to them. Since they don't usually appear in the bulletin, you can learn them and then amaze your friends and astound your pastor with your liturgical erudition!

Here is a typical order of worship:

- Confession and Assurance of Pardon
- **❖ Sursum Corda** (Latin for "hearts up!"
- **Tersanctus** (Latin for "holy, holy, holy")
- **❖** Anamnesis (Greek for "remembrance" in the sense of "reenactment")
- Mysterion (the mystery of our faith)
- **Epiclesis** (the "calling down" of the Holy Spirit; the Consecration)
- Our Lord's Prayer
- **Fraction** (the ceremonial breaking of the bread)
- Distribution
- Prayer of Thanksgiving

The Eucharist in Detail

The Church inherited the Service of the Word from the synagogue, so the Service of the Eucharist is the only part of the worship service that is uniquely Christian. (Ask our confirmation/commissioning class about how much of the service at the synagogue was like our service.) The Eucharist is essentially one giant prayer that is almost entirely composed of quotations and allusions to Scripture.

Confession and Assurance of Pardon

When the Eucharist is not celebrated, a prayer of confession and assurance of pardon is most usually found at the beginning of the service. When the Eucharist is celebrated, confession and pardon are incorporated into the Eucharistic Prayer.

Sursum Corda

This is the only part of the Eucharist that is not a prayer; it is a call to prayer.

The words "sursum corda" are Latin for "hearts up!" It refers to a series of responses that are invariably a part of every Christian Eucharist. The celebrant alerts the congregation to the sursum corda by using the Christian call to prayer. The congregational response is in italics.

The Lord be with you! (I am blessing you...I will extend my hands out toward you.)

And also with you. (You are blessing me...you should extend your hands out to me in blessing...and don't be such a stiff old Presbyterian; you're allowed to move.)

With these words (which come from Ruth 2:4 and 1 Samuel 17:37) the congregation empowers the celebrant to perform the service.

The purpose of having responses is to get the congregation to do worship rather than just watch it. These aren't the Middle Ages! If I'm the one leading the service and I don't get a hearty response, I want to say, "What? You don't want the Lord to be with me?" The old style of Presbyterian worship was rather stuck in the mud. The minister sent and the congregation received. It missed the mark because worship is something with which we are to be involved together. Almost all of you recognize the difference in the atmosphere of worship at Christmas and Easter when there are a greater number of individuals singing the hymns, praying the prayers, and making the responses. Everyone responding lifts the sense of worship for everyone else. It's a good old Reformed tradition of "the priesthood of all believers."

The actual sursum corda follows. Again, the congregational response is in italics:

Lift up your hearts!

We lift them up to the Lord.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God!

It is right to give Him our thanks and praise.

"Lift up your hearts" comes from Lamentations 3:14. Since "Eucharist" means "thanksgiving," the rest is basically a call to Communion.

After the sursum corda, the celebrant prays a brief (and I mean *brief*) prayer that is the proper preface for the season or for the special holy day—or in other words, a prayer that is in line with the theme of the season or the day (which makes it proper) and that leads into the Eucharist itself (which makes it a preface).

Tersanctus

The word "tersanctus" is Latin for "thrice holy." This prayer-hymn historically begins every Eucharist. The first half derives from a synagogue prayer that is based on Isaiah 6. The second half is a portion of the narrative of Palm Sunday in the gospels. It is called the "tersanctus" because it begins with the word "holy" three times in a row (in Latin, sanctus, sanctus, sanctus; hence: tersanctus). The celebrant and the congregation can say it, sing it, or chant it. We pretty much stick to saying it.

The tersanctus is:

Holy, holy, holy Lord
God of power and might—
Heaven and earth are full of your glory,
Hosanna in the highest!
Blessed is He who comes in the Name of the Lord!
Hosanna in the highest!

The first part comes from a synagogue prayer based on Isaiah 6:3; the second part comes from Matthew 21:9, Mark 11:9-10, and John 12:13. The Church doesn't change the words "blessed is He" to "blessed is the one" because that change allows people to interpret this as applying to the celebrant. It does not. The "He" refers to Jesus entering Jerusalem on Palm Sunday.

Anamnesis

"Anamnesis" is the Greek word that means "remembrance," with the true idea being "reenactment." This is the part that reenacts the Last Supper. The celebrant blesses the bread and wine (we use grape juice so everyone can participate), using words that are based on 1 Corinthians 11. In fact, most of what is said in the Service of the Word and the Service of Communion are either quotations or allusions to Scripture.

Mysterion

It goes without saying that "mysterion" is Greek for "mystery," but I said it anyway. This consists of the congregation proclaiming the mystery of our faith:

Christ has died Christ is risen Christ will come again

Epiclesis

"Epiclesis" is Greek for "calling down"—think of the Scriptures in which the Holy Spirit descends as a dove. The celebrant prays to the Holy Spirit to consecrate the bread and fruit of the vine, using wording that is based on Acts 17:28 and John 6:53-59.

Our Lord's Prayer

Our Lord's Prayer, which is in Matthew 6:9-13 and Luke 11:2b-5, is appropriate at this point because it asks for forgiveness and our daily bread, which is Jesus, the bread of life. We use "Our Lord" rather than "The Lord" simply because that is who Jesus is to us.

Fraction

The fraction is when the celebrant breaks the bread as Jesus did in Mark 14:22.

Distribution

At this point, we use one of two alternatives for distributing Communion.

The ancient practice is for the congregation to come forward, using a common cup and a common loaf of bread. In congregations where the Eucharist is being done as it should be, after every Service of Word, most congregations take Communion by intinction, when each person dips his or her piece of bread into the cup. The advantage of coming forward is that it makes Communion active. It is a chance to stand up for Jesus Christ in public, and it has the added benefit of letting everyone stretch his or her legs. The disadvantage is that for some people who cannot walk forward easily, they can feel conspicuous because the clergy and the Communion servers have to go to them and serve them in their seats. But when you take Communion at the Presbytery, Synod, or General Assembly level, it will almost always be by intinction.

During the Reformation, some parts of the Reformed tradition innovated curb service in the pews. The idea was to emphasize the priesthood of all believers, where each person serves the next. However, in practice, people just pass it around. The disadvantage is that it becomes awkward when there are large gaps between people in the pews or if small children are sitting in places where they have to pass the plates. On the first Sunday of the month when we use this method, we need to keep in mind that we do it in this manner to emphasize the priesthood of all believers.

Whichever way we do it, we make a point of having enough equipment and people to distribute Communion quickly and efficiently.

Prayer of Thanksgiving

Communion concludes with a prayer of thanks, not just for Communion, but also for the hope of the Resurrection in Jesus Christ. It also asks God to empower the congregation to live as Christians beyond the service.

As we approach August and our worship format changes, we will readjust our rehearsal time to accommodate the change in time.

While you are out and about this summer, reflect on what space is sacred to you. I recently read an article on sacred sites around the world and how different people have special places that they consider sacred. Our sanctuary is one—people sometimes stop in during the week and just go inside to pray. Your personal sacred space could be a religious space, a mountaintop, a forest glen, a roaring stream—anywhere you can sit and center yourself. For many, Wednesday at the Well has provided the opportunity to observe sacred space here at church.

We can also create space by closing our eyes and praying. It calms the soul and opens up space within so that we can withdraw from the crisis of the moment and just "be." It seems our minds are always running from the moment we awaken until bedtime—we're thinking of past things that happened to us or what we plan to do in the future—and we miss the present moment, which is so rich and can feed our souls.

I thought of some questions to ask myself this summer. What place is sacred to me? Why? What do I feel when I go there? Do I touch something inside that speaks to me? Is God saying something that I am failing to hear? How can I be used for Christian service? Then I will listen for the still, small voice that whispers inside.

I close with a special prayer I recently discovered. The prayer is by the Persian poet Hafez.

"I am a hole in the flute that Christ's breath moves through.

Listen to this music."

HERE COMES THE MEMORIAL MEDITATION GARDEN!

I am pleased to report that construction on the first phase of the Maney-Hawkins Memorial Meditation Garden will begin at the end of May/in early June. Phase I will focus on setting the footings for three columbarium walls and erecting the center wall, which contains twenty-eight double-niches. Each niche will be twelve inches high by twelve inches wide by twenty-four inches deep, allowing for two remains-cylinders per niche (for TWO individuals).

To date, only two niches have been purchased. That means there are now twenty-six left for sale. There is a "pre-construction" cost of \$2,500 per niche for any family or individual that is interested (all funds will be directed to the completion and maintenance of the garden). After the first columbarium wall is erected, the cost for each double-niche will be \$3,500 (still an incredible value as cemetery plots and stones can cost up to three times more). <u>Now</u> is the time for anyone interested to take advantage of the extraordinary value of the "pre-construction" cost!

The Memorial Garden will move into Phase II over the summer with the installation of the nineteen-foot meditation labyrinth and continue on with the installation of lighting, inscribed pavers, bench, and walkways. We have sixty inscribed pavers to start the project; however, we are looking to add additional memorial pavers. The cost of each paver with inscribing is only \$100. What a wonderful way to have a friend or loved one remembered!

The Memorial Garden Committee has raised \$21,626 to start the project. An additional \$13,000 commitment has been received from The Jonathan George Memorial Fund (for June), taking the total to over \$34,000. Our new garden will follow all the original design elements and execute the concept through a modular plan for less than \$50,000.

This means we as a congregation need to prayerfully consider purchasing niches for ourselves and our loved ones. We are so very close to making this wonderful meditation space a completed reality. All we need to do is raise approximately \$15,000 in additional funds.

Therefore, we need your help...each and every one of you...to buy and sell more pavers, solicit additional donations for garden elements, and to volunteer (as needed) to perform the necessary hard work. I will be regularly writing and talking about what is needed, so please keep an open ear and willing heart and hands toward this meaningful endeavor as we make it a reality in 2008.

The 2008 Operating Budget consists of operating revenues and expenses only, not capital expenses needed to maintain and improve our church home and grounds. The Operating Budget consists of income and expenses anticipated for the day-to-day operation of the church facilities and programs.

The Finance and Administration Committee has prepared a Capital Budget for prioritized capital expenses to maintain and improve our church home and grounds. The plan is to <u>fund the Capital Budget through an annual Capital Fund Campaign</u> targeted specifically for need-based projects.

The Finance and Administration Committee and the Property Management Committee will work collectively to fund and complete the following 2008 prioritized projects:

- Continue church and Fellowship Hall masonry repairs that are needed desperately (the small towers on either side of the rear Tiffany window are pulling away from the wall)—approximate cost: \$18K
- 2. Church Park drainage (the Village of Goshen DPW has already asked permission from First Presbyterian Church to install a catch basin)—approximate cost: \$5K
- 3. Repair one church sanctuary window—approximate cost: \$2K

The above costs are estimates, and all projects will move forward after several bids are received and evaluated.

Our church home needs your financial support for the 2008 Capital Campaign—an amount you agree to pledge over and above any 2008 pledge you already made toward our 2008 Operating Budget. You can pay the Capital Campaign pledge in periodic increments or in a lump sum between now and the end of the year.

PRAYER SHAWL MINISTRY

The Prayer Shawl Ministry in our church is trying to meet the present need for the shawls. It seems like every time one of us begins a new shawl and doesn't know where it will go, the shawl finds its home before the last stitch is made and charm is attached. We recently found small heart charms to put on the corner of each shawl before it leaves our church doors to put a "hug" around someone. Each heart charm is engraved with "Handmade with Love."

I know many of you are following this ministry, so here is a little update on what is happening. We are keeping a journal of where we send the shawls. We know our shawls are in <u>at least</u> ten other states, and the majority of them are sent for illness. We are trying to make sure that each baby that is baptized in the church also receives a small shawl (blanket) of love for the special day. Several wedding shawls and bereavement shawls have also been sent from the parlor.

Recently, one of our ladies met up with a woman that received one of our first shawls. She is <u>still</u> fighting her cancer and mentioned that she will be in treatment for the "rest of her life." This young mother has such courage and is truly "living every day," not waiting to die. She explained that she keeps her shawl over a chair in the living room when it isn't around her shoulders, and it inspires her to make the most of every day she has left. She also had a favor to ask. She has a friend with a blood cancer and thought a prayer shawl might encourage her as she goes forward with her treatments. Of course, we immediately said we would be honored to send one to this person.

Another mother, who has suffered with MS her whole life, recently found out she has ovarian cancer, so another shawl is being made for her. This woman's daughter had a brain tumor as a child and survived. Now that young woman is getting her medical degree so she can help others. In a time when this mom should be celebrating with her daughter, she is fighting for her life. How could we not send our love in the shape of a shawl to this person?

The help we ask from you, our brothers and sisters in Christ, is to continue to support this wonderful cause. We would like to start collecting yarn so more shawls can be made and sent. One of our ladies uses the leftover yarn from finished shawls, and her color combinations are exquisite. When a prayer shawl is sent from the church, it is sent with a folder of prayers, sheets explaining the colors with which it was made, and a copy of the article written about our group. The maker of the shawl is usually anonymous to the receiver; the note says that it was given "IN LOVE FROM THE PRAYER SHAWL MINISTRY OF THE GOSHEN FIRST PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH."

The letters and notes received from the shawl recipients are being saved in a notebook for anyone to see. When you read these notes, you can't help but get teary-eyed at how much they are appreciated.

The ministry will not be meeting on a regular basis in the summer, but we will continue to work on our "hugs" to give comfort to those who need it and to celebrate with those that are having a joyous event. Thanks to each of you that has helped us in any way. Your love keeps us going.
