Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

This week, Mary planted all the flowers we bought at the plant sale, and we even went to the farm to get a few more to fill out the space we have. It got me thinking about gardening.

If we compare our spiritual hearts/lives to a garden, we find that there are three garden beds: worship, community service, and personal spiritual growth. These are the three main areas out of which grow everything we do spiritually. I think most of us, with our busy schedules, do one of two things. We either see the weeds in one garden bed and start pulling, while letting the others go, or we look at the weeds and say, "Why bother? I can get what I want someplace else." That is where the metaphor of our spiritual lives as gardens tends to fail us. Because we still think of gardening as a hobby, and if we want fresh fruits and vegetables, we can just go to the store and buy them.

A spiritual life, though, isn't something we can shore up by buying it somewhere else. You can't buy a spiritual life just as you can't buy experience. Spiritual growth that yields fruit means we need to tend our garden. We need to find the balance in our lives that allows us to nourish our personal spiritual life while giving to the community of faith through service and worship. Each of these things may find a unique rhythm in your life, perhaps focusing on personal spiritual growth during summer and switching to service during the winter months. Whatever the rhythm is which allows you to tend the garden of your soul is how you keep the weeds at bay.

But what are the weeds of a spiritual garden? They are many, just as with a real garden. But if we were to ask what are the pigweed and lambs quarter of our souls (in other words, the perennially tough weeds that always show up and always need weeding), we would find that they are apathy and delusion. Apathy is the weed that thinks that it doesn't matter if we tend our spiritual soul. "I'll do it someday," says apathy. "I'm a good person." "I don't have time right now." "I just don't feel like it." These are the ways that apathy allows our hearts to become overrun and dried out. The other weed, delusion, tells us that there is no spiritual heart, that we can do whatever we want and God will love us anyway. It tells us that nothing matters unless we say it does, and what's really important in life is having fun. And lastly it says, "If you haven't yet experienced a real connection with God in a deep way, then it must not be true." These are the messages of the weed delusion. They are the great smoke screens that keep us stumbling around among the weeds, wondering why there isn't any real spiritual fruit in our lives and why God seems so far away.

Our spiritual lives are meant to gain strength from our actual daily lives, meaning that gardening can have a real influence on our spiritual lives by showing us how things work. Here's the reality: to get tomatoes, you have to plant tomato seeds. Then you have to fertilize, water, weed, and stake them. That's how it's done. That's real. The same goes for our spiritual lives; the seeds have been planted. Now you need to nourish, water, weed, and help them to stand up and mature into fruits bearing faith. That's real.

So, that's the thought for this week. Lots of weeds, sure, but go ahead and start. You won't get them all, but you'll get most of them, and that means fruit!

JUNE BRINGS US INTO SUMMER WARMTH AND RELAXATION



June ushers in the anticipation of getting out of school, of getting out into nature, of traveling. We look forward to being outdoors and rejoicing in the bounty of God's creation. (And grilling.)

On May 17, we celebrated our Ministry of Music program. It is always a special time as we bring the formal "singing" year to a close and move into summer. This is not to say that the choir no longer sings—we most certainly do! We simply move into our summer choir mode and make room for whoever is able to join us and sing anthems together on Sunday mornings throughout the summer. Please consider joining us on a Sunday morning at 10:00 a.m. as we rehearse an anthem for the service to follow.

On June 14, we formally dedicate the memorial garden and labyrinth with a celebratory luncheon to follow. We are planning an outdoor service on June 21; it's always renewing to move outside and informally worship in nature in the midst of nature and community.

Some thoughts taken from last year's Tower Tie which still have meaning for us as we move into summer.

While you are out and about this summer, reflect on what space is sacred to you. I recently read an article on sacred sites around the world and how different people have special places that they consider sacred. We now have a wonder meditation tool—the labyrinth. Another space is our sanctuary—people sometimes stop in during the week and just go inside to pray. Your personal sacred space could be a religious space, a mountaintop, a forest glen, a roaring stream—anywhere you can sit and center yourself. For many, Wednesday at the Well has provided the opportunity to observe sacred space here at church.



We can also create space by just closing our eyes and praying. It calms the soul and opens up space within so that we can withdraw from the crisis of the moment and just "be." It seems our minds are always running from the moment we awaken until bedtime—we're thinking of past things that happened to us or what we plan to do in the future—and we miss the present moment, which is so rich and can feed our souls.

I thought of some questions for myself this summer. What place is sacred to me? Why? What do I feel when I go there? Do I touch something inside that speaks to me? Is God saying something that I am failing to hear? How can I be used for Christian service? Then listen for the still small voice that whispers inside.

I close with a special prayer I recently discovered. The prayer is by the Persian poet Hafez:

*"I am a hole in the flute that Christ's breath moves through.
Listen to this music."*

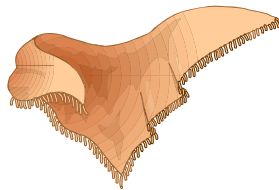
Stitch and Sow

The day has finally arrived! Immediately following the 10:30 a.m. worship service on Sunday, June 14, Pastor Kingsley will lead us in an outside, at-site dedication service for the new Maney-Hawkins Meditation Garden.

After the dedication, there will be a luncheon reception in Fellowship Hall with two meat stations, a pasta station, vegetables, and wonderful dessert platters for each table (a \$5/person contribution is requested).

Just before the dedication (during Christian education hour of 9:30 a.m. to 10:15 a.m.), please plan on joining “Labyrinth Expert” Lynn Brown in the garden as she discusses “The Labyrinth” and demonstrates how to walk a labyrinth, its spiritual aspects, and how we can all benefit from this new mediation space.

We continue to encourage all to consider purchasing a niche in the memorial columbarium wall (sixteen are available for sale). The cost for each double-niche is only \$3,000. Each double-niche is 11¼ inches cubed and allows for either double or single interment. *This is a remarkable value, given the cost of cemetery plots and gravestones.*

Please also consider purchasing an inscribed memorial paver to honor and remember a loved one. Pavers are only \$100 each, and our garden has plenty of room for more! Spread the word to the community at large...*this is a non-denominational memorial and meditation space and is open to everyone!*

Finally, you can continue to help maintain the beauty of the garden by donating funds for plants (in honor and memory of loved ones) or for ongoing maintenance. Just see Pat at the church office for any information you may need.

Hey,

So it is by far the hottest day I have had in Samoa so far. It is EXTREMELY humid and well over 100 degrees, so that makes life a challenge. On Friday, I went to Apia because they were televising one of the playoff games on ESPN Australia. Then we convinced the place to open on Sunday to watch another game, which is very unusual in Samoa, but the owner is an Australian-born Samoan who didn't seem to have too big of a problem with it. Then on Monday, it was pouring rain, a literal downpour. So I stayed in Apia an extra day.

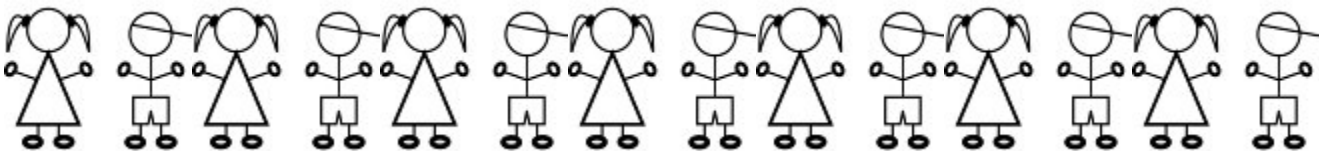
On Friday, I stayed in the Peace Corps hostel, which was a dump. It was SOOOOO hot. Hopefully, I won't have to stay there too many times. Then I stayed at the house of this girl from my group, Cris, the rest of the time. I came back on Tuesday. On Tuesdays, they clean one of the boats so there are random time slots when the boat just won't come. The boats come at 6, 8, 10, 12, 2, and 4. There are two boats, a big boat and a small boat. So one leaves Savai'i and Upolu at those times. On Tuesday, the boat will come at 6 and 4, but one of the other 4 time slots it will not. They will only run one boat. And it is never the same time; they change it. Samoans seem to have a sixth sense about it, but none of the older volunteers have figured it out yet.

Also on Sundays, there is only one boat. So the boat leaves Savai'i at 10 and 2 and from Upolu at 12 and 4. But the bus schedule is different, so the advice is to never take the boat on Sunday because you could be stranded at the wharf. Most of the time there are about ten buses right outside the wharf with signs indicating where they are going on the island.

But back to the boats! The big boat fits about twenty cars and many, many people. It is completely covered, and there is an air-conditioned part with a TV. And it doesn't rock so much in the open ocean. And it is faster; it only takes 65 minutes on the big boat. The small boat fits about ten cars and only has a small shaded area, so most of the time you have to stand in the sun between cars or along the side of the boat. And it takes about 85 minutes on the small boat. So the small boat stinks, and the big boat is what you want.

That is it for now.
