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Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Forgive my hidden faults. Keep your servant also from willful sins; may they not rule over me (Psalm 19:12-13 NIV).

As citizens of this nation, we are a free people. We boast in this regularly. Every summer for one day (or weekend), we celebrate this openly. Though governed by laws, we are free to pursue our dreams, free to say what we think, free to travel and move about, free to vote for our leaders, free to worship or not worship. Our culture presents us with a lengthy menu of choices in many aspects of life—and we are free to choose. Indeed, we have much to celebrate.

And yet we know that living in the land of the free and the home of the brave makes us neither free nor courageous. As citizens, we are free. As human beings made in God's image, we are not as free as we might think.

These days, our free land is inhabited by many who live each day anxious and fearful. While free to do whatever we can dream, the dream seems to be dying a slow death for many. Loss of work has sharply curtailed a life of freely making choices. Many who have work are enslaved to their jobs or employers. Hoping desperately to perform well, they carry the daily burden of doing what they need to do to hang on.

The pressure of this kind of life can easily open the door to other things that steal freedom. Addictions can begin to take root in the soul: addiction to a substance that eases the fear, addiction to pleasures that distract, addiction to busyness that exchanges intimacy for the kind reward that comes to those who work hard enough.

In the weeks ahead, we will be thinking about our freedom. We get some help today from Psalm 19. The end of Psalm 19 invites us to examine our freedom, recognizing that freedom is diminished by anything that gains mastery over us. Two phrases capture what those things might be. We can be ruled by our "hidden faults" (v. 12) and "willful sins" (v. 13).

Sometimes our freedom is limited by things we willingly and knowingly do. Whether an inclination we know we have or a habit that we've never been able to break, we know this thing has us. We keep gravitating toward it, repeating the same behaviors over and over again. We can tell ourselves that these things are harmless, that no one else is being hurt—but that doesn't change the fact that we are not truly free.

And then there are our hidden faults. Our freedom can be diminished by things of which we are not aware. Others who are close to us may see how these things hinder us. If we are lucky, they will lovingly tell us the truth. While we claim to be free, we are sometimes bound by attitudes that are deeply ingrained, patterns that are self-destructive, expectations of ourselves and others that are unrealistic. Not only are we not free, we also don't know that we're not free.

The prayer of Psalm 19 is simple: "May they not rule over me." The psalmist knows that freedom is not a right that comes to us by the laws of the state. True freedom is a gift that comes to us by the grace of God.

From what we learned from Orra, she is very lucky and will only have to be in a brace for a few weeks. We all know from history that this accident could have been so much worse. We wish you rapid healing, Sandy. Several other shawls were mailed also.

Those little balls of leftover yarn are being used by several of the ladies, including Barbara Hankins and Jo Wolfe, to make hats. Each one is so unique, and they are all beautiful. There are so many sizes, and we know every one of them will warm someone's head when that winter chill sets in. It reminds me of the old saying I heard often while growing up: "Waste not, want not." Those small bits of leftover yarn will continue to be useful. Keep up the great work, everyone.

Memorial Pavers

Are you interested in purchasing a memorial paver to honor or remember a loved one? If you are interested, please see Pat in the church office. The cost of each paver is \$100, and a new order will be placed in early summer.

Niches are Available for Purchase in the Memorial Columbarium

Each niche allows for double or single interment, and the following four purchase options are available:

Payment in Full = \$2,500 12-Month Payment Option = \$250 / month for 12 months (\$3,000) 24-Month Payment Option = \$130 / month for 24 months (\$3,120) 36-Month Payment Option = \$90 / month for 36 months (\$3,240)

A PIECE OF HISTORY

The three story brick parish house of the First Presbyterian Church is being torn down to provide a parking lot for the church. The 1872 building was supplanted last year with an addition to the church known as the John Knox Christian Education Building. The parish house is located at the corner of South Church Street and Park Place, across from the church and Church Park. It was indicated by church officials recently that the site would become a parking lot for parishioners on Sundays and would probably be open for use by persons having weekday business at the adjoining County Surrogate's Building and County Building. It is possible that at a later date, the spokesmen said, that a modern Presbyterian manse would be built on the site. The present manse, at the corner of South Church Street and Parkway, is a 13-room structure built in 1869. The site of the present parish house was a young woman's seminary in 1800 when Montague House was built by Nathaniel Minturn. In 1872, Civil War Capt. Ellis A. Post built the present parish house as a home for himself. Capt. Post engaged P. H. Terhune of Binghamton, the builder of the First Presbyterian Church in 1869, as his builder. Mr. Terhune used the same stone trim, Onondaga limestone, to trim Mr. Post's home as he used for trim on the church. The church committee who acquired the Post home in 1923, renamed it the parish house. As such, the first and second floors were used for meetings, recreation and church school. The top floor was reserved as living guarters for the sexton and his family.
