### Praying for our Children

Then Manoah said, "Now when your words come true, what is to be the boy's rule of life; what is he to do?" Judges 13:12 (NRSV)

I've known the story of Samson for as long as I can remember.

My guess is that the defining and enduring image of him that I carry in my mind came from pictures taped to walls of Sunday school classrooms. In those pictures, Samson stands between two pillars, a hand placed on each one, ready to exert his hulk-like strength in a valiant act of self-sacrifice and service to God.

As years have passed, I've come to understand that there were parts of Samson's story that were not talked about in Sunday school. Most notably is Samson's weakness for Philistine women. We were not told much about his visit to a prostitute in Gaza or his demand that his parents arrange a marriage with a Philistine woman because "she is right in my eyes." And, let me add, these parts of the story were not taped to the walls of the Sunday school classroom.

Another aspect of Samson's story that I've only recently come to appreciate has to do with Samson's parents. Like Hannah, Samson's mother had not been able to conceive a child. All of that changed when an angel of the Lord visited her and announced that she would have a son. When her husband, Manoah, met the angel he asked a question that ought to shape the prayers of most parents: "what is to be the boy's rule of life; what is he to do?" (Judges 13:12).

Manoah and his wife were told that her son would be set apart and devoted to God, "a Nazirite to God from the womb." According to Numbers 6 this meant that he would not drink wine or strong drink; he would avoid contact with anything dead; his hair would not be cut.

Samson's parents did exactly as the angel instructed. They raised their son according to the scriptures. They set him apart for God, guarding him from what was unclean and letting his hair grow long. But Sampson grew up and proved to be an unruly man. He looked like a Nazirite, but he didn't act like one.

Samson's parents had devoted their son to God, but they could not make him devout.

There's a saying about parents and kids that says "the apple doesn't fall far from the tree." The saying is clever – but it isn't always true. There are instances when the apple is not only far from the tree, it doesn't even resemble an apple. There is a peculiar and grievous pain in parenting when the best efforts to raise a child 'in the fear and admonition of the Lord' seem to have been in vain.

This is why we must pray for our children. When we pray we call upon God to do what we cannot do. If we could engineer who our kids become simply by taking them to church, prayer would be unnecessary. But what we most want for our children we cannot bring about, even by the best of parenting practices. Parents are not the Holy Spirit.

If you're a parent, what are you praying for your children today? What are you asking God to do that you cannot do?

# The Labyrinth

(I was asked to repeat this section on our beautiful Labyrinth in the Meditation Garden. Here it is again as inspiration for our souls.)

During the summer, take some time to sit in the Meditation Garden (or sign up and take a turn keeping it weed-free); or bring a special concern in your life, walk the labyrinth, and receive your answer.



The labyrinth is an ancient tool for prayer and meditation. It consists of a winding path that begins at the periphery and leads to a central space. The same path is used to exit the labyrinth.. Before entering, spend a few moments standing or sitting quietly at the periphery allowing yourself to become still and attentive. Breathe. Invite the Holy Spirit to be with you as you begin the walk. Enter the path and move at your own pace, pausing and feeling the curves of the labyrinth as you wish. Spend some time in the center of the labyrinth seeking awareness of God's presence. This may be a time of healing, clarity, or dedication of

self. When you are ready, return on the path outward carrying with you any insights or blessings you may have received. Express your gratitude. The labyrinth is a place of beauty and sacredness --you will be blessed.
