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Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Not long ago, I had a conversation with someone that said she was surprised to hear that the New Orleans Mardi Gras celebration was connected with Lent; she didn't see how that was possible. So, since we are now in the season of Lent, I thought we might review how all this works.

First, we need to remember that the Christian seasons are not biblical; the church created them many years after the apostles took to the highways and bi-ways to create the Christian movement as a way to mark the major events in Jesus' life. Although not strictly "original," Lent, a forty-day period before Easter (not including Sundays), has a long and detailed history. Lent is a time of reflection on our sins, penitence, prayer, and remembrance of the passion, death, and purpose of Christ. This period is often seen as an opportunity to renew our own baptisms, deepen our convictions, and seek to be more faithful to our Lord.

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, which was named for the tradition in the First Testament of placing ashes on the head as a sign and symbol of repentance (sack cloth and ashes). Receiving ashes during the time of Lent goes back to the very early church. Traditionally, the ashes are from the palm fronds used the previous Palm Sunday. The sign of the cross is a symbol of sorrow as we meditate on Christ's sacrifice, a reflection of our own nature, and a mark of our frailty and need of God.

So, what does Mardi Gras have to do with all of this? Over the years, new traditions formed in the church. One of these traditions called for everyone to confess his or her sins on the day before Lent so he or she would be properly prepared to begin the season. In England, confession was also called *shriving*, and on the Tuesday before Ash Wednesday, many churches would ring the "shriving bell" to remind the faithful to go to confession. That is why the day before Lent is called Shrove Tuesday.

Shrove Tuesday is also called Fat Tuesday because of other traditions that emerged. Lent was seen as a time of physical and spiritual penitence, humility, and sacrifice. Therefore, within the Catholic Church, Lent became a time of purification and physical abstinence from all things luxurious. Clothes were mended, houses and kitchens were cleaned out and purified of the past year's accumulations, and all "luxury" food had to go (including meat, fish, eggs, milk products, and fat). Since people didn't want to waste all that tasty food, Shrove Tuesday also became Fat Tuesday, celebrated with great feasts during which all those fattening products could be consumed and used up. Pancakes and meat were often served because they incorporated many of the "had-to-go" ingredients.

As the feast day of Fat Tuesday grew, games and festivities were added, turning the meal into a huge event called "Carnival." It didn't take long for the celebration to extend beyond a one-day event, and it grew to become the carnival season it is today, stretching from January 6 (the twelfth night of Christmas) until Ash Wednesday and the start of Lent. Whether it's observed on one day or for a whole season, the celebration is a worldwide party and has various names like Carnaval (*carnival* in Portuguese, made famous in Rio de Janeiro), Fastnacht/fasnacht (*feast night* in German), and Mardi Gras (*fat/grease Tuesday* in French, made famous in the French quarter of New Orleans).

Well, there you have it. That's why a great number of churches have pancake dinners on the Tuesday before Ash Wednesday and why we place ashes on our heads on Ash Wednesday.

MARCH—LENT CONTINUES INTO HOLY WEEK AND RESURRECTION

In March, we continue our Lenten journey for the first two Sundays, still reflecting upon our lives and changes we might need to make as we prepare for Holy Week and Easter. In our daily meditation, we are still mirroring the reflective time spent by Jesus as he fasted in preparation for the agony of the Cross.



On **Palm Sunday**, our chancel choir invites you to follow them on a *Lenten Journey—from Jerusalem to Calvary*. I have written a guide that will lead us on a journey together. We begin with Jesus' entry into Jerusalem. We then follow his steps through Holy Week and his ultimate death. Our journey begins with a festive Procession of the Palms followed by the anthem "The Messiah Has Come." Then, midway into our service, the tone shifts to a more somber one as we begin to reflect on the events of Holy Week.

We know the story well, but I want us to think about our response to what we witness. One of our anthems is "Before the Cross of Jesus" (however, we are used to singing "Beneath the Cross of Jesus"). This anthem removes us from the scene as observers and asks us to stand before the cross and respond. Given what we see, what do we do about it? How does this act of Jesus change our lives?

Expanding on this theme is the plaintive "Father, Forgive Us" as our shortcomings are brought before our eyes and we plead for forgiveness. It asks us to identify with his suffering and live as if it mattered. Finally, our journey comes to a close with a spirited "Mary, Don't Listen to the Hammer Ring." We can leave on an uplifted note as we look forward to Easter.

For those who are able to get out, please join us for the **Maundy Thursday and Good Friday** services. Yes, it is a somber time, but it gives us the space to move into and share in the sufferings of our Lord as we recall his passion, death, and resurrection on our behalf. This can be a special time of response on our part in gratitude for our salvation.

Please join us on **Easter Sunday** as we celebrate the resurrection of our Lord, the foundation and heritage of our Christian faith. We always have an expanded congregation with music and flowers filling the sanctuary. We assemble all our musical resources to make this a beautiful time of worship and music befitting this celebration.

Prayer Shawl Ministry

After church on January 27, the Times Herald Record interviewed the Prayer Shawl Ministry while we crocheted. At that point, we had probably given out about thirty shawls and over thirty lap robes since we started in September. By the time you read this, we should have given out close to one hundred. We hope the newspaper article will appear before you get this Tower Tie.

We had a shawl presentation in church on February 3 during the service. We surprised Deb and Jon Hourahan with <u>our first, white wedding shawl</u>; the couple was wed in our church in December of 2007. The surprise was on us, though, as only Deb was present; Jon was home "getting better." They sent us a lovely thank-you note that will eventually go into the *Prayer Shawl Scrapbook* with the other notes that we received. That morning, we also presented several other shawls, including four to Orra Wood for residents in her assisted-living home. An additional six shawls were given out the next night after the PW meeting.

Baby shawls will be given to the children that are baptized in our church. If you know of an upcoming baptism, please tell our shawl group so we can make a prayer shawl for the infant.

Each shawl is unique in that many of us do not use patterns and simply let the shawls grow from our "hooks." The colors we use have been very different as well. We have a wonderful time with each Other and are a multi-generational group. Each person has contributed so much, and we are growing in number. When we started, we had just a handful of crocheters. Now, we are closing in on fifteen or more. Even some neighbors of some of the ladies have contributed to our "box of shawls."

The prayers and meanings of the shawl colors are in folders with the extra shawls, which are located in the gift room above the office. If you need a shawl or a lap robe (which is more of a square size, often used by a sitting person), please do not hesitate to take one. Just leave us the names of who you are and for whom you took it. You see, we have begun a journal of sorts. Dave Paffenroth bought and donated a journal to our group so that we can keep track of our efforts and how far our outreach has gone. When full (years from now), our journal will be given to our church as a legacy of our group.

When you begin spring-cleaning and come across some yarn you no longer need, please think of us. We take all types, big and small amounts. Mention this to your neighbors as well. We would like to start a "Yarn Drive," as each shawl can cost close to \$20 to make, depending on the type of yarn that is bought. **Donations of yarn are cheerfully accepted.**

Come and join us after church on Sundays from 12:00 p.m. to 2:00 p.m. We usually meet in the parlor but have been found working away in Fellowship Hall or even in the sanctuary. We meet wherever space is available. <u>Beginners are more than welcome</u>. Come and learn the art of crocheting, and make something that will be a blessing to another person.

MARCH IS COLORECTAL AWARENESS MONTH

Over 90 percent of all colon and rectal cancers could be prevented if everyone followed the American Cancer Guidelines and went for testing (screening) when it was deemed necessary. This is because most colon and rectal cancers start as a small polyp (abnormal growth) that takes years to grow and possibly cause cancer. Not all polyps are cancerous, but only after having them removed and the tissue analyzed can one know if they were "bad" or not. Most times, the removal of the polyps will be the only treatment necessary; the interval between repeat screening will be determined in part by whether or not polyps were present.

For most people without a family history of colorectal cancers or inflammatory bowel disease, testing should begin at age fifty. For those with risk factors, screenings are usually recommended at an earlier age. Speak with your family doctor to determine which testing is right for you and at what age it should begin.

The "golden standard" for detection and removal of polyps is the colonoscopy. This procedure allows a flexible tube with a camera to be passed through the rectum and large intestines. It requires a one- or two-day preparation in order to clean the bowels properly.

For comfort, sedation is given during the procedure. A colonoscopy can be done in either a doctor's office or in a hospital setting as an outpatient. Usually, a patient can receive heavier sedation if the procedure is done in a hospital setting. A specialized doctor called a *gastroenterologist* or a colorectal surgeon can perform this procedure, which lasts about ten to thirty minutes. Before scheduling a colonoscopy, one would have to make an appointment to see the gastroenterologist. After examining you and gathering a medical history, the procedure will be explained, the preparation for the colonoscopy will be reviewed, and a date to have the exam will be set. Be sure to bring a list of all your medications to the doctor's office and on the day of the procedure.

Timely screening prevents most types of colon and rectal cancers from occurring. Get your butt in gear and get going!
