Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

May 30 is Trinity Sunday. The Festival of the Holy Trinity, otherwise known as the Octave of Whitsunday (the Sunday after Pentecost), has been a part of the Christian calendar since 1334. Not all churches celebrate it—including the Eastern Orthodox Church—but I feel it is important because it allows us to both celebrate and better understand the Trinity.

Since there is really nothing to compare it to, the Trinity can be tough to comprehend. It is talked about all the time, but many people would admit they don't quite have a grasp on it. The

following is a very small taste of how people have tried to understand and explain it over the years. In a nutshell, the Trinity means that God eternally exists as three persons: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit (sometimes referred to as Creator, Redeemer, and Sustainer). Each "person" of the Trinity is fully God, separate yet together, different yet the same. Clear yet?

As the Westminster Larger Catechism puts it: "There be three persons in the Godhead, the Father, Son, and the Holy Ghost; and these three are one true, eternal God, the same in substance, equal in power and glory; although distinguished by their personal properties." (Book of Confession, The Larger Catechism, question#9—7.119)

Some theologians refer to this as *Perichoresis*, sometimes called *Circumincession* or the *Divine Dance*. All three persons of the Trinity mutually share in the life of the others, so that none is isolated or detached from the actions of the others.

Then there's *Homoousion*—a Greek word that means "of the same substance"—which came to be used during the fourth century by the church, who needed to explain that Christ was of the same substance as God (opposing the view of Arianism that Christ was of similar substance).

Some folks also like to differentiate between the Economic Trinity (what God does) and the Ontological Trinity (who God is). Fights, excommunications, and worse have taken place over our understanding of the Trinity. Now there are some who are wondering why it's such a big deal. It's big because it allows us to understand who Jesus Christ is. Was he just human or is he God? Was he just a nice, holy man who had good things to say, or is he still with us today? All things upon which we base our faith are tied into understanding the Trinity. That's why it's a big deal.

There's something else I want us to take away from this extremely abridged look at the Trinity: that the Perichoresis, this mutual indwelling, should not just be reserved for God but should be adopted by us all. Quoting from A. Raj Rao:

"Perichoresis happens when we make the effort to meet other types of Christians. Perichoresis is appreciating the unique gifts of different denominations, whether it be music, spirituality, theology, and learning from them. Perichoresis is moving out of our comfort zones and making friends with the elderly, the teenager, the housewife, the weirdo, and the shy guy... Perichoresis is us crossing our boundaries and living our lives in their lives, and they living their lives in ours. Just as Christ crossed the divine-human boundary to live his life in us."

On Trinity Sunday, let's not only celebrate God in three persons, let's remember our role in this great mystery of life.

Do you not believe that I am in the Father and the Father is in me? The words that I say to you I do not speak on my own; but the Father who dwells in me does his works. Believe me that I am in the Father and the Father is in me..." (John 14:10-11)

It is that time again—with spring cleaning starting, I am sure many of you are putting away items to donate to the annual church rummage sale. It is possible that maybe your neighbors or co-workers have items they would like to donate as well. The chairperson for the event is again Glynnis Jorgensen. Glynnis would be grateful to anyone who can help with this annual event, as many hands are needed to set up during the week of the sale and also to clean up on Saturday, May 29, in the afternoon.

Remember, items can be brought in from the evening of Monday, May 24 through Thursday, May 27. **We need saleable items, no junk.** Please do not bring us things just because you don't want to throw them away. Items brought in should be **CLEAN**, not broken. We cannot sell chipped glassware, toys with missing parts, books without covers, items with missing pieces, or items with frayed electrical cords. We also cannot sell used computers or exercise equipment.

The better the items look, the more money we can get for them, so run those excess dishes through a wash cycle before you donate them, and try to pack items that are similar in the same boxes. This makes it so much easier for those setting up. In the past, we noticed that the jewelry table does well, so clear out that costume jewelry from your jewelry boxes. New and usable items are always welcome as well. We accept toys with all the parts and furniture that is still in good condition.

Watch the bulletin for any last minute information about the rummage sale. Please offer a few hours of your time to this good fundraiser for your church. All church members should be able to donate an hour or two to help. Don't wait for a personal invitation to come. A LETTER FROM DAN

We had an all-school celebration, but the celebration was not very good. It was really hot, and Samoans have no heart when it comes to sports. They quit the race if they don't think they will win. It is really stupid. When one kid is clearly going to win, everybody else just stops and walks the "track" or the field. I was not happy, watching students just quit. Samoan cultural festivals are ridiculous. They don't really know what their real culture is; they don't know anything about Samoa before 1830, when the missionaries came. Basically, Samoa didn't exist before Christianity.

They take foods that they like, cook them, and claim they are authentic Samoan food. All the food here is new, within 100 years. They eat a lot of taro. Taro was imported from Fiji in the 1920s. Coconuts were rare on the island until they started making copra, which was maybe in the 1800s. Then chickens weren't here until the missionaries came, along with pigs and cattle. The real Samoan diet was a lot of fish, breadfruit, bananas, and all the fresh fruits that grow here. Samoans don't eat fruit. All the real Samoan fruits you can't even find in the market unless it is a fluke. And that is terrible because they are all really good but considered poor-people food. They don't like the fish because it isn't proper to go into the ocean without wearing a lot of clothing. Thanks to the missionaries.

They do eat a lot of bananas, but only green bananas that they boil, so they don't have any nutrients. And breadfruit is around, but it is gross. Well, not gross. You just can't eat a full breadfruit, not because it is bad and not because you are full, just because you get bored eating it. So they eat canned food, unripe bananas all covered in coconut cream, and then foreign foods that they adopted and just claim are Samoan. So much for food...
