Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Hope, peace, joy, and love are the gifts from having Christ enter our world. Often the first response is that these are unattainable ideals or pie in the sky. But they are spoken of in Scripture and Jesus taught about them. Therefore, perhaps we ought to look at them even though they require very hard work.

Hope, peace, joy, and love don't just happen; we have to do them. They are verbs that describe a living and active faith working in the world—our world—right now, whether we're at work, at home, with others, or by ourselves. There is a tension in this relationship because we have these seemingly huge, wonderful things we long for and we associate them with God and heaven, which gives us that pie in the sky idea, but they seem detached from our daily reality. Yet, we also have the Word made flesh, who, just like you and me, was born of a woman. But he was born into poverty and oppression in a dark manger with smelly hay, and then he was killed. The tension is between the great vision and the tension that Jesus himself enfleshed: fully divine and fully human. Look at all of Jesus' parables and read the same tension told in story.

Our western minds reel at such stretching of "reality." There seems to be a tension that is difficult to resolve. There is the realm of God and there is human reality, but can they exist on the same plain? There is justice and there is mercy, but can you have both at the same time? You can live pie in the sky or you can be realistic, but can you be a dreamer and a realist at the same time? We have set rules to reality, and we don't like to have them stretched or changed, and, yet, that is exactly what Jesus did and does. That is also what hope, peace, joy, and love do. If we saw each of these with as much "reality" as we see fear, anger, anxiety, hatred, and doubt, our world would be a different place. After all, isn't that the whole idea - that the coming of Jesus into the world has changed things? That life itself has shifted because now we see the reality of the hope, peace, joy, and love that he made visible?

So, do we choose peace or dissention? Hope or despair? Joy or fear? Love or hate? What most of us find is that destroying is easier than creating, and therefore we choose the easier path; we follow others into doubt, cynicism, and despair and learn that if we choose peace, we have to work at it. We have to become peace and bring that peace into our community and world. A peace so rooted in Christ's peace that when we are cut off in traffic, yelled at by our boss, suffering in pain, struggling with debt, or anxiously holding a marriage together, we still hold that peace in our hearts. The same is true of hope, joy, and love. How can we give to others unless we have them in abundance, practice them in our very being, and hold them in our hearts?

By the time you read this, Easter will have passed, the wonderful hymns of resurrection will be passed on until next year. Remember, even though the celebration has calmed into the routine of the Christian year, the presence of Christ and his gifts of hope, peace, love, and joy remain. These are gifts we can and must open every day of the year.

Remember, items can be brought in from the evening of Monday, May 23 through Thursday, May 26. *We need saleable items, no junk.* Please do not bring us things just because you don't want to throw them away. Items brought in should be **CLEAN**, not broken. We cannot sell chipped glassware, toys with missing parts, books without covers, items with missing pieces, or items with frayed electrical cords. We also cannot sell used computers or exercise equipment.

The better the items look, the more money we can get for them, so run those excess dishes through a wash cycle before you donate them, and try to pack items that are similar in the same boxes. This makes it so much easier for those setting up. In the past, we noticed that the jewelry table does well, so clear out that costume jewelry from your jewelry boxes. New and usable items are always welcome as well. We accept toys with all the parts and furniture that is still in good condition.

All church members should be able to donate an hour or two to help. Don't wait for a personal invitation to come. Hug Happenings News of the Prayer Shawl Ministry (PSM)

Dear Friends,

The months of 2011 seem to by flying by, and as they do, the "hugs" seem to be flying out the door of our church. For some reason, the need seems to be greater than ever lately. Some of us have gotten a reputation of being "shawl people," and we are approached at different locations to see if we "might have an extra shawl." Someone always seems to know someone who can use a hug. For that reason, more shawls than usual were sent out in April. Our wonderful group has been able to meet the demand so far. Of course, we count on you to help. We are always in need of yarn to continue this wonderful outreach, so anytime you want to drop off a few skeins at the church, know in your heart that you have dropped off a potential hug that will wrap someone's shoulders or drape on someone's lap to show that we care.

Recently, some of our shawls were sent to a mother with lymphoma, a ninth-grade girl who had serious sinus surgery at Westchester Medical Center, a sixth-grade young lady who has a tumor on her leg bone (it is yet to be determined what kind of tumor), several people who have been diagnosed with cancer, a first-time mother to wrap her with her new son, a caregiver taking care of her parents, a woman who is facing forced retirement a few years earlier than planned, and a first-time grandmother of twins. In the works are several wedding shawls for summer weddings, and we are always trying to keep a supply of blankets for christenings.

Our group is still trying to find a time to get together so we can exchange ideas and learn new patterns. Hopefully, as the weather gets better, we will find a day or a date after church when we can meet. Barbara Hankins and I have both recently taught classes outside of the church. One nurse that I taught was so thrilled with the prayer shawl idea that she made seven of them in a short time to give to some of her long-term patients who have little or no family to speak of. She said the smiles on their faces were great gifts, and she is so excited about learning a new skill. This, of course, made it all worthwhile to me as well.

Remember, if you find the need to send a shawl, we keep extras at the church, along with folders, prayer inserts, gift bags, etc. You may just go and take the one you like from the supply room that is up the stairs from the office.

Thank you again for praying for our group, that we will continue to fill the need. God bless each of you and, until next month, consider yourselves hugged.
