Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

I was cruising through hymns looking for one to which I knew some of the words, but knew neither the title nor was I sure of the first line...one or the other being needed to find it in the indexes. I paused for a moment when I turned to *Amazing Grace* and mused over the words. "Just as I am..." struck me again. We come as we are, not as we wish we were.

Given our familiarity with the language and title of this hymn, there is a peculiar phrase in Mark 4: 36. Jesus and his disciples are preparing to cross the Sea of Galilee after a long day of teaching. Mark tells us that "leaving the crowd, they took him with them in the boat, just as he was." We are accustomed to thinking and singing about ourselves and just as we are. What does Mark mean by telling us that Jesus got into the boat "just as he was?"

When I sing about coming to Jesus just as I am, I'm usually thinking about things that I'd be pleased to forget about. To come just as I am, means that I'm coming with plenty of regrets and more than a few failures. There's not much here to brag about.

When Jesus stepped into the boat just as he was, he wasn't 'going' in the same way that I'm 'coming.' "Just as he was" means his sinless self – but it also hints that he was very much like you and me. Fred Craddock explains the phrase this way: "Just as he was" meant that when Jesus got in the boat he was "whipped down, bedraggled, hungry, bent over already half asleep...no time to clean up, freshen up, dress up, change clothes...He's worn out." (Collected Sermons, 117) Jesus was neither glowing nor levitating as he got in the boat at the end of the day. He found his seat and leaned back, weary and just wanting a few moments to close his eyes.

Because Jesus entered the boat just as he was, we know he will be merciful when we come to him just as we are. That includes when we come to him doubting, questioning, cautious. Jesus is not aloof. He is with us. He shares the experience of living a truly human life. And because of this, we can call to him not only when the "furious squall" comes, but when the teapot tempest comes as well.

We received this lovely thank you that should be shared with all of you: *Dear Prayer Shawl Ministry, Thank* you for the beautiful shawls we each received upon the passing of Russell House. Each one was unique & they meant so much to our family. That feels like a warm hug from the church. We had picked up a blue lap robe when Russell was first diagnosed. He wore it when he was in the hospital and had it with him at the time of his passing. Please know that all of your hard work is appreciated! We sent two shawls for grief in the past few weeks. Danielle is a young lady who was raised by her grandmother. ANNUAL SPRING RUMMAGE SALE Friday and Saturday, May 24 and 25

Remember, items can be brought in from the evening of Monday, May 20 through Thursday, May 23. Please do not put anything on the stage before May 20. The stage is used every Sunday evening.

We need saleable items, no junk. We have to dispose of all unsold items. Items brought in should be CLEAN, not broken. We cannot sell chipped glassware, toys with missing parts, books without covers, items with missing pieces, or items with frayed electrical cords. We also cannot sell used computers or exercise equipment.

The better the items look, the more money we can get for them, so run those excess dishes through a wash cycle before you donate them, and try to pack items that are similar in the same boxes. This makes it so much easier for those setting up. In the past, we noticed that the jewelry table does well, so clear out that costume jewelry from your jewelry boxes. New and usable items are always welcome as well. We accept toys with all the parts and furniture that is still in good condition.

STEWARDSHIP

We've ended the first quarter of 2013. As many of you know Pastor Kingsley, Barbara, and I attended the Kaleidoscope Stewardship Conference in St. Louis from March 11-13. There were many workshops and we split up our time so we could attend as many as possible.

Stewardship is a year round process. We frequently think of Stewardship as giving a portion of our earned income to help complete God's work, but stewardship is giving of our time and talents, as well. The idea of being a complete giver was stressed at the conference. Everywhere that Jesus went he was giving to others; healing the sick, casting out demons, letting the little children partake in the events (the loaves and fishes), dining with tax collectors, washing the feet of the disciples, and countless other activities.

Our congregants have served hamburgers, French fries and corned beef sandwiches at the St. Patrick's Day Parade. This fundraising activity will help support those going to Nicaragua this year.

Others served chili to raise money for PresbyBuild which is in partnership with Habitat for Humanity. These funds recondition homes for worthy families who in turn help recondition homes for others.

Still others hid eggs, served pancakes, and helped parents take pictures of the children with the Easter Bunny at the Bunny Breakfast. The Deacons had their annual Palm Sunday breakfast which continued after the Palm Sunday service and became a Palm Sunday brunch. This was a delightful time for our church families and visitors to converse and enjoy great fellowship.

As always, we hosted the Community Dinner in January, February, and March and the Ecumenical Food Pantry distributed groceries to families in need. The Fellowship Hall and the John Knox Building were highly utilized over the first quarter of this year. Your stewardship dollar does more than pay for the utilities. They help families and individuals who gather at our facilities to put their lives back together or just to have fellowship.
