Satisfy us in the morning with your steadfast love... ([Psalm 90:14](#)).

“How did you wake up this morning?”

The question can be answered in several different ways. You may describe how you felt when you woke up - you may have been well-rested or sluggish. You could have awakened sore from a previous day's exercise. You could have awakened dreading the day or eager for what you have planned.

You could also answer the question by describing the means by which you woke up. You could have been brought to consciousness by someone gently shaking your shoulder or by the cry of a baby. You might have heard a neighbor's dog barking or the purr of your coffee maker getting the morning brew ready. The sound of your phone or a text message might have ended your slumber. There are many different ways to wake up in the morning.

Maybe you awakened the old-fashioned way - you used an alarm clock. Perhaps a large traditional clangor with big hand and little hand that tells the time, or a more modern clock that displays bright digital numbers and wakes you to traffic and weather reports or your favorite music. Whatever it looks like and however it functions, the task of the device is the same: to alarm.

The Weight of the Day

Webster's *New World Dictionary* provides six definitions of the word “alarm.” Of the six, only one refers in a neutral way to the mechanical function of a clock, using words like “bell” or “buzzer.” The remaining five definitions are all variations of the word “fear.” To be alarmed is to be threatened. Alarm is the “fear caused by the sudden realization of danger.”

So many of us wake up alarmed - and we live that way through the entire day!

Even though not threatened by imminent trouble or harm, we often feel the weight of the day from our first conscious moments. Our minds race with uncertainties that have not been resolved. We anticipate interactions with difficult people. We feel ordinary and relentless pressures about money and parenting and not exercising enough. Early news reports might greet us with news of the latest terrorist attack or humanitarian crisis.

We wake up alarmed – or just as likely our inner alarm kept us from sleeping in the first place. That's a hard way to live our days. What's more, it's not at all what God intends for us. The days we are given were never meant to be shrouded in fear, making us tense and timid from first light.

There is a line in Psalm 90 that is worth memorizing. It is a short prayer, a simple petition to be uttered at the beginning of the day, just as you wake up. “Satisfy us in the morning with your steadfast love that we may rejoice and be glad all our days” (Psalm 90:14).

This brief prayer reflects God’s will for you today. Wake up satisfied with his love. Even when the days holds difficult things for you, know that his love is steadfast and not fickle. Even when the world round you seems threatening and uncertain, God’s love is sufficient and will sustain you through whatever this day brings to you. Knowing this, you can live the day with joy and gladness.

As you go to bed tonight, go ahead and set your clock. But before you fall asleep, recite the words of Psalm 90:14. And when that clock goes off in the morning, be awakened but not alarmed. Be satisfied with his steadfast love.

So back to the question: “How did you wake up this morning?”

PRESBYBUILD – A SENTIMENTAL JOURNEY

When Sue Varden first asked me to author an article about PresbyBuild, I began considering what format I would employ. Should I list the houses chronologically, should I list all the groups who have volunteered on site, should I list all the fundraisers that make our outreach possible (for example, "Chili Challenge," etc.)? Should I write about our covenant relationship with Presbytery, should I list all the congregations Sue and I have visited to tell our story to, or should I tell of my personal experiences? I decided on the latter as it includes snippets of all of the above.

I retired from a local utility company in October of 1999. In mid-September my boss had asked me to attend a meeting in Newburgh to find out what this new non-profit, "Habitat for Humanity of Greater Newburgh" was all about. I attended the meeting, and two months later I was House Captain for the second Habitat house built in the City of Newburgh (you all know how that happens).

Two years later I was on site at the "Episcopal Build" house working with a volunteer from Union Presbyterian. Half way through nailing the new flooring in place, he turned to me and said, "If the Episcopalians can sponsor a house, why can't we Presbyterians?" Why not indeed? Two months later an organizational meeting was held at Union Presbyterian Church in the former Billiard Parlor. (honestly!).

PresbyBuild sponsored the first "New Build" for HFHGN on Liberty Street in Newburgh on land donated by an electrical contractor who had grown up around the corner on Clinton Street. It was here that I met Goshen church members Walter and Louise Spencer who worked with us clearing the site. As these memories came flooding back I realized I was on a "Sentimental Journey." Won't you join me for the rest of the journey?

I don't have the space to write about all the stops on our journey, as every house/home has a compelling story, but I will share two of those stories.

Working on the first PresbyBuild house, I was taking a lunch break with two volunteers who were sharing their experiences while serving in the armed forces in Viet Nam. The first had volunteered after graduating from college and signed up to be an Army photographer. After completing basic training and photographer school, he was given a rifle and was told that he was now a "combat photographer." His job was to document the aftermath of the firefights and battles. When he was discharged, he was not allowed to bring any negatives or pictures home with him; however, he could not leave the ones remaining in his memory. He returned home to become a respected educator, but something was missing.

The second veteran had served with the Marines, and it was his job to carry the heavy radio equipment on his back for his squad. He was seated against a tree taking a break when his Lieutenant said, "Let's move out" and, as he stood up, he took a bullet from a sniper in his stomach. If he had not stood up, it would have been between his eyes. He returned home to become an extremely successful realtor, but something was missing.

They both agreed that day that their minds were put at ease because they were involved in creating new life, instead of contributing to the taking of life.

While working on site at the second PresbyBuild house on South Street, I had occasion to partner (driving the pick-up to get building supplies) with Octavio, the father of the family of six who would be moving in the house. I asked him what it was like to live in Columbia, his native land. He explained how beautiful it was in his small mountain village. I asked him why he brought his family (legally) to Newburgh. He immediately answered, "To give my family a better life." That new life turned out to be a run-down apartment in one of the most distressed neighborhoods of Newburgh. Loud noises at night, often gunshots, made it difficult to sleep, especially for the children. Luz, the eight-year-old daughter fell asleep often at her desk and was doing poorly with her studies. Two years after moving into her new PresbyBuild home, she earned the top four honors in her school. During the summer of 2014, ten years after moving into her home, she received a grant to study in an advanced scientific program at Boston University. Her God-given ability was always present, she just needed the environment to let it blossom. Her parents worked three jobs, and her dad was always on site when not at his job. They deserved a safe, decent, affordable place to raise their family. Shortly after moving into their new home, we received this letter from Luz, along with a colored drawing of their new house with big windows and flowers.

"Dear Habit,

Thank you for helping my Dad build our house its just like I hoped it would be. Its wonderful. Our new house is a lot better than our old apartment. Our new house is a whole lot bigger than our apartment we have more room to play and I can read in peace without ripping my hair out because of all the noise. We are looking forward to our first holidays like Christmas and New Years and make some new memories. My moms favorite room now is the kitchen. She has more room to cook. Finally, I would just like to say Thank You! Love, Luz"

As Luz thanked Habitat, I want to thank the faithful folks at Goshen for helping PresbyBuild build a brighter future for many more children like Luz.

Let me close with a phrase from the old hymn, "We Would Be Building":

"Teach us to build upon the solid rock. We set the dream that hardens into deed."

FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION COMMITTEE 2015 ANNUAL REPORT

Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

For those of you who were unable to attend the annual meeting, the following is a summary of the church's current financial condition.

The church continues to derive a significant amount of its operating income from fundraising activities. While the income from that source has remained constant over the last several years, the same cannot be said for the income generated from pledges/commitments. As I reported last year, that income has trended downward for several years. Those amounts are as follows: \$206,036 in 2012; \$185,847 in 2013; \$150,608 for 2014; and \$142,550 for 2015. I am happy to report that the amount pledged for 2016 is \$164,847.

As has been the case for many years, we are unable to present a balanced budget for the upcoming year. The church's financial condition is not good. In March of this year, we reached a point where we were unable to pay our bills, and Session approved a transfer from our investment accounts in the amount of \$50,000. The projected deficit for 2016 is **\$36,348.00**.

We also face challenges regarding the beautiful building that we gather in for worship every Sunday. The Property Management Committee has devoted countless hours over the past year to several capital projects that needed to be done to preserve and protect the church building and Fellowship Hall. In anticipation of those needs, the congregation authorized me last year to apply for a loan in the amount of \$450,000 from the Presbyterian Church (USA) to fund those capital projects. The funds were advanced as we submitted proposals and certificates of insurance. The last advance was issued in January for work on the Tiffany windows, and we will begin paying the full principal and interest in March. We paid off the existing loans prior to the closing for the new loan.

The new heating system is up and running at a significant savings as we are now heating with natural gas. Air conditioning has been installed in the church and Fellowship Hall, the electrical system has been upgraded, a new security system is in place, and the parking lot has been paved. In the next few years, the church building will need a new roof at a cost of more than \$200,000.00

The total for the Smith Barney investment accounts is \$445,600. Most of the assets in our Smith Barney investment accounts are restricted, meaning they are donated to the church for specific purposes. Our investments have done well in recent years, given the robust performance of the stock market. While there was a significant downturn in the stock market in January of 2016, it has rebounded in recent months.
