

Our Sunday School

November 2007

Give thanks in all circumstances, for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus.

I Thessalonians 5:18

Gobble up these Thanksgiving ideas to enhance your family traditions at Thanksgiving time. If your family is already doing some of these, you are well on your way to making your celebration of thanks special. Try a couple of new ideas; you might find that a little "spice" can add some new "flavor" to what could be a routine annual feast. Unfortunately, the list does not include any recipes for making Snoopy's famous Thanksgiving dinner of jelly beans, toast, and popcorn!

- 1. Take the children to the library and pick out books about Thanksgiving. Discover what it was like for the early pilgrims. Why do we have parades at Thanksgiving? Why turkey?
- 2. Try to serve some different food items that people only prepare at this time each year. Perhaps you could try some traditional favorites from other parts of the country.
- 3. Involve the children in decorating the house. Of course, just decorating the table can be really fun, too. Visit a party store with the children and get some ideas for a centerpiece and placemats to make at home.
- 4. Encourage each person to bring a special object to the table that represents what he or she is thankful for this year. Let each take a turn to share the object and how it represents his or her thankfulness.
- 5. Grandparents and relatives can be encouraged to share memories of other Thanksgiving gatherings they remember, such as the best times, the hardest times, the one that meant the most, etc.
- 6. Create a "Thanksgiving basket" for a friend or relative who is not with you on Thanksgiving. Your family should prepare the basket with some thought and planning. Be sure to put something of yourselves in the basket like a picture or something homemade. Baskets could also be prepared for someone needy, for a friend, neighbor, or even someone from church.
- 7. Invite someone else to celebrate Thanksgiving with you. This is a very lonely time for families with no relatives in the area.
- 8. Select some Thanksgiving verses from the Bible, write the reference on cards, and place one card near each plate. Each person will read his or her verse and can discuss how the verse relates to what he or she is thankful for.
- 9. Place two cards with questions under each plate, one question to answer and the other to ask someone else at the table.
- 10. Encourage each person to write a card to someone that is not present that he or she is especially thankful for. Be sure to provide time, material, and stamps so this project will work.

- 11. Make a "Just Because I Love You" heart. This is a wooden (or felt, or anything you have) heart that has those words painted on it. The idea is to perform a loving deed for someone else and leave the heart with the message for the person to find. It could be anything that the other person would appreciate, like making their bed, buying them some gum, or helping with a chore. Once a person receives the heart,
 - they have to do something nice for someone else. The idea is to keep the heart moving around the group. You could continue this all year with the family.
- 12. Thanksgiving is a good time to have the children clean their rooms and select items to donate, give away, throw away, or give to school. Christmas is coming and we need to make more room for the new. Use this experience to point out how much they have and can be thankful for. You too can be thankful that they actually cleaned their rooms!
- 13. Have the children start their Christmas lists during Thanksgiving, while the relatives are with them. Give each child the chance to share what he or she would like this year. This could be really helpful for grandparents when they are shopping in the weeks ahead. Don't forget to point out that just because something is on the list, it does not mean they will get it.
- 14. Draw names for stockings. Each person can then be responsible for gathering small, inexpensive, "stocking stuffer" items (such as dried fruit, nuts, or homemade items) for one member of the family.
- 15. Talk about the origins of this American holiday, from the centuries-old tradition of feasting after the harvest to the 1621 feast shared by the Plymouth Pilgrims and their Wampanoag neighbors. Talk about George Washington's 1789 Thanksgiving Proclamation and the 1941 bill signed by President Roosevelt that established the fourth Thursday in November as the national Thanksgiving holiday.

What we've been doing

In September, the children learned that a church is not just a building, but it is also groups of Christians who join together to share in their beliefs and forms of worship. In October, we began our rotation about Mary's husband, Joseph, and that difficulties in life should not destroy our faith or result in our disobedience to God. In November, we will begin rehearsals for our Christmas pageant. I can't wait to find out what we're doing this year!

Our fall mission project is building "school kits" for American soldiers to distribute to Iraqi children. **Operation Iraqi Children** is a grassroots program founded in early 2004. The program is described by cofounder Gary Sinise as "... a wonderful way for the people of the U.S. to help the children of Iraq and by doing so we are helping our soldiers who are working so hard over there. It will promote goodwill between our two peoples and help in the rebuilding effort there. I started a project to send school supplies to Iraq because I saw a tremendous need for them when I visited one of the schools and became aware that this was the norm for most of the schools in Iraq. I also saw a beautiful interaction between our soldiers and the Iraqi children."

FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION COMMITTEE

<u>Committee Members</u>: Cathy Wade (Moderator), Scott Roper (Vice Moderator), Barbara Skyer (Treasurer), Nancy Smith (Financial Secretary), William Hodges, Toni Neidel and Joe Vanderhoof

- ❖ The committee continues with projects for income purposes: sale of the firehouse, lease of the Park Place property, and Open Space.
- The committee monitors the cell tower contacts for income purposes.
- Our insurance agency has requested the development and initiation of a child abuse policy. The committee has charged the Christian Education Committee with the development and implementation of this project.
- ❖ Loretta Richner has agreed to chair future fundraising projects for the FPC. Please give her your support by donating goods or dollars or offering your time to set up or clean up.
- ❖ The Property Management Committee has successfully installed new oil tanks in the basement under the sanctuary. The old oil tank has been removed and was rusted through, resulting in oil contamination of the soil. This environmental hazard will be cleaned up within EPA regulations, but holds a hefty price tag for which there are no funds.
- ❖ Commitment giving is down 15 percent or \$27,180 below the needed level through the end of September 2007. As a result, we are operating a deficit budget of approximately \$33,000. Please check your last quarter financial statement and bring your giving up to date before the end of 2007. Remember, any giving after December 31 will be credited to your 2008 commitment pledge.
- ❖ The committee is preparing the 2008 FPC Budget. Church committees have been asked to decrease their expenses a minimum of 10 percent. Committees are also asked, if feasible, to plan fundraisers to supplement budgeted expenses.
- ❖ The 2008 Stewardship Campaign will begin November 11. LOOK FOR THE RAINBOWS is a celebration of our church family and our commitment to the ministry of this church. It is a time to reflect on personal renewal and growth in Christ!

CAPITAL CAMPAIGN NEEDED

OILTANK PROJECT

The Property Management Committee and the Finance and Administration Committee have collaborated and commissioned a firm to provide services associated with the oil tank. The services will include the removal of the existing five-thousand gallon underground fuel oil tank (40+ years old) and the installation of new, above-ground oil storage tanks in the basement of the main sanctuary. This aspect of the project will cost \$7,900.

During the removal of the underground fuel oil tank, it was confirmed that the existing tank was leaking, and the church was obligated to contact the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (NYSDEC) and report a "spill." The same firm that was commissioned to remove the tank submitted a separate proposal for the removal and disposal of the contaminated soil in accordance with NYSDEC guidelines. The cost for the removal of the soil was \$399/ton. The church then solicited a proposal from another firm to provide similar services, and we were successful in negotiating a price at \$200/ton. Currently, the contractor is making arrangements with a facility to accept and process the contaminated soil. The excavation and removal of the soil is scheduled to be completed in approximately two weeks.

The quantity of soil to be removed is unknown as the soil characteristics and underground hydrologic conditions impact the spread of the plume and the quantity of soil contaminated by the fuel oil. Accordingly, the clean-up costs cannot be determined until the excavation process commences and the subsequent soil analysis and lab result(s) confirm(s) that all contaminated soil has been properly removed. If the "spill" permeated the water table, the clean-up costs will be even greater.

The church is looking at a cost of approximately \$30,000+ for which no funds are available. Therefore, the Finance and Administration Committee has voted to initiate the Capital Campaign for the needed funds.
