NOVEMBER WRAPS UP THE LITURGICAL YEAR



The church year of seasons and festivals, in which we observe the birth, life, death, and resurrection of Jesus, draws to a close this month. On November 1, we have All Saints' Day, when we remember all the departed saints — particularly those known to us in our congregation - who have passed on before us. On November 18, we will once again sing those traditional Thanksgiving hymns we have known and loved over the years: “Come, Ye Thankful People Come,” “We Gather Together to Ask the Lord’s Blessing,” and “Fairest Lord Jesus.” I, for one, particularly love those hymns and the memories of family and times past that are associated with them. The church year closes with Christ the King Sunday on November 25. At this time, we pause, and the church gives thanks and praise for the sovereignty of Christ.

We then move to Advent I on December 2, when we begin another cycle of expressing our longing for the coming of Christ to Earth with the familiar refrain, “O Come, O Come, Emmanuel.”

I have since visited her and taken her a little basket with some reading material, movies, and teas (plus, of course, a full shawl to help her recover during the eight weeks she has to be off her feet). She sends her thanks to all at the First Presbyterian Church for our gifts and support during this tough time.

We continue to give baby blankets to those having babies christened at our church, and I understand the families treasure these gifts. Thank you to all the ladies who make these extra-special hugs that will be cherished for years to come.

We continue to look for more “holy-hookers” to crochet or even knit our gifts. We will even teach you, and, believe me, our ladies are very patient and talented. Consider this if you want to do something that you will not only enjoy but will also get returned blessings over and over again.

The Gospel Says. . .Graze on Faith

It's now possible to serve your family healthy, fresh-frozen vegetables all winter and contribute to the Goshen Ecumenical Food Pantry at the same time. Through participation in the Hudson Valley food share initiative, "Graze on Faith," donors receive a share (seven packages of frozen vegetables) each month and a matching additional share (a second set of seven packages of frozen vegetables) for distribution at the local food bank, aiding those who may not have the ability to buy, cook, or even eat on a regular basis.

"Graze on Faith" is a mission of Blooming Grove United Church of Christ and is supported by the ecumenical Washingtonville Ministerial Alliance. Realizing the value of this program, the Mission Committee at the First Presbyterian Church of Goshen has chosen to support their efforts.

A share includes four or five monthly distributions of high-quality produce from November through February or March, with one distribution per month. Distribution occurs on the second Saturday of the month from 9:30 a.m. to 10:30 a.m. at the First Presbyterian Church of Goshen.

Although the kinds of vegetables might vary, a typical assortment includes heirloom red tomatoes; a mix of red, green, and yellow peppers; zucchini squash; sweet corn; carrots; beets; spinach; and peaches.

Food is donated by Hudson Valley farmers and is processed and stored in the Washingtonville High School freezers for winter delivery. The mission mirrors the biblical concept of gleaning, which allowed the needy to gather produce left in the field after harvest.

For four distributions (November through February), the cost is \$125; for five distributions (November through March), the cost is \$150. Checks can be sent to:

MISSION NEWS

PresbyBuild and Habitat for Humanity of Greater Newburgh

PresbyBuild completed its fifth house in Newburgh on Saturday, October 20. It is a two-story, three-bedroom house that will be home to the Gunera family, which includes a mom, a dad, and two children. This is Habitat's sixtieth house built since its inception thirteen years ago.

Habitat is dedicated to creating opportunities for decent affordable housing in partnership with families in need. Reaching across religious, cultural, and racial boundaries, they seek to rebuild a sense of community with the common goal of strong neighborhoods and dignity through homeownership.

PresbyBuild is comprised of eleven other churches in our area, in addition to our own. In our church, we support PresbyBuild by **volunteering at work sites**, walking in Habitat's annual **Walk for Housing** (which is its largest community-wide fundraising and advocacy event), and staging our **"Chili Challenge"** (which is run by our Mission Committee to raise money for PresbyBuild to pay for building materials).

Some individuals have asked, "Why Newburgh?" The answer is simple: The City of Newburgh, in our own county, has the distinction of being the most distressed urban area in New York State. It also ranks in the top ten most distressed areas in the United States. The city, with its remarkable architecture and its natural beauty (being situated along the Hudson River), has many supporters who are working to make it a city of which we all can be proud.

We expect to start construction of our sixth PresbyBuild house in November and hope to have it ready for dedication by April 28, the date of Walk for Housing. We are especially excited to be sponsoring this house because it will be part of a **Faith Build**. This Faith Build is a series of five new homes, each sponsored by a different faith, and the homes are built in a row on East Parmenter Street (which is already home to six Habitat families). An entire Habitat neighborhood will be created.

Drive by if you are in Newburgh. East Parmenter Street is around the corner from Habitat's headquarters and Restore on Washington Street. You will see the potential!

If you are interested in volunteering, you must sign up online at <http://newburgh.volunteerhub.com>. Choose the day(s) you can come (work days are usually Wednesdays and Saturdays); choose your work site; and then show up at your designated house at 8:00 a.m. Be a part of turning a family's dream of owning a home into a reality.
