Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

From now on, therefore, we regard no one from a human point of view; even though we once knew Christ from a human point of view, we know him no longer in that way. So if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new!

—2 Corinthians 5:15-16

Stephen Covey offered a memorable example of a paradigm shift. His early morning subway ride was interrupted by a father and his out-of-control children who hollered, raced, and jostled from one end of the subway car to the other. It was clearly annoying everyone. The father sat there as in a trance. When he was finally asked to control his children, he snapped back to reality. The man apologized profusely and then added, "We're just returning from the hospital where my wife—their mother just died—and I don't know what I'm going to do." In that moment everyone's opinion of the man and his children changed.

Paul believed that taking Jesus seriously, immersing ourselves in Jesus, produces a paradigm shift in the way we look at others. But what might such an immersion look like?

Daniel Day Lewis immersed himself in Abraham Lincoln. In a 60 Minutes segment he described preparing himself for the part, immersing himself in information about Lincoln, reading everything he could find, talking to the foremost experts on the man. For a year, he dressed like Lincoln, he walked like Lincoln, he even raised the pitch of his own speaking voice to sound more like Lincoln. Not just when he was on the set, but all day, every day. To the extent that it was possible, Daniel Day Lewis became Abraham Lincoln. At the end of the interview he was asked what it was like for him when the filming was completed. He replied, "I never loved a man like I loved that man." After a pause he added, "And I miss him."

The more deeply immersed you are in Jesus the more you love him, and the more you miss him when you step out of character.

This immersion in Jesus produces:

- •A new guidance system faith and not sight
- A new measure of performance we make it our aim to please Jesus
- A new understanding of sacrifice death leads to life

Every moment contains an invitation to go deeper into Jesus' life.



PLEASE PAY YOUR PER CAPITA ASSESSMENT FOR 2016

Every year, the Presbytery of the Hudson River charges every member church an assessment according to the current active membership. Our recorded active membership is currently **354** and *our assessment per member* (not per family) *for 2016 is \$31.50*, which is a total of *\$11,151.00* to be taken from our operating budget. As of September 30, 2016, **\$7,310.30** has been collected. Please assist with this expense and write a check for your family assessment, if you haven't already done so, and either mail it to the church or place it in the Sunday offering plate. Thanks for doing your share.

The Hudson River Presbytery

The Hudson River Presbytery connects, supports and equips congregations in ministry. Rooted and grounded in love, the presbytery is a meeting place for collaboration, a wellspring of resources, and a covenant community bearing witness to God's love.

The First Presbyterian Church of Goshen is one of the 81 congregations in eight counties served by the Hudson River Presbytery. Each church member pays an annual per capita fee of \$31.50 to support this presbytery.

The presbytery connects our congregation to the ministry of the PC (USA) in the Hudson Valley, nationwide and around the world. Through the work of the General Assembly and the Presbyterian Mission Agency, as well as the Synod of the Northeast, the presbytery orders our life and ministry, advocates for justice, brings relief following disasters, and builds ecumenical and interfaith relationships around the world.

The presbytery has a staff and an office but is the sum of all of its 11,757 members and its collective ministries.

Nurturing Congregational Leaders: In the Spring of 2016, over 150 Elders, Deacons and Financial Team members from 26 churches across the presbytery gathered at two regional events (Goshen Presbyterian was host to one of the events) to learn and connect with others while deepening their skills and understanding. Throughout the day, leaders attended workshops, shared in fellowship, and exchanged ideas.

Empowering Youth: Every three years over 5,000 high school youth attend the 5-day Presbyterian Youth Triennium. The gathering is filled with worship, small and large group activities, Bible studies, and fun and fellowship to equip and empower youth to serve God in this world. In June, 2016 Hudson River Presbytery sent 40 youth, accompanied by adult advisers, to this life-changing event.

Working for Justice: The presbytery has been a covenant partner with Rural and Migrant Ministry (RMM) since 1981. RMM connects religious and grassroots organizations with rural and migrant communities to address issues of structural justice in New York. Through shared legislative advocacy, financial support, and public witness, HRP leaders and congregations have walked side-by-side with our sisters and brothers who harvest the produce that comes to our tables.



With autumn upon us, here is a good fall dinner you can make today and serve tomorrow, or you can even freeze it for a night when things are too busy to cook. Enjoy...

Old Fashioned Chunkee Chili (make today - eat tomorrow)

Ingredients:

2 lbs. of beef or ground turkey with 1 cup water

1 can (28 oz.) crushed tomatoes

1 can (approx. 15 oz.) sliced or diced stewed tomatoes

1 can (approx. 15 oz.) dark kidney beans

1 can (approx. 15 oz.) white beans

3 med. onions, chopped, and 3-4 cloves of garlic chopped finely

2 green peppers - chopped (or one red, one green) plus 1 to 2 ribs of celery chopped

1 cup of wine (any cheap wine will do); black pepper and sprinkle of sea salt to taste plus celery seed

3-4 Tbs. brown sugar or 1 Tbsp. of maple syrup plus a dash of cinnamon

Tabasco or hot pepper sauce to taste

*Optional: shredded cheese (you can decide which kind to put on top when served).

To make:

Put water in Dutch oven and bring to a boil. Add the meat and break up into small pieces. As the water evaporates the meat will brown. Then put the meat in a colander and rinse under cold water to take off the grease. Put back in pot; add the onions, garlic and the peppers chopped in good-sized chunks. Add the wine. Then add the celery. Bring to a boil so the vegetables soften and then add the tomatoes and the beans (that you have drained and rinsed before adding). You may want to add some water--rinse the tomato cans with an inch or two of water and put into the chili. It should be like a spaghetti sauce that needs to thicken at this point. If too thick, add more water as it simmers. The water will evaporate as the flavors blend. It will thicken as it cooks. Let simmer, **stirring often**, for 1 to 2 hours. Then add a teaspoon or two of celery seed, a little black pepper, and salt to taste. Then stir in the brown sugar and add a dash of cinnamon. Stir in. Turn off and cover the pot with a lid. The chili is much better on day two when the flavors have had a chance to blend. This won't last because it is very good and hearty!

Serve with a green salad and some corn muffins.

*Note: Alcohol from the wine boils out yet the the flavor is good; or skip the wine if you want and replace it with beef broth).
