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Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Philippians 4:1–9

Therefore, my brothers and sisters, whom I love and long for, my joy and crown, stand firm in the Lord in this way, my beloved. I urge Euodia and I urge Syntyche to be of the same mind in the Lord. Yes, and I ask you also, my loyal companion, help these women, for they have struggled beside me in the work of the gospel, together with Clement and the rest of my co-workers, whose names are in the book of life. Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, Rejoice. Let your gentleness be known to everyone. The Lord is near. Do not worry about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus. Finally, beloved, whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is pleasing, whatever is commendable, if there is any excellence and if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things. Keep on doing the things that you have learned and received and heard and seen in me, and the God of peace will be with you.

When did joy become such a difficult thing? Maybe it's always been hard and I'm just finally becoming adult enough to notice. But as joy gets harder and harder to hang on to most days, it also feels more necessary. I grew up with the privilege of happiness, an overabundance of joy. As I found my way in this world and started to realize all the places of overabundant woe, I started to feel uncomfortable about my joyful privilege. I began to believe that, because of all of my advantages, I should only push myself to do the hardest thing with a puritanical fervor. Joy was a waste of time, a drag on my productivity and a privilege I no longer deserved. In other words, I became somewhat of a bummer to be around.

But Paul, the patron saint of try-harders and those trying to atone for their past enjoyments, writes to the Phillipians of joy, from prison no less, as vital. Rejoice in the Lord always. Paul reframes joy for us in this passage from a frivolity to something that does real work. Rejoicing in the Lord, together and always, is the remedy for the divisions in their community. Joy is the antidote to their anxiety. Joy is the gateway to knowing peace.

So I stand with Paul now, calling us all to rejoice in the Lord. Not a saccharine, self-serving happiness, but a deep joy. Come join me in the hard work joy of finding God's presence in unexpected places and celebrating it.

This Halloween marks the 500th anniversary of the Protestant Reformation—the day when Martin Luther nailed his 95 Theses up to the door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg. Since then, amid five centuries rife with conflict and schism, what has distinguished Protestant Christians perhaps more than anything else has been **hymnody**. In hymns, the reformed church expresses its sense of corporate membership in the larger church—its ecclesiology—as well as its devotional spirit and theological convictions.

My father was Protestant, as was most of his family for many generations. They included Presbyterian ministers and Congregationalist deacons, Puritans and pilgrims, as well as Episcopalians and even one Quaker. From that side of my heritage, I am deeply sensitive to the power of hymns.

The variety of hymns produced in the last half millennium is astonishing. I recommend that you become a lover of hymn singing if you are not already. When it comes to hymns and organ music, I find myself saying along with Martin Luther himself, "Here I stand; I cannot do otherwise. God help me!"

PLEASE PAY YOUR PER CAPITA ASSESSMENT FOR 2017

Every year, the Presbytery of the Hudson River charges every member church an assessment according to the current active membership. Our recorded active membership is currently **357** and **our assessment per member** (not per family) **for 2017 is \$34.10**, which is a total of **\$12,173.70** to be taken from our operating budget. As of September 30, 2017 \$4,633.60 has been collected. Please assist with this expense and write a check for your family assessment and either mail it to the church or place it in the Sunday offering plate. Thanks for doing your share.

The church is doing a few new things when it comes to stewardship and one of them is a one minute segment of the worship service called "A MINUTE FOR MINISTRY." Each Sunday during the collection a member of our congregation will be sharing some aspect of the church's ministry they are involved in or what special way the church has touched their lives. What follows is another of these which we wanted to share with you.

Our Church Mission Committee

Our church Mission Committee provides opportunities for all of us to serve Christ in the community, and the world, through its work. Whether it's sending care packages to soldiers, warm socks to school children in Afghanistan, Church World Service blankets to refugees, delivering food and clothing to the homeless in New York City, working with Habitat for Humanity of Greater Newburgh, participating in the annual Walk for Housing, raising money for PresbyBuild, or our annual mission trips to Nicaragua to build houses, schools and medical centers or our U.S. mission trips to sites of natural disasters.

I'd like to share a couple stories that brought home, to me, what this kind of work means to others.

In 2010, our church sent a ten member work team to New Orleans to help rebuild houses which were nearly destroyed in Hurricane Katrina five years earlier. On a Saturday afternoon we landed at the airport and on Sunday morning we sought out a Presbyterian Church where we could worship. When we entered, it was obvious that we stood out, dressed in the work clothes we would be wearing all week. In New Orleans, everyone dresses up for church. Here we were, ten new faces sitting together in the center section of the church. When the pastor stepped up to the pulpit, he spotted us and nodded. Then he looked out over his congregation, spread his arms wide, and said, "You see.....they still come."

What he was referring to, of course, was the tens of thousands of people who came from all around the world to help those who lost almost everything in Katrina. We saw them ourselves when we landed at the airport and again, as we departed a week later. They traveled in groups, like us, and often wore t-shirts identifying the church or organization they represented. Even five years after we were there, people still came.

When our church sends work teams to sites of natural disasters, we go under the auspices of the PDA - Presbyterian Disaster Assistance - who find us places to stay, usually at Presbyterian churches and organizations who structure the work for the week. PDA's slogan is **OUT OF CHAOS, HOPE.** How perfect because the tens of thousands who come to these natural disaster sites to help strangers, aren't just rebuilding homes and infrastructure... more than that... they are bringing hope to people who have lost so much. Hope for their future... faith in humankindand the realization that they are not alone. Can you imagine how that must feel in the midst of all of that chaos? Today we think of the people of Houston, of Jacksonville, of Puerto Rico and of the Virgin Islands. **OUT OF CHAOS, HOPE!**

I've seen this play out in neighborhoods in the City of Newburgh where Habitat for Humanity is at work and on the streets of New York City. During one Midnight Run our caravan of cars pulled up alongside Central Park at about two o'clock in the morning. Someone got out of the car and yelled "Midnight Run" and people who were homeless literally walked out from the shadows. They came to our caravan not just for the coffee, brown bag lunch and warm socks, coats, hats and gloves, but many of them came for the socialization; to talk with someone who they could feel safe with. One homeless man started a conversation with me by asking "Where are you all from?" When I said "Upstate in Orange County," he replied "You care about us.... all the way up there?" **OUT OF CHAOS, HOPE.**

This, to me, is the heart of our church...Putting God's Love Into Action.
