Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

To say that I have been busy this summer is an understatement. Like you, I had all the "to-do" things mapped out to accomplish. I didn't do very well with the list, but hope springs eternal, and I still have the remains of the list for the fall. Somehow I filled up the space with a zillion little busy things. So here is part of what I see. When work, meetings, to-do lists, and everything else fills my mind and time, my mind shifts from its deeper dimension with God to a shallower, moment-by-moment preoccupation with a thousand things. The thousand things are usually important in life. But the difference is how I relate to each day and whether I allow time to open myself to God. I've found that when I get so busy that I'm jumping from thing to thing, my awareness fades and that deep God dimension seems distant like a beautiful field on the horizon.

Theologian Paul Tillich describes just such experiences, which he labels as horizontal and vertical. "To be horizontally oriented is to be preoccupied with the transitory, day-to-day events; fads and fashions; temporal successes and failures. By contrast, to be vertically oriented or to live in the dimension of depth is to be drawn to the infinite, the transcendent." In a Saturday Evening Post essay from long ago, Tillich wrote: "Our daily life in office and home, cars and airplanes, while reading magazines and watching television, while looking at advertisements and hearing radio, are in themselves continuous examples of a life which has lost the dimension of depth. It runs ahead, every moment is filled with something that must be done or seen or said or planned. But no one can experience depth without stopping and becoming aware of oneself. Only if one has moments in which one does not care about what comes next can one experience the meaning of this moment here and now and ask oneself about the meaning of one's life. As long as the preliminary, transitory concerns are not silenced, no matter how interesting and valuable and important they may be, the voice of ultimate concern cannot be heard."

I take these words of Tillich's to remind myself of something of which I very much need to be reminded. And I wonder how many of you are also so busy that you too inhabit the horizontal dimension far more than the vertical. Just as the cross of Christ is the intersection of the vertical and horizontal elements, we need to be reminded that it is at the intersection of the two, not just one dimension, that we meet Christ. Our lives need both the practical, day-to-day work that meets our physical needs and the essential day-to-day God connection that meets our spiritual needs.

Holding this in mind, let's welcome the fall and the new, exciting elements from your church that will help you and your family along the way of that vertical dimension. We welcome Starr Tomczak from Union Seminary as our student assistant. Starr will be working with Christian education, adult education, and youth fellowship. Speaking of the latter, we are launching a great new program for our youth this year. The senior high group (grades 9-12) will meet weekly under the capable leadership of Barbara Lippert and Liese Boese, and the new junior high group (grades 7 and 8) will meet monthly guided by yours truly, Robin Boardman, and Emma Jorgensen.

SUPPORT YOUR CHURCH HOME 2008 CAPITAL CAMPAIGN

The 2008 Operating Budget consists of operating revenues and expenses only, not capital expenses needed to maintain and improve our church home and grounds. The Operating Budget consists of income and expenses anticipated for the day-to-day operation of the church facilities and programs.

The Finance and Administration Committee has prepared a Capital Budget for prioritized capital expenses to maintain and improve our church home and grounds. The plan is to <u>fund the Capital</u> <u>Budget through an annual Capital Fund Campaign</u> targeted specifically for need-based projects.

The Finance and Administration Committee and the Property Management Committee will work collectively to fund and complete the following 2008 prioritized projects:

2008 Capital Fund Budget

- Continue church and Fellowship Hall masonry repairs that are needed desperately (the small towers on either side of the rear Tiffany window are pulling away from the wall)—approximate cost: \$18K
- 2. Church Park drainage (the Village of Goshen DPW has already asked permission from First Presbyterian Church to install a catch basin)—approximate cost: \$5K
- 3. Repair one church sanctuary window—approximate cost: \$2K

The above costs are estimates, and all projects will move forward after several bids are received and evaluated.

Our church home needs your financial support for the 2008 Capital Campaign—an amount you agree to pledge over and above any 2008 pledge you already made toward our 2008 Operating Budget. You can pay the Capital Campaign pledge in periodic increments or in a lump sum between now and the end of the year.

We are pleased that one of our shawls went with Mary Beth Neely to her new home in Florida. I am sure it will remind her of some wonderful memories of us.

We sincerely appreciate the donations of yarns, which will go to good use. To date, several members found yarn or were given some from friends. Several of our groups have a great eye for color, and the stoles become beautiful "hugs" to present. Recently, a wedding shawl was made with a golden thread wrapped around the yarn. It takes your breath away with its magnificent beauty, and I am sure the lucky bride will treasure the gift. As you see, we are getting more creative as the months pass.

Many of the shawls made have been photographed to put in with the book of thank-you notes. Like "coats of many colors," each shawl is unique in either the stitch combination or the color combination. Personally, I find that I like making them because, as the yarn twists and turns and intermingles with other yarns of color or textures, it reminds me of life—how each of us touches others in special ways. Our paths cross, and we often find our life better for "intermingling" with others. In the end, all the loose strings are tied together to become something beautiful that enhances our lives.

Recently, one of our shawls was made and sent to author Debbie Macomber of the state of Washington. Debbie wrote the book that inspired our ministry. A shawl was sent to her with a note from us in friendship, letting her know she is an honorary part of our ministry. I recently received a personal note from Debbie. She wrote: "I am so deeply touched by the gift of the prayer shawl. I shall wear it every morning as I sit in my prayer nook to commune with our heavenly Father. Sunday School ... not just for kids anymore

The First Presbyterian Church of Goshen invites you to join us for adult Christian education beginning in September. We will be offering two different classes (a **Bible study class** and a **Christian issues class**) from 9:30 a.m. until 10:15 a.m. on Sundays. That's right, it's the same time the kids will be in Sunday school—so what a great opportunity to strengthen your own faith or do something just for YOU! And for those who have conflicts during the week but have always wanted to take a Bible study class, what better time than Sunday mornings? These adult education classes are also open to high school members that are interested in continuing their Christian education. Bring a friend, spread the word; we hope to see you there! Sign-ups are not required; just come when you can.

Bible Study Class

Our Bible study class will begin on September 14 and will run through December 7. The class will be led by George Hankins, who will use "The Present Word" curriculum by Congregational Ministries Publishing. The topic for the fall quarter, "The New Testament Community," will challenge us to see the New Testament through the lens of the community.

The study begins with a look at the four Gospels and the birth of a new community. The book of Acts will allow us to explore the development and work of this new community. And finally, we study the conflict, struggle, and persecution that are realized in this new community, as described in the Epistles. This class includes a study guide, which can be purchased ahead of time, if you wish, through the church office for \$5.

Christian Issues Class

Our first Christian issues class will be led by Starr Tomczak, our new student intern from Union Theological Seminary in New York City. Starr's topic will be "The Jeremiah Wright Tradition," and it will be held on September 14, 21, and 28.

This series will look at Jeremiah Wright, who became front-page news as a controversial figure in the presidential campaign this year, causing Senator Obama to resign from Trinity United Church of Christ. While Jeremiah Wright was the pastor, the South Side Chicago church grew from fewer than one hundred worshippers in 1972 to about eight thousand today. The church reflects the African-American community's historic struggle to find the true Christian message of God's love, despite adopting the religion of slave owners. In this struggle, the church was guided by black liberation theology developed in the 1960s by Starr's seminary professor, James Cone. Since that time, liberation theology has focused on God's love for the oppressed and how he listens to the voices of the poor, women, homosexuals, and others who are often overlooked.

The class will focus on the African-American church on September 14, black liberation theology on September 21, and the voices of the congregation in Goshen liberation theology on September 28.

Do you have an idea for our newest class?

The **Christian issues class** will be a series of different topics throughout the year. We are looking to the congregation for topics of interest for these classes. If you have an idea or know someone (maybe even you) who would be willing to speak on a specific topic that would be relevant, please contact Michele White at 988-0250 or micwhite@warwick.net.

A theme we are considering for October is "Taking Care of Those Who Can't." Classes would focus on children and the elderly and may include child neglect/abuse, understanding the foster care system, and elder neglect/abuse.

Maney-Hawkins Meditation Garden SEPTEMBER UPDATE

Tremendous progress has been made this summer on the first phase of the new, redesigned Maney-Hawkins Meditation Garden!

- The area has been graded and drainage has been installed.
- The center columbarium wall has been erected with twenty-eight niches.
- Footings for the future left and right walls are in the ground.
- The twenty-foot meditation labyrinth has been installed.
- The retaining wall near the parking lot has been erected.

The first round of inscribed and blank pavers, in-ground lighting, a granite memorial bench, and two entrance signs will be installed in September.

The Garden Committee has raised (*and invested*) just over \$50,000 for the garden (*all from donations outside of the operating budget*). BUT an additional \$10,000 is needed to complete the first phase! <u>Without</u> securing these funds in September, the garden will *not* be completed this fall.

To date, only ten niches have been purchased...that means eighteen are left for sale. If you are considering...*NOW* is the time to purchase a niche. We need our congregation's membership to step up, support, and lead by example! Double-niches will remain on sale at the "*pre-construction*" cost of only \$2,500 each until September 30. Each double-niche is 11 ¹/₄ inches cubed and allows for either double or single interment. Given the cost of cemetery plots and gravestones, this is a remarkable value. In October, the cost will be \$3,500 for each double-niche.

Please consider purchasing an inscribed memorial paver to honor or remember a loved one. Only eighty inscribed pavers have been ordered...the garden has room for one thousand pavers! Spread the word to the community-at-large, and remember, this is a non-denominational meditation space and is open to everyone. I'm sure every one of you has one person to remember! Pavers are \$100 each.

As we move into the fall, pending your support, the landscaping phase of the garden will begin. You can help with this "finishing touch" phase by purchasing plants in memory or honor of loved ones.

TUESDAY MORNING BIBLE STUDY

It's time to put our thinking caps back on—the ones that were replaced by straw hats during the summer months. Tuesday morning Bible study is starting up again on September 9.

Bible study takes place in the parlor on the second and fourth Tuesdays of each month. The second meeting this month will be on September 23. Study begins at 10:00 a.m.

The reading is light and the discussions are relaxed, so come whether you're a seasoned Bible reader or just a novice. Or perhaps you'd like to just sit in on the discussions. Hope to see you!

WORSHIP AND MUSIC

The addition of an early service to our method of worship creates more opportunities for members to give their services back to the church. The Worship and Music Committee coordinates volunteers in the following areas:

Greeters—(needed for both the 8:30 a.m. and 10:30 a.m. services) A greeter/Greeters can be an individual, two individuals, a couple, or an entire family. The tasks include arriving fifteen to twenty minutes early, standing in the narthex (preferably with name tags), and welcoming arriving worshipers.

Lay reader—(needed for the 10:30 a.m. service) The task is to read selected parts of the service. The church secretary, Pat Schwetje, will make your text available (by e-mail or pick-up), usually by the Wednesday prior to your reading.

Acolytes—Acolytes are members of our church family in the third grade or older.

- **Elders**—Elders are needed to serve Communion on the first Sunday of every month, during Advent and Lent by intinction, and every Sunday during July and August (this year).
- **Lighting the Advent wreath candles**—As we progress through the season of Advent, usually a family will participate in a short section of the worship service, reading a short text and lighting the candle(s) on the Advent wreath.

Good Friday service—Eight men are needed to read roles in a Passion play.

Sounds simple—and all the tasks are actually quite easy. If you add them up, there are nearly **five hundred** vital tasks that are filled by volunteers each year. Nearly ten volunteers are needed each week. Please help. Use the sign-up board in the narthex for greeting and reading, or contact Bruce Crandall (651-1483 / bcran12@earthlink.net) if you would give the gifts of your time and talent.
