Do not judge, so that you may not be judged. For with the judgment you make you will be judged, and the measure you give will be the measure you get. Why do you see the speck in your neighbor's eye, but do not notice the log in your own eye? Or how can you say to your neighbor, "Let me take the speck out of your eye," while the log is in your own eye? You hypocrite, first take the log out of your own eye, and then you will see clearly to take the speck out of your neighbor's eye. (Matthew 7:1–5)

If Jesus had never been born and these words had never been spoken, try to imagine what life in this world would be like—hard, harsh, hypercritical, and judgmental. But Jesus did live, and he did speak these words, and they are meant to change everything about the way we live with others.

I was delivering a casserole to a family that had gone through a rough week . It was filled to the very brim. I carefully belted it in the back seat and started driving very, very carefully. No driver is more loathed at rush hour than the one who drives very, very carefully. People honked, glared and made unfriendly gestures. I kept thinking, "If only they knew that I've got a casserole in the back seat, they'd understand." Now, whenever I encounter an annoying driver, I play this little game with myself. I tell myself, "Relax, they've got a casserole in the back seat." It helps take the edge off my naturally critical spirit.

I'm not sure I'd play this little game if Jesus hadn't said, "With the judgment you make, you will be judged." This statement is part of a larger collection of sayings that stand at the very heart of Jesus' entire ministry. Jesus returns again and again to the themes of managing anger, refusing revenge, resisting judgments, overcoming hatred, and forgiving as we have been forgiven.

Even people on the outer fringes of Christianity agree. From the mid-1980s to the early 2000s The Jesus Seminar orbited at the very edge of Christianity. They convened 150 scholars to determine the "historical facts" about Jesus. Astonishingly, they wrote off Jesus' divine nature, his signs, wonders, miracles, and resurrection along with 82% of his teachings and 84% of his deeds. But even after throwing out almost all of Jesus' life and teaching, The Jesus Seminar did agree that Jesus was passionate about showing mercy, resisting judgment, and extending forgiveness to others.

"Don't judge," isn't the only thing Jesus says. Life is full of circumstances where judgments are necessary. He doesn't just say, "Don't judge," but he goes on to say, "Be careful how you judge." It is especially interesting that when Jesus speaks of the "speck" and the "log," the word Jesus uses for "speck" is actually a small piece of the "log"; they are both from the same material. In other words, the flaw we see in another is usually a miniature version of the very same full-sized fault we have in ourselves. That's why we are usually guilty of the very things we judge most harshly in others.

If the world was a perfect place, then none of this would matter; but it's not and this does matter, a lot! So do your best to accept that the world is a broken and hostile place where everyone wounds and is wounded. One of the most powerful management tools Jesus gives us is the power of mercy. And always remember that there's a big difference between exercising wise judgment and being harshly judgmental.

Here's the bottom line: No one likes being around judgmental people-not even God.

Church Members Live Their Faith

GOSHEN – Members of the First Presbyterian Church of Goshen strive to live their faith and helping others is the essence of their faith. Strengthening their commitment, congregants spent a week in Newburgh this summer working on homes for Habitat for Humanity.

Each year, the Church's Mission Committee chooses a destination spot for a mission trip. Recent past spots in the U.S. include tornado-ravaged Joplin, Missouri in 2012 and New Orleans in 2010 and 2014 doing home repairs after Hurricane Katrina hit. In 2017, a group will be heading to Nicaragua, the church's mission site abroad.

Realizing local needs, the committee decided to support their neighbors in Newburgh this year. Twentysix volunteers filled time slots to work on two houses, one at 123 Washington Street and the other at 26 South Miller Street. Another 15 members prepared and served lunches.

"I'm trying to do my small part to help Newburgh rebound from its blight by working to re-establish viable neighborhoods – neighborhoods without violence," said parishioner Rob Warner. "We want to create a safe place for people to live, one house at a time."

"I'm here because everyone deserves to live in a decent home," said congregant Michele Meek, carefully filling in the seams of molding framing a window. "It's such a good feeling to live in your own home, to feel safe and be proud of it. I want others to feel the pride." After years of living in an old house, Meek said she's comfortable doing her job.

A young man with an interest in photography qualified for the Washington Street house, which comes with an attached studio on the first floor. He plans to open up the studio to the community as a gallery. He's of Mexican decent; his mother brought him and his siblings to Newburgh to live when they were young. Soon he'll be living with the family in their new home.

Before taking possession of a Habitat home, qualified homeowners must take courses at Orange County Community College on home maintenance and budgeting. All homeowners are required to work a certain number of hours on their homes during construction before moving in.

"I'm here to help people get a leg up on life," said the Rev. David Kingsley, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, as he stained the banister leading to the second floor. "Here's a studio with living quarters upstairs. It's exciting to be a part of this, having room for him and his extended family – wife, mother-in-law and an aunt."

As house captain, Jim Ferguson oversees construction and assigns volunteer jobs at the house under renovation. Working for years to make over homes in Newburgh, he's part of the area's transformation from boarded up homes and factory buildings to being a beautiful neighborhood. Twenty-four homes on East Parmenter Street have been refurbished with families now living in them, Ferguson proudly points out.

"This job is a perfect fit for me," said Ferguson. "I'm back in my community. But it's not about making myself feel good. It's about making others' lives better."

People of all ages from 18 – or age 16 with a parent – and up, and from all walks of life, have volunteered to work, said Ferguson. They include retired teachers, attorneys, West Point cadets, college students, civic groups and medical staff.

"They all check their egos at the door," Ferguson said. Wednesday and Saturday are workdays for Habitat volunteers.

Habitat has built 79 homes in Newburgh. PresbyBuild, consisting of 18 Presbyterian churches working in partnership with Habitat Newburgh, will begin its eighth house this fall, said Sue Varden, parishioner and organizer of this trip.

Anne Wood, a church member who also does pastoring at the First Presbyterian Church in Jeffersonville, N.Y. works summers when she has the time. As a regular participant in mission trips, Wood said, "I go wherever they're working. Work is there to be done – needed to be done. Jesus says, 'Whenever you did this for one of the least important of these brothers of mine you did it for me.' That's good enough for me to be here."

The congregation holds fundraisers like sandwich sales at the St. Patrick's Day Parade, plant sales and car washes throughout the year to offset the cost of traveling to various destinations. Every year the Mission Committee organizes and sponsors the Goshen Chili Challenge and donates the proceeds to Habitat for Humanity in Newburgh.

"I began volunteering for Habitat six years ago when I returned from our church's first mission trip to New Orleans in 2010," said Varden. Noting that the Habitat affiliate in Newburgh is considered one of the bestrun and most productive in the country, she said: "We all take pride in what it accomplishes and are touched, and changed, when we see these proud, hard-working families move into the home we have helped them build. In the process many bonds are formed between the volunteers and the partner families."

Fast-forward from the 1970s to only 5 years ago and the band members decided it was "well-worth-the-trip" to begin annual reunions to play those horn-classics and reunite face-to-face to catch-up on each other's families, escapades, triumphs and tragedies. That has become an annual tradition and this November 5, they will be performing a benefit concert with 100% of the proceeds going to help support our church's beautiful Meditation Garden.

OPUS will be performing classic horn-band hits by Chicago, Blood, Sweat & Tears, The Beatles, Steely Dan, Wilson Pickett, Otis Reading, Billy Joel and will also have a few musical surprises! With these musicians travelling from all directions to Goshen, it's very important we, as a church support their efforts the best we can by filling the sanctuary with people and raising as much for the garden as possible. The cost to maintain the Meditation Garden is \$2,000 per year. Since its completion in June 2009, the entire cost of the garden and maintenance costs have been paid for by the Garden Fund which functions totally outside the church's operating budget. It would be fantastic if the concert could raise several thousand dollars for this great cause!

Admission for the benefit concert will be: \$15 Adults, \$12 Senior & Students (at-the-door). Children under 6 are FREE. Discounted Advance Tickets will be: \$12 Adults, \$9 Seniors & Students and will be sold in the church office and at coffee hours in the weeks leading up to the concert.

There will be additional efforts made to offer additional fund-raising activities surrounding this garden benefit the day of show There will be a spaghetti dinner before the show and "make-your-own-sundaes" during intermission. Every year, the Presbytery of the Hudson River charges every member church an assessment according to the current active membership. Our recorded active membership is currently **354** and *our assessment per member* (not per family) *for 2016 is \$31.50*, which is a total of *\$11,151.00* to be taken from our operating budget. As of July 31, 2016, **\$6,989.80 has been collected.** Please assist with this expense and write a check for your family assessment, if you haven't already done so, and either mail it to the church or place it in the Sunday offering plate. Thanks for doing your share.

Please consider joining the effort to engage our children. To make this work every child needs a friend.

- **Goal:** Have adults in the congregation connect with a Sunday school child so the children feel part of the church family.
- **History**: Last year, Sunday school focused on the children's own family, it went along with the curriculum that family is there to love and support us. If you remember, we gave members an apple with a question, "What does family mean to you?" Then we put the apples on the tree in Fellowship Hall.

This year, the curriculum focuses on giving back, doing for others, outreach, community service and the church family.

Overall Plan:

- 1. On the first day of Sunday school children write a "letter" to a member of the church introducing themselves to a member. They will share:
 - a. Name, age, grade, favorite color, favorite book
 - b. Sports they play
 - c. What they want to be...
 - d. Brothers/sisters
- 2. Children will put letters on a tree for adults to pick, no name on the envelope.
- 3. A member picks an envelope, and in turn does the same, puts their letter back on the tree with the child's name.
- 4. On "Love an Elder Day" (October 2nd) the children and adult will meet at coffee hour and get to know each other.

Moving Forward:

- 5. Weekly either at coffee hour or before service, adults connect with their child; how was your week, how was your game, etc.
 - a. Adults will have to be prepared to start conversation with children, they will not be too forth coming at first.
 - b. Casual conversation only, goal is to make the children feel part of our church family.
 - c. Make children feel valued in church someone knows their name, not just a family friend.

Rewards:

- 1. Adults get to meet and bond with amazing children in our church family.
- 2. Children will feel like they have a place in our "Big" world.
- 3. As this group of children grow, they will be more willing to participate in projects /community service, fund raising or missions.
- 4. As they move up to Teen Voices and confirmation, the teens will be more likely to interact with members and be part of the church family.
